

Vikings' top scorer will miss three weeks

Vernon Vikings of the B.C. Junior Hockey League will be without their leading scorer for three weeks.

Centre Davey Wilkinson, who has collected 27 points in 14 games, has a painful leg injury from last Saturday's game against Langley.

Vikings will need all the help they can get next weekend when they host league-leading Pentiction Vees on Saturday night and travel to Kelowna to meet the Buckaroos on Sunday.

Two new goalies are trying out for the club. Bernie Roehinsky, who played for the B.C. champion Kelowna Junies last year, is in town. However, he is badly out of shape due to a hand injury he picked up in Vikings' training camp. He probably won't see any action this weekend.

The other netminder, from Vancouver Island, is expected to arrive today.

Coach Terry Penny said, "We've got to do something — we're not getting consistent goaltending. (Darrell) Morin will make two or three great saves and then miss for a cheap one. Our other goalie, (Rick) Hugl, hasn't shown he is ready to be number one."

In BCHJL action Tuesday, Merritt Centenials moved to within two points of the Vees by thumping Kamloops Chiefs 7-2 and Abbotsford Flyers edged Langley Lords 2-1.

Eddie Beers scored twice for Merritt while Greg Allen, Glen Johnson, Pat Rabbit, Dean Fratico and Ken Stroud contributed singles. Ward Sparrow and Murray Matheson replied for the Chiefs which were outshot 42-30.

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Underdog VSSS in B.C. tourney

Vernon Senior Secondary School, which recently won the Okanagan championship, will be taking part in the British Columbia Boys Volleyball Championships from Dec. 1-3, in Rutland.

VSSS Coach Barrie Reid said he is hoping for a lot of fan support. He said, "We'll probably be the underdog in the tournament so close to Vernon again. The short trip will be well worthwhile for anyone who wants to see some great volleyball."

On his club's chances in the provincial finals, Reid said, "If we come up with the same mental effort and play with an aggressive do-or-die attitude, we will do very well and perhaps win it. We're not expected to be tough, but we weren't expected to be tough because of the valley melt either. I'm optimistic about our chances — we've got a good bunch of kids."

NOT RANKED
In recent ratings from the B.C. Volleyball Association, Kamloops and Pentiction (two teams VSSS beat) were both ranked in the province's top 10. However, Vernon wasn't mentioned.

In the valley tourney, round-robin play will be followed off to a good start by beating Kamloops two games straight. Against Pentiction club boys dropped both their games in a very poor exhibition of their talent, but they did not die as they came back to defeat Rutland in two out of three closely fought games.

Vernon reached a milestone in the semi-finals when they played K.L.O. of Kelowna, a team they hadn't beaten all year. VSSS lost the first game but fought back to win the next two matches to advance into the finals against that strong Pentiction club.

VSSS beat Pentiction soundly in the first game but, in the second, Pentiction fought back from a 13-11 deficit to tie the series up at one game a piece. The final game saw Vernon stage one of the most dramatic comebacks ever seen in high school volleyball. The locals fell behind 10-0 but, "never say die" attitude got the ball rolling as VSSS came back to give 10-15, and Jim Garlic put away the winning hit to give Vernon the championship for the fourth straight year.

REID PROUD
Reid was tremendously proud of his team. "They played fantastic. They were doing things they've never done before. They were diving for balls, recovering and blocking. They were much more confident, more aggressive."

Reid mentioned many players for their outstanding effort. "One guy who was probably our most outstanding player was Rick Beaton. He played super. He was a real leader. Perhaps the best overall hitter I've seen anywhere this year is Jim Tilton, who also played super."

"Jim Garlic is really coming into his own now. He had a tough time, but he really worked hard and has really improved. I was also pleased with the play of Mike Kakosky, Neil Marshall, Brent Zimmer, and Dave Harding."

Training & Handling

HORS TRADES
Coldstream girl writes: "I own an eight-year old mare. She is a grade horse, gentle, well mannered most of the time, and we get along pretty well together. I use her for pleasure riding and I do not want to use her for shows or anything like that. Some of my friends tell me that I should now trade her in on a registered horse. They might just be telling me this so that I will buy one of their more expensive horses."

From what you say, in my opinion, there is absolutely no reason you should trade, sell or otherwise dispose of a horse that suits your abilities and riding needs. Far too many people have a hang-up on owning registered horses, and quite frankly, I've seen some that should never have been allowed to be registered.

You will hear the age old argument that it costs no more to feed a registered horse than a grade horse, which is true. But, it usually costs quite a bit more to purchase a registered horse than a grade horse and this is why many people own grades. There is just as many fine individuals to be found with grade horses as with registered ones. Poor quality horses come both ways, so don't let anyone talk you into something you don't want. Keep your mare, ride her and enjoy her and don't be swayed by people who are thinking of their own pocketbooks instead of your needs, desires and enjoyment.

BUCKEN BUCKON
Armstrong girl writes: "I have a really nice mare. She is perfect in every way except she will buck if ridden bareback or double. Can this be corrected?"

Your mare has a sensitive back and loin area. Try a bareback pad. This will protect her back from the muscles of your buttocks which tighten when riding bareback. I discourage anyone from riding double. It is painful and possibly hazardous to your horse's health.
