Vernon Winter Carnival is known for its gala coronation ceremony, fantastic parade, and nights of festivities.

However, the carnival is becoming more sports-oriented every year. The 15th annual event is no exception with 10 major sporting events scheduled this weekend.

With the Pee Wee Hockey Tournament moved to next week, people will have a chance to see some things they've never been to before.

Two events, the B.C. Hydro Bouspiell and Hang Gliding Competition, will run Saturday and Sunday.

## O'REILLY SAYS:

# 'No bad blood — we just don't like the clowns'

Terry O'Reilly grinned when asked there was no bad blood between his Boston Bruins and Buffalo Sabres.

"There's no bad blood. We just don't like big clowns running into our centres," the Boston winger said after the Sabres had defeated the Bruins 3-1 in a highly-spirited contest between the two National Hockey League rivals.

The Bruins forward was referring to Sabres defenceman Jerry Korab with whom he exchanged punches in the game's final minute. O'Reilly had earlier battled with Sabres' rookie defenceman Richard Dunn.

"We're not going to let him (Korab) go after our centres like he went after (Peter) McNab and (Jean) Ratelle," O'Reilly warned.

The victory moved the Sabres to within three points of the first-place Bruins in the Adams Division.

Elsewhere in the NHL, Montreal Canadiens fought back for a 4-1 tie with Vancouver Canucks. New York Islanders dumped Atlanta Flames 5-2 and Philadelphia Flyers blanked Colorado Rockies 4-0.

In the lone WHA encounter, Quebec Nordiques beat Birmingham Bulls 4-2.

Jim Lentz's power-play goal at 10:12 of the second period snapped a 1-1 tie and was the margin of victory for the Sabres.

Danny Gare, with his second goal of the night, found the empty-net with 52 seconds left for the final Buffalo goal.

John Wensink had given the Bruins a 1-0 lead at 4:44 of the first period, but the Sabres came back less than two minutes later with a rebound of Don Lucif's shot.

"This game was a must for us if we're to stay in the race," said Sabres' coach Marcel Pronovost. "It's live even before the NHL goal."

## LOAD RESTRICTIONS

Pursuant to Section 27 of the "Highway Act", notice is hereby given that load restrictions may be placed, on short notice in the near future, on all highways in the following highway districts:

Kamloops, Salmon Arm, McBride, Vernon, Kelowna, Pentiction, Merritt, Lillooet and Williams Lake.

Restrictions will be imposed in each District individually, as conditions warrant, normally the most westerly and southerly areas to be restricted first.

The restrictions will limit vehicles to 70% or 50% of legal axle loading, as allowed under the regulations pursuant to the Department of Commercial Transport Act. Overweight permits will not be granted. All existing weight permits will be cancelled. Other restrictions may be imposed as necessary.

The public, and trucking and transportation companies, should govern themselves accordingly.

Your co-operation in adhering to the above regulations will be appreciated.
