Sixteen-year-old Mike Winther showed 1,300 fans Sunday afternoon, at the Civic Arena, why he is being touted as a top pro hockey prospect.

Winther scored six goals and assisted on one other as Vernon Vikings obliterated the Vernon Essos 9-7 in the first annual Alumni Game, for the Winter Carnival Cup.

Winther, who moved to Vernon from Prince George last year, has been one of the brightspots in a gloomy season for Vikings. His three right wingers were recently traded by New Westminster Bruins to Medicine Hat Tigers.

LEO 4-0
Vikings came out flying and led 4-0 before the Essos knew they were in a game. However, Essos fought back,

and on two occasions, narrowed the gap to one goal.

Darren Hilaas scored twice for the winners while Wayne Brown, brought up from the juvenile rep, added a assist.

George Farther, Marv Sten, Clay Anderson, Wayne Dye, Dave Caldwell, Bob Meyer, and Les Salo replied for the Essos.

HAD CHANCES
Essos trailed 3-5 midway through the third period, narrowed the gap to 8-7, and had numerous opportunities in the game. Caldwell ripped a shot off the post. Tom Williamson was thwarted on three great opportunities, and Berry Dye fanned twice, right in front, on passes from Jeff Shroy.

But, you can't take anything away from Vikings: They showed hustle and drive that has not been indicative of the team this season. Against the older and bigger Essos, Vikings continually played the body.

Essos' Coach Odie Lowe was disappointed with the loss, but admitted he enjoyed the game.

NEEDED DEFENCE
Lowe said before the game: "I'm a little worried - we have plenty of goal scorers and good goaltending, but we're weak on defence. I could use another two good defencemen."

Lowe turned out to be a prophet as Vikings got numerous clearcut and two-on-one breakaways.

Each team was assessed eight minor penalties in the hard-hitting contest.

Vernon Canadians saw their playoff hopes dim on Sunday night.

Canadians were hammered 11-4 by Westside Packers in North Okanagan Hockey League action at the Civic Arena.

Canadians are tied for fourth-place, and the final playoff berth, with Vernon Sport Cougars. However, last-place Windfall Raiders are only two points back, with a game-in-hand.

The teams were tied 2-2 at the end of the first period and Packers held a 5-4 edge after the second.

Howard wins third marathon

Tom Howard of Surrey won his third Winter Carnival Six-mile Marathon on Sunday, running a 30 minute, 19.8 second pace over the distance.

Howard, one of Canada's finest long distance runners, ran about 20 seconds slower than last year but attributed the change to road conditions and a slight alteration of the course.

At least 40 runners participated in the event, including competitors from the Okanagan Valley, Lower Mainland and Calgary.

TWO WAYS
Other winners in the race included last years Ladies Open winner, Pauline Moseley from Calgary; Craig Storey of Calgary, taking second in the men's open category; Wiles from Irricana, Alta., who took third in the men's open.

Both winners were Gordon Rasmussen of Vernon, the first Okanagan resident to crack the line; Al Jerry from Kelowna, with a second place finish; and Chris Rasmussen of Vernon, who took first in the local ladies' competition.

Marathon organizer Fred Beckhoff said the number of competitors in the event was significantly higher and he hoped it would increase again next year. "The number of local participants went up from 13 to more than 20 this year, so we were really happy with the race," he said. "Although weather and road conditions this year weren't as good as last, we think the runners did very well."

KEEPS TROPHY
The marathon perpetual trophy, having been won three times by Howard, has been donated to him and designated a keeper trophy. It was announced that a new one would be provided next year for competitors.

All participants received a souvenir shirt from the race and all winners received trophies or gifts from local merchants.
