MEET THE COACH

Track and field is making a comeback in Vernon according to Sam Destimone, West Vech track and field coach.

"Track and field used to be the sport highlight in the area and I think we'll see that again soon," he said. "We have more schools participating than ever before and more people are getting involved in the sport."

Destimone's track team was the top elementary school in the district this year but he said it is the hardest sport to teach.

"Track and field athletes have to practice on their own a lot and at an early age, the athletes find it difficult," he said. "A coach, by virtue of all the different events he has to teach, gets pretty thin sometimes. Most kids get used to team sports and find it hard to have no one to rely on."

Destimone's competitors are in the grade 4 to 7 range and he has more than 480 students to draw from. "I think we have an advantage because of the size of our school, but we also have some good athletes," he said.

When setting up a track team, Destimone looks for students with a lot of potential and then tries to develop them as players from there. "This year I have a tremendously talented team and I think it's the best I've ever coached here," he said.

"This year's team is willing, backs each other, sticks

together and is enthusiastic about track and field," Destimone said. "They are more than willing to put in time if I am, and at this age, they rely on the coach being there a lot."

"We have some strong athletes at West Vernon but I think a lot of kids are in it for the fun. I show them how to play the game and from there, it is up to them how far they go."

Destimone said he encourages his students to go as far as they can and maybe this is the reason why his team has done so well.

DO THEIR BEST

"I'm pulling for them to do their best and they really respond to it. Winning is not the important thing because in individual sports, you are always competing against yourself and trying to improve your own time, distance, or whatever."

"Vernon does have a future in track and field and hopefully, the day will come again when Polson Park's stadium is brimming with competitors and spectators, enjoying the sport alike," Destimone said.

Tigers wrap-up seventh LA title

Vernon's Village Green Tigers clinched their seventh consecutive Interior Lacrosse Association league title on Friday night by downing Kamloops 10-12 at the Haszen Memorial Arena.

With only five games to go in the regular season, Tigers have won 10 consecutive games and have an insurmountable lead over second-place Kelowna Bruins.

Five players, Jeff Shirley, Rick Horley, Dale Rintoul, Don Kendall and Graydon Brown remain off the 1977 team which wrestled the I.L.A. title away from Armstrong.

On Friday, Rocks jumped to a quick 2-0 lead, however, before the first intermission, Vernon was in front 3-2.

Both teams played tenacious defence in the second period and after 40 minutes, Tigers led 8-4. The third period was a goalies' nightmare.

Rookie Kevin Holte, who replaced Vernon starter Zecchi after the second period, was beat for eight goals. And at the other end, Tigers fired seven shots past two Armstrong goalies.

Brown, enjoying his best game of the season, scored three goals for the winners. He was also a standout on defence and penalty-killing.

Gary Gilchrist, Rintoul, Dan Holte, and Gary Holte scored two each for the winners while Kendall, Bill Kirkland, Jamie McKenzie, and Gary Turk added singles.

Jack Prokopsz was top sniper for the Rocks with four goals and three assists.

Jim Maundrell, Kim Fulton, and Lance McGregor each scored twice with solos from Wayne Christian and Kelly O'Brien.

Zecchi and Holte combined to make 30 stops while Mark Husband and Ron Peterson, brought up from intermediate, knocked out 10 shots.

15 PENALTIES

It was one of the cleanest games of the season with just 15 minor penalties assessed, eight of them to Tigers.

Vernon Coach Bill Roth told the Daily News his club checked well.

Roth said, "For two periods, our defence was near-perfect. In the third period, we hit well, but they got a few breaks and we had a couple lapses. I was quite pleased with our effort."

Your Car, Truck, or Rec. Vehicle

If you give your car a two-minute warmup at idle in the garage before driving, you're wasting gas. Modern cars need little more than 15 to 30 seconds of warming up. Usually, by the time you back out of your garage, the car is ready to go. The first two or three miles don't charge a drop on 85 mph of course.

Better: milage is the watchword for all auto makers these days. One way to get it is with less friction inside the engine. Oil makers are responding with new super-tapestry oils. One of those is Acrographite, which is made with the addition of 'slippery' agents in the oil. It has graphite added and is said to give a five to six percent improvement. Five percent of a 20 mpg figure is another mpg. That means a lot in the auto economy year.

Another way to improve economy is through better gearing. One maker will handle a four speed transmission for its big car lines in 1980. (The 1979's are almost here). The fourth gear forward is actually a higher gear or an overdrive, and should produce ten percent better economy makers say. That's 2 mpg on a 20 mpg car.

COACH'S CLINIC

Passing the ball — move to open

Editor's Note: This is the eighth in a series of 10 instructional articles on the fundamentals of soccer. Macklin has been involved in soccer for many years, both as a coach and player. The next two columns, on passing, will be written by him.

Having acquired the ability to kick the ball accurately with either foot and remembering that accuracy makes perfect, you are ready to learn control and distribution of the ball.

Soccer, of course, is essentially a team sport. Therefore, it is important to distribute the ball among the players of your team, using either the feet or the head.

An accurately passed pass can put your team from a defensive position, on to offence, in just one passing movement.

WHERE TO PASS

Knowing where and when to pass the ball will be taught to you with good coaching. The best tip of common sense. But, a good tip is to watch top-class soccer matches on television, and see the passing movements develop. Watch how players of skill move to the open to receive passes.

The man with the ball should always have at least two players to pass to. Therefore, players on your team should run into good positions and call for the ball.
