# Final playoff spot in the line Sunday

"I expect it'll be a high scoring game," said Gotta. "I can't see it going any other way."

The Calgary contest will be televised on the full CTV network with kickoff set for 2 p.m. local time.

Other Canadian Football League action available on television this weekend includes Sunday's game at Montreal where CBC will televise Hamilton Tiger-Cats' encounter with the Alouettes starting at 2 p.m.

Tonight's game at Winnipeg where former Blue Bombers coach Bud Riley returns as head coach of Toronto Argonauts. The Winnipeg contest is scheduled for 8 p.m. local time

with the CTV network providing television coverage.

One other contest — Edmonton Eskimos visiting Saskatchewan Roughriders on Sunday — will not be televised.

## British riders dominate show

CALGARY (CP) — Riders from Great Britain continue to dominate Spruce Meadows Masters Horse Show, finishing first and second in Friday's premier international jumping event.

Rain and wind delayed the start of competition in the Prudential Steel Cup, but once the skies cleared 29 riders attacked the course with an 18 riding clear in the opening round.

Over a short jump-off course it was Britain's Michael Sawwell, who paced the pack aboard Chairman, with teammate Caroline Bradley finishing second on Tigre. Ulrich Meyer, 2nd Besten, the only other clear in the jump-off, finished third for Germany.

Sawwell was the class of the show, touring the course in a brisk 40.5 seconds, almost four seconds faster than Bradley and a full 10 seconds ahead of the German rider.

Friday's victory was the fourth in six events for the British and only John Simpson of Canada and Carlos Acunaire.

**Barr makes cup team**  
TORONTO (CP) — Dave Barr of Kelowna, B.C., will join Dan Halderson of Brandon, Man., as a member of Canada's World Cup golf team, the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association announced Friday.

Barr, winner of the 1978 British Columbia Open, is currently competing in the U.S. Professional Golfers' Association tour and has a fourth-place finish at this year's Milwaukee Open to his credit. He was a member of Canada's World Cup team in 1977.

The World Cup will be held Nov. 30 to Dec. 3 at Island of Kauai, Hawaii.
