

Revelstoke hammered by undefeated Vernon

Vernon stretched its winning streak to five games Tuesday with a 4-1 victory over Revelstoke in high school soccer action at Vernon Senior High School.

Despite the win, VSSS was far from impressive. The hosts were hampered by strong wind and a lack of opposition.

Vernon Coach Keith Brooks said, "I'm hard to excite about playing a team like Revelstoke. We knew we weren't going to have any trouble with them and the wind made long passes futile."

VSSS took a 2-0 lead on goals by Al Sletton and Sam Salko. Revelstoke narrowed the gap to 2-1. In the dying

seconds of the first-half, when a curving corner kick eluded goalie Salko, who had his second goal of the game, and Pete Strother added insurance markers in the second-half. Our defence played very well. The only shots Revelstoke was able to get on goal were harmless kicks about 100 yards from the goal.

The VSSS coach had special praise for defenders Kelly Schley, Gary Casperson and Doug Wurz. Schley, in particular, made several excellent tackles.

Canadians surprising

Everyone at last Saturday's junior hockey game, in the Vernon Civic Arena, got a big surprise.

Vernon Canadians beat Nanaimo Clippers, which surprised some people. But, the 1-2 score had most of the 450 fans in shock. It was Vernon's best offensive effort since the 1975-76 season, when the club shattered a handful of league records.

That win, coupled with Friday's victory over Kelowna Buckaroos, has given the Canadians some much-needed confidence.

After five games, Canadians' General Manager Sheldon Bloomer said he is quite pleased with the team's progress.

Bloomer said, "We've still got to make some changes, but on a whole, I'm quite happy with the way our club looks."

10 LOCAL PLAYERS

Canadians have 10 local players on the roster and the rookie GM said he would like to see even more.

Bloomer said, "We've invited several other local players out to our practices and they just haven't shown up. I don't know if they're not interested in playing hockey or what their problem is."

One of the biggest disappointments was Vernon goalie Rex Sliak. Bloomer said, "I talked with Sliak and he assured me he wanted to play for our club. We cut another goalie to make room for him and then he decides he wants to be a lawyer instead of a hockey player."

The Canadians still need at least one or possibly two, defenseman and another goalie. But, up front, they seem fairly solid.

Bloomer said, "With the club we have now, I think we can win 50 per cent of our games. I haven't seen anyone yet that is going to overpower us. With a couple changes, we could be tough."

Vernon is still hoping for some help, from 20 different sources, before the end of the month. But, at this time, mum is the word.

PLEASANT SURPRISE

The most pleasant surprise, to date, has been the play of goalie Trent Smith. Smith, who was almost cut during training camp, has been great. In the last three games, he has allowed 12 goals. In the National Hockey League, a 4-0 goals against that is a revelation.

Another thing that has pleased Bloomer is the team's attitude. He said, "I've never seen a group of kids with a better attitude - they all want to play. And there is a good harmony among the players. Greg (Coach Sliak) has them working hard and they seem to be enjoying it."

FOUR EXCUSES

The one thing the Canadians need more than anything are some fans in the stands. There are four regular excuses people use for not going to the games. Here they are, with a reply.

- "I don't want to watch hockey in that old barn." The old barn has been renovated and is now a nice place to watch a hockey game. It isn't the Pacific Coliseum, but this isn't Vancouver either.
- "There aren't any local kids on the team. Why don't they give them a chance?" There are 10 local kids on the roster and every opportunity has been given to Vernon players.
- "All those guys want to go to go out and fight." To date, Canadians are averaging less than one fight per game. You see more violence than that on television.
- "I don't want to go out and watch them get thumped." Canadians have won two of five games and haven't been badly beat yet. The only game they were outplayed, they lost 4-1 to Merritt. They have an inexperienced club and should improve as the season progresses.
