Vernon Canadians scored three unanswered goals in the third period to dump Kamloops Rockets 6-3 in B.C. Junior Hockey League action before 525 fans Friday night at the Civic Arena.  
The win moves Canadians into a fifth-place tie. In the Interior Division, with Kamloops, they trail second-place Kelowna Buckaroos by only four points.  
Centre Terry Lowe and his wingers, John Neeld and Dale Slous, put on quite a show for the hometown fans. Each member of the trio scored once and Lowe set up two goals. But, it was their puck-handling and near-misses that had the crowd gasping.  
Neeld and Lowe, due to some pretty passing, had numerous glorious scoring opportunities. And Slous was robbed on two shots, from point-blank range.

**KNEE INJURY**

# Bright future ahead for Vernon product

To say that the offers open to Dean Solheim for employment next year are good, would be a complete understatement.  
They are of the formidable and very attractive variety. The former Vernon midjet rep star left-winger has four options open to him for next year, those being: making about \$8,000 a season in the sophomore Pacific Coast League with Phoenix Roadrunners, receiving a scholarship in a Canadian university, playing hockey in Switzerland, or performing for the Canadian under 21 Olympic squad.  
**TO EUROPE**  
Now playing at the centre ice position for the Western Canada Ice two Junior 'A' champion Prince Albert Raiders, the 20-year-old Swedish product feels his first choice will be making the jump to the Alps in Switzerland.  
"That's the offer I'm looking at most seriously right now," said Solheim, who added, "I don't know how these guys get all their connections, but I've got some super options open for next year."  
Solheim spent last season with the Western Canada Hockey League Lethbridge Broncos net after being in

Also on Friday night, Ken Ficoelli's goal with 15 seconds remaining gave Buckaroos a 6-5 victory over the visiting Delta Suns.

Bruce Cullen and Gord Pace each scored twice to pace the Buckaroos who had to overcome a 6-0 deficit entering their third period.

**GOOD OFFER**  
"I got a pretty good offer here," said Solheim, "so I decided to stay. It's quite a team they have here and the organization is just great."  
Solheim wouldn't elaborate on how much money Terry Thompson and the Raiders are paying him to score goals, but local sources say he is getting \$1,000 a month, plus free room and board.

**DENES RUMOR**  
Solheim also has a part time job with Tri-Tech Developments and denies any rumors about joining Vernon Canadians, of the B.C. Junior Hockey League.  
He said, "Odie (Terry Lowe of the Canadians) phoned my mom one night but that was as far as it went."  
Solheim and Lowe were team-mates with Oberon Golden Suns, of the Alberta Junior 'A' Hockey League, two years ago.  
Whatever choice Solheim makes, it is obvious his employer will be the one who benefits the most.
