Canadians blasted Kelowna Buckaroos 11-4 in B.C. Junior Hockey League action Sunday night before 400 fans at the Civic Arena. The victory was Vernon's fifth, in six games, on home ice.

Canadians jumped to a 5-0 lead after the first period and led 8-0 early in the second before Kelowna got on the scoreboard.

The line of Terry Lowe, John Neeld, and Dale Slous continued to create havoc for the opposition.

Neeld scored three goals and set up two others. Lowe had two goals and two assists, while Slous scored once and helped on three others.

Tom Guehl, still from a completely recovered from an ankle injury, also scored three goals for the winners while John Mercer and Len Antonii added singles.

Brian Cullen and Brian Mathews provided all the offence for the Bucks with two goals each.

37 SAVES

Kelowna netminder Ron Loustel, who looked shaky at times, allowed seven goals. Loustel looked particularly bad on the first goal of the game when Lowe flipped a clearing pass into the net, from outside the blue line.

Vernon netminders Trent Smith and Len Loif combined to block 37 shots. Smith made 23 saves before being relieved with the score 10-2. Loif, after getting beat on the first shot he faced, settled down and made some fine stops.

Kelowna took nine of 15 minor penalties and two of four fighting majors.

TEAM EFFORT

Canadians Coach Greg Kvistad told the Daily News his players came up with a real team effort.

Kvistad said, "I can't really single out any one or two players because everyone played well. On the other hand, Kelowna sure didn't have much going for it."

Tom Guehl, who got his two goals on only three shifts, may be needed for Vernon.

Coach Chud Buckaroos' Coach Chud Buckaroos and Mathews do not see eye-to-eye and Kvistad would like to have him.

The Vernon coach said, "We've talked to Wayne North (Kelowna's GM) about Mathews and we might be able to work something out. They want a player in return."

Mathews, who didn't dress Sunday and is undecided about staying in Vernon, could be traded for Kelowna.

Canadians are idle until next weekend when they hit the coast for three games.

In other weekend BCHJHL action: Nanaimo Clippers edged Bellingham Blazers 4-4 and doubled Chilliwack Coups 4-2. Penticton Vees thumped Delta Sun 7-3. Kelowna edged Kamloops Rockets 4-4. Merritt Centennials thumped Delta 9-1, and Penticton trounced Abbotsford Flyers 8-2.

Lions centre, Al Wilson, the Canadian Football League's outstanding offensive lineman award winner in 1977, will be joining Lions' defensive halfback Doug Carlson and Administrative Assistant Stu Kehoe for the Vernon Sport Cobras' first annual Grey Cup Bierfest, on Nov. 17, at the Vernon Lodge Hotel.

All three of the sports personalities will be guest speakers at the Bierfest at which time trophies will be given out to outstanding performers in the Vernon Major Men's Flag Football League.

Wilson, 6'7", 240 pounds and a native of Lake Cowichan on his eighth year with the Lions, having been nominated again for the Schunley Award this season.

Carlson emerged as a legitimate starter in 1977, his third year in the CFL, after spending two years as a backup and specialty teams player.
