

# VSSSS earns berth in provincial finals

Vernon Senior Secondary School pleased with their game plan and the strategy paid off as they captured the Okanagan senior boys' soccer crown for 1978 on Saturday.

The Blues stung the visiting Oliver Hornets to the tune of 6-2 in their opening contest at MacDonald Park, and then had to come up with a stronger performance in an exciting 1-1 victory over North Kamloops Saints.

**TWO GOALS**  
Striker Sam Salko led the Blues with two goals against the Hornets, while single markers came from the feet of Gordon McKay, Gerry Meausette, Murray Frohman and Al Betton.

VSSSS went ahead of the South Okanagan club 2-0 after just five minutes of play as Salko and McKay combined markers.

Oliver scored minutes later on a fluke as a ball shot from about 35 yards out, lobbed over the outstretched arms of VSSSS goalkeeper Andy Doyle. Gerry Meausette made it 3-1 for Vernon just before the first-half ended.

Vernon then pumped in three quick goals to open the second-half, while the Hornets scored their second and final goal on a corner kick late in the game.

Blues' coach Keith Brookes was pleased with his club's overall tourney performance and said, "They stuck to our game plan which was to attack and press in the opposition end as much as possible. Any loose ball was and we were not far more aggressive and hustled more than both teams we played."

Brookes also said the footing was very treacherous because of a Friday night snowfall.

**PELL BEHIND**  
Against North Kamloops, the VSSSS team to beat Vernon this year, VSSSS fell behind early as the Saints' end of center forward took advantage of a felly kick miscue to beat Doyle to the right side.

"We were shocked, but we never gave up," said Brookes.

About five minutes after the Saints' marker, a North Kamloops defender crunched the ball inside the 18-yard penalty area, allowing the Blues hand shooting Al Betton to drill a penalty shot to the bottom left hand corner for a 1-1 tie.

Dave Casperson became the hero for Blues as he scored a goal just two minutes before the first half whistle expired.

Then in the second half Brookes describes what could have meant a 2-2 tie.

"They were pressing us quite dangerously and one of their better shots was batted down by Andy and the rebound went past him and appeared headed for the net when out of nowhere came fullback Doug Wurz to save what should have been a sure goal... I almost turned my head in disgust as I thought they had scored for sure."

**PERFECT CROSS**  
Ten minutes later, Salko sent a perfect crossing pass to left-winger McKay, who quickly made it 3-1 for the Blues.

After that, said Brookes, "We played a defensive game which was kind of sloppy, but effective."

Brookes cited fullback Rod Trentini as playing an excellent game, saying "Rod played their star Oliver Easton right out of the game. Easton didn't do a damn thing. Rod played one heck of a game."

Brookes also gave credit to Salko who he said, "Played a first class game."

VSSSS and North Kamloops will represent the Okanagan at the 16-team B.C. Championships, in Nanaimo, next weekend.

## RENT DE-CONTROL NOTICE

FOR

- Bachelor, Studio and 1-bedroom units renting over \$300 per month.
- 2-bedroom units renting over \$350 per month.
- all units renting over \$400 per month.

- All rent increases taking effect February 1st, 1979 or after (for the units described above) are exempt from the 7% limit.
- All units renting for more than \$400.00 continue to be exempt from the 7% limit from August 1st, 1978.
- Tenants renting in these exempt ranges (but whose current rent is not greater than \$500 per month) may appeal what they consider to be an excessive increase to the Rent Review Commission, as described in the back of the "Notice of Rent Increase" form.
- An appeal to the Rent Review Commission must be made within 30 days of receiving a "Notice of Rent Increase" form.
- All rent increase notices must be on official forms and a copy sent to the Rent Review Commission within 7 days of serving the tenant.
- Disputes over the number of bedrooms may be resolved by the Rent Review Commission.
- All other provisions of the Residential Tenancy Act still apply.
