

Seaton girls eighth in B.C.

W. L. Seaton Junior Secondary girls placed eighth in a field of 25 at the British Columbia High School Cross-country Track Championship last weekend in Victoria.

Seaton, with its best performance in three trips to the provincial meet, was the top junior secondary school and top team from the interior of the province.

Highside girls established a meet record with only 45 points. Vancouver's Prince of Wales placed second with 105. Seaton's total was 360. Charles Bloo, of Lumby, finished 12th.

Peggy Nelson of Victoria's Dunsmuir finished first in the 3,700 metre course followed by Bonnie Hutton of Spectrum, also in Victoria.

LEADS SEATON

Best of the Seaton runners was Lisa Morgan, who placed 35th, out of 200 com-

petitors. Other Seaton competitors to score were Jenny LeBlanc 78th, Trina Gardner 79th, Wendy Usher 80th, and Diane Henry 82nd. Karen Spellman, Cathy French, and Marlie Kristian rounded out the Seaton squad.

Seaton Coach Greg Fraser said, "Our previous best was 12th, so naturally I'm happy with the outcome. It is the first time we have topped the interior schools."

FROM VSSS

In boys' competition, Vernon Senior Secondary School placed 10th out of 25 entrants.

Best of the VSSS runners was Mike Fednyak, who finished 22nd in a field of 177. Tony Theriault of Claremont ran the 7,000 metre course in 22 minutes, 50 seconds to win the boys' division.

Hillside topped the boys' event with Claremont, of Victoria, in second spot.

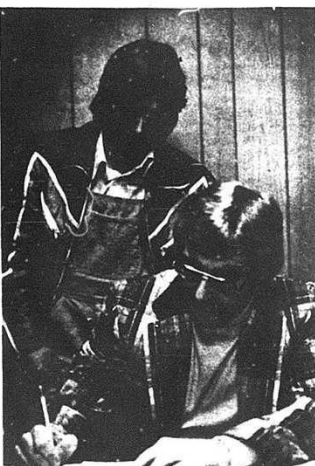

One person who had a great time was Al Charuk, of the B.C. Lions. Charuk and Doug Carlsson, along with publicity director Stu Kehoe, were the special guests at the event. Charuk, who caught 51 passes for the Lions this year, said, "What a great party. If Vernon ever has another event like this, you can bet I'll be back."

CANDID COMMENTS

The writer's letter has some interesting comments: On the 27 Tagge, "Jerry is the best quarterback in Canada. We work extremely well together. He knows exactly what I'm going to do."

On Leon Bright, "Leon is a super athlete. He takes a lot of pressure off me because with him in there, no team can afford to double team me."

On Jim Young, "Jim will play another season with us. He is extremely valuable to the Lions — he can still make the clutch catch."

On the Lions' tight end situation: "We need a proven one. We'll have to trade for one or get him from the NFL."

HARRIS IS BEST

On defensive halfbacks: "Dickie Harris of Montreal is the best in the country. I can't ever remember beating him cleanly. In the west, I'd say that Edmonton's Joe Hillman is number one. He is very strong and fast."

On Al Wilson: "A lot of people said Al had an off-year and didn't deserve to be nominated for the outstanding lineman award. As far as I'm concerned, even if Al had an off-season, he is still the best offensive lineman in the west."

On cheap shots: "I think Terry Irwin, of Calgary, throws the most cheap shots. I don't really get too many guys training to intimidate me."

On the Lions: "Even though we missed the playoffs this year, I think we improved. If we can improve at end and on the defensive line, we'll be tough to beat next season."

On Al Charuk: "I caught 51 passes this year, and harrin' injury. I think I can grab 70 next season."

"I was making a lot of clutch catches when we were winning early in the season. About the time we started losing, I stopped getting the ball. When we were knocked out of playoffs, I lost some of my desire."

"If we can get a good tight end next year, like Leon and myself, I think we'll lead the CFL in passing in 1979."

Charuk wants to go to the Grey Cup so he can see almost anything. Don't be surprised if he catches 770 passes next season to help the Lions make it.
