FILLY WHEELERS RIGHT
Vernon girls writes: "I own a 22-month-old Appaloosa filly that I ride in a D-ring snaffle. When I first started training her, she turned right or left; now I have to fight her to go left. Please help."
Your D-ring snaffle bit is fine. Ride this filly into a tight corner, so that when you take hold of her to the left, she must turn left. It's also possible you're working her more to the right than the left. Work her the same amount of time both ways. Also remember her bones are still pretty green so don't overdo it now.

WATER PROVES AN OBSTACLE
Winfield rider writes: "... recently, I got my first horse, a five-year-old gelding. There are some narrow and shallow bodies of water near my home, but he won't go through them. I've tried leading him through and having friends take him through while on their mounts. It doesn't work. Help!"
It sounds like your horse is genuinely afraid of water. How does he act when you pose him off or give him a bath? If he lets you run water over him and move him around in the pool of water under him, then patience should help get him over his fear of wading through streams. Spend time leading him through pools in the yard, and in this way work him up to streams.

GETTING IN LAZY IN BACK
Vernon rider writes: "I have a 10-year-old Appaloosa gelding and he doesn't want to pick up his back feet. He takes his leads well, but he starts trotting with his back feet at about the second time around the arena. This has caused me points in shows. Please give me some advice."
It sounds like your horse is kind of lazy. You're going to have to let him move out more, and to do this take him into a pasture. Gallop him out a little, then gradually pull him back down, so he's more collected. If he breaks down into the trot, squeeze him tight to make him move out more. His giving more more means he's willing and collect him and keep him from trotting behind. It wouldn't hurt to check with your farrier. He might need a little different angle on his shoes behind.
