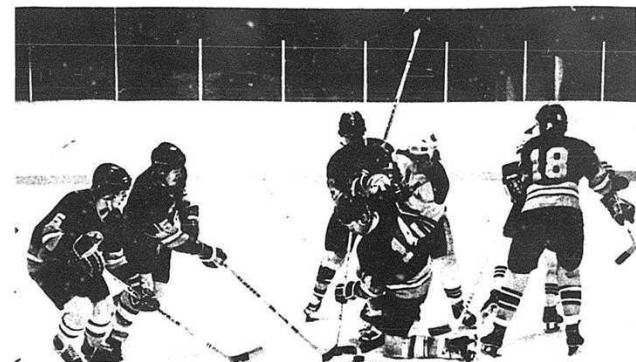

## Horse Talk Training & Handling with Don Fraser

This column is presented as an aid for non-professional horsemen who share common training problems. It serves as the medium for novice and experienced riders to seek advice and for the passing along of training tips that have worked for the author. If you have a problem with your horse, drop a short note to The Vernon Daily News and Don Fraser will try and answer it.

**FILLY PAWS FLOOR**  
 Vernon horseman writes: "I own an 18-month-old Quarter horse filly. When I feed her in her stall she paws at the floor while she eats. I tried to hobble her front legs, but she hops all around trying to paw at the floor. It's not just one hoof, it's both front hooves. It's very aggravating to her feet and to me. I wouldn't watch her if the mare's pawing bothers you. I don't worry about it. When the mare paws long enough to wear her feet down, she'll quit."  
 I've never found a sure way of breaking a horse from pawing while it eats, but there is one thing you can try. Take a leather band and tie it around your horse's leg above the knee, and then hang a small block of wood, or even a short piece of chain, over the knee with a stiff strap of leather. When the paw, the block of wood or chain will bump her knee. This won't cure a horse 100 per cent, because sometimes it will go back to pawing after the block is removed.

**PONY WON'T STOP, TRAILER**  
 Vernon girl writes: "I own a 3-year-old pony. Whenever I start to catch she takes off and won't stop. When I slow her down she gets mad and bucks. I have tried a straight bit, but then she was too hard to stop. I am now using a snaffle, but I am afraid I will just make her mouth too hard. She will also not trailer alone. She has to have someone back there or she will fight and might get hurt."  
 When you use the hackamore, you have it dropped too far down on the nose. Naturally, when a noseband gets down too low, it shuts off the horse's wind, and the horse will get scared and want to run off. At that age, the horse probably has a tough mouth. You could go back to snaffle driving the pony with a snaffle bit if you can't get a mouth back on the pony. Use a set of driving lines and drive her in an alley. If you want to stay with the hackamore bit, make sure it's adjusted properly so the noseband doesn't shut off her air.  
 For the trailing problem, I would get a trailer with enough room in it if she does like being alone. If you've got a two-horse trailer, take the partition out and put something over the back end so she can't get out. Then let her ride that way. I've had lots of horses that wouldn't haul in tight quarters until I took the partition out. Also try tying her on the opposite side you have her. Sometimes they don't like a wall on a particular side.
