Kvisle said, "We're going to try sending one man forechecking in centre line like we did against Bellingham. It's designed to disorganize our opponents as they try to set up their play."

Kvisle felt his club played very well in the tag game leading Blazers and if the Canadians hope to do as well against Merritt they must be just as speedy Centennials they will have to skate at their best.

And local hockey fans will get a glimpse of 10 Interior Division all-stars tonight including Tennant who will guide the inter-all-star team against the Coastal Division rivals in the BCJHL all-star contest next Tuesday in Vernon.

All-stars from the Centennials include goaltender Rob Polmanian, defencemen Randy Will and forwards Dale Adams, Gary Sirkka and Bob Schreier.

Selected to the Interior team from Vernon were Schneider, George Dods, Dwayne Terry, Lowe, John Need and defencemen Dave MacIntyre and Kvisle plans to keep his line intact for tonight's contest which should be a napper hockey game.

Leui Hestdalen, 72, of Kelowna was the oldest man to complete the 30 km course and he did it in a time of three hours and 58 minutes.

Hayman a successful builder of Canadian grid clubs

TORONTO (CP) Lew Hayman knows all about building a professional football club. He has been in on the ground floor of enough Canadian franchises that whatever problems he hasn't come across probably don't exist.

The New York native took over a struggling Toronto Argonauts team in 1932, success and, at age 25, became the youngest coach to win the Grey Cup.

His teams repeated as champions in 1937 and 1938 and when the second World War came along, his Royal Canadian Air Force Hurricanes were crowned cup champions in 1942.

Lured to Montreal in the postwar era as part-owner, chief executive officer and coach, Hayman was charged with forming the Alouettes from the grass roots. It took him four seasons to win the Air Force first Grey Cup in 1949.

He gradually took a less active part in the Montreal operation, dropping out of football entirely in 1964 and was encouraged in 1967 to rejoin the Argos, then in a rebuilding process.

The trouble is that Hayman's circumstances in Toronto have been such that dialogue has often been ignored and, consequently, the Argos' elder statesman had been rebuilding upstairs as their last Grey Cup '27 years ago.

One of the most respected administrators and builders in the game, the Argos' elder statesman had been languishing upstairs as an executive consultant, though rarely consulted during the first six years of a 13-year pact he signed with a previous Argonauts owner, John Bassett.

Fairbanks' future uncertain

BOSTON (AP) - Chuck Fairbanks doesn't have to coach New England Patriots, but a federal judge ruled Monday he can't sign a coaching contract with University of Colorado.

The preliminary injunction ordered by U.S. District Court Judge David Maxzone left the controversy where it began last month - with the coach and university pitted against the National Football League team.

Fairbanks has four years left on his NFL pact but has accepted a coaching job with Colorado.

While university officials studied Maxzone's ruling, Patriots owner William Sullivan expressed pleasure that Maxzone supports "the sanctity of a contract."

The university and Fairbanks have filed their own suit in Boulder, Colo., claiming the list of defendants named against him is holding the coach.

Boston lawyer Eric Cooley, representing the university, said Monday that Maxzone's order will be appealed.

EXTENDS ORDER Maxzone, meanwhile, extended a Jan. 3 temporary restraining order against the university's officials and Jack Vickers, a Colorado football supporter. He dropped businessman Robert Six, another supporter, from the list of defendants named against him.

The defendants are prohibited from signing Fairbanks to a coaching pact - alleged to be worth about \$100,000 in salary and fringe benefits.
