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Bruins threatens to sue NHL on merger vote

BOSTON (AP) — Boston Bruins threaten to sue the National Hockey League if member teams vote to merge with the World Hockey Association at a meeting in Chicago on Thursday, says Bruins' president Paul Mooney.

"The way it stands now," said Mooney, "we will bring suit, and we have the grounds to do it. To me, it's very interesting that all of the other teams getting ready for the meeting in Chicago have copies of the agenda and the proposal and we don't. It's curious to me the way this whole thing is being conducted."

In the past, attempts to merge the two leagues have failed with the Bruins, Toronto Maple Leafs, Los Angeles Kings, Montreal Canadiens and Vancouver Canucks joining to block the move.

Mooney, who has led the merger opposition, feels that Montreal and Vancouver are the two teams that have the most to lose if the merger goes through, giving merger proponents the necessary 13 votes to push them over the top.

A vote by three-quarters of the 17-member NHL is needed to merge the two leagues.

Mooney says he has the support of the Bruins, Toronto Maple Leafs, Los Angeles Kings, Montreal Canadiens and Vancouver Canucks joining to block the move.

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Lafleur trails scoring leader

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens were an unusual position Monday, because for the first time in four seasons, they found themselves in a real battle for individual and team honors as the National Hockey League's regular schedule entered its final three weeks.

New York Islanders, propelled by centre Bryan Trottier, led Montreal by two points in the league's all-time point standing 102-100, and Trottier held a commanding eight-point lead in individual scoring race ahead of Montreal right winger Guy Lafleur, the scoring champion for the last three seasons. Trottier now has 118 points, Lafleur 110.

Also, Mike Bossy of the Islanders is the leading goal scorer with 58 and the New York goaltending tandem of Bill Smith and Glenn Resch has moved to within a scant six goals of Montreal in the league's all-time goal differential. Canadiens' duo of Ken Dryden and Michel Larocque has averaged 2.59 goals-against average, while Smith and Resch have given their teams and have a combined average of 2.67.

Trottier has tradition on his side in his attempt to become the first player on a team other than Montreal, Boston Bruins or Chicago Black Hawks to win the scoring title since Gordie Howe's third in Detroit Red Wings in 1962-63.

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Each team now in the NHL with the most points in the merger, but as Bruins' general manager Harry Sinden said, "It's \$900,000 before we ever get it because payment is in Canadian dollars, not U.S. currency."

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Prairie teams to battle head-on

VICTORIA (CP) — The draw in the Canadian junior men's curling championship began to separate the wheat from the chaff as the three undefeated Prairie teams headed into today's third round.

Defending champion Darren Fish of Edmonton was paired against Warren Proctor of Swift Current while Merv Thompson of Winnipeg met another undefeated foursome skipper Jake Cunningham of St. John's Nfld.

Both Cunningham and Proctor had to steal a point in the final end to record their second consecutive victories while Fish overcame a shaky eighth end to get past the Northern Ontario foursome of Dave St. Louis 6-3 and Thompson clobbered his second Maritime rink in a rout as Philip Gilks of Fredericton, N.B., bowed 6-2.

"We want to beat them ... they (Saskatchewan) beat us last year in the Canadians," Fish said of his game against Proctor. "We don't want to lose an undefeated team."

Proctor, whose take-out game saw seven blank ends in his 12 victories over Peter Jenkins of Charlottetown, said he doesn't plan to change his strategy.

"We'll let him come to us. We'll try to keep the house

clean but if he wants to junk it up a bit we can play the draw game too."

Cunningham, who was playing his second game at 4 a.m. Newfoundland time, said he was tired and needed luck to get past Denis Marchand of Trois Rivières 8-7.

The Quebec skipper needed a cold draw to the button in the tenth but the rock fell off the center, enabling Cunningham, who was third in this competition last year, to bury his final stone behind an open guard.

Proctor faced a similar situation as Jenkins was wide and heavy with his final rock. Both rinks had a rock in the four-foot ring behind a guard that the Charlottetown skip, who had a 4-7 record in 1978 and is the only other returnee from last year, could have nestled in.

St. Louis had a chance to overcome a 4-1 Alberta lead in the eighth with a possible five-ender but his last rock was soft when it hit Fish's second end and he pushed it totally out of the house.

The Halczyk skip, who had four rinks in house before his final rock to two for Fish, counted two in the eighth and Fish preserved a victory with a pair in the tenth end.

Alberta opened with a 9-1 win over Michael Moss of Territories rink from Yellowknife in one of five first-round games that failed to last 30 ends.

Trumpssett crushed Paul Chisholm of Truro, N.S., 14-1 while Proctor beat Stacey Cosme of Pooka, N.S., 8-2 and Cunningham hammered Nick Rizzo's Ontario foursome from Brampton 12-4.

St. Louis opened with a 7-2 routing of Jenks at the Charlottetown skip led Northern Ontario get away from him when he missed an open draw in the ninth end for a steal of four after saving three with a draw to the four-foot ring in the eighth.

Ontario defeated Nova Scotia's Lowell Gould 6-5 Brian Mantoba's Brian MacKinnon 6-5 and won 10-1 Monday to move into sole possession of first place.

The Dryden rink had struggled through the third round, as it needed a last rock draw to score two in a 5-5 win over Newfoundland's Jim Burden, WON 2.

Alberta's Lyle Davis and Saskatchewan's Ken May won a pair of games Monday to get back into title contention.

Alberta lost its first two games, but was most impressive in defeating Quebec's Andre Turgeon 10-2 in eight ends and Nova Scotia 10-4 in nine ends.

Saskatchewan moved into a tie for second with Northern Ontario by defeating Manitoba 5-4 and British Columbia's Ivan Carlisle 9-5. Alberta grabbed big early leads in its victories. The Lethbridge rink led Quebec 7-0 after four ends and led Nova Scotia 6-0 after three.

BOSTON (AP) — Rookie Dwight Foster appears ready to settle down here.

"I think I have a knack for scoring," the Kitchener, Ont., native said Monday night after producing two first-period goals and an assist in the Bruins' 4-3 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs' lone National Hockey League

With goaltender Mike Palmateer on the bench in favor of an extra skater, Toronto captain Darryl Sittler broke in alone on Bruins netminder Gerry Cheevers, only to have his backhand glance off the side of the net as the final buzzer sounded.

"I score really good, but have been 8-2, but Palmateer is awesome," Cherry said. "Right now, he could be considered the best goalie in the league."

Wayne Seshan put Boston ahead 1-0 in the second period, but Palmateer with a 26-foot slapshot ended the opening period, but Ron Ellis tied it in a rebound five minutes later. Foster then fired in a backhand from the left of the crease and followed with a 15-footer from the slot for a 3-1 Boston lead.

Canucks lose club president

VANCOUVER (CP) — Bill Hughes resigned Monday as president of the Vancouver Canucks of the National Hockey League for personal reasons.

Hughes, as president of Vancouver Hockey Club Ltd., which operates the Canucks, has represented the club on the NHL board of governors since 1974. Canucks chairman Frank Griffith will represent the team at league meetings until a replacement for Hughes is chosen.

Terry O'Reilly made it 4-1, capped a rebound for Rick Middleton, who had broken in alone on Palmateer.

Early in the second period, the Leafs capitalized on a power play, with Sittler scoring a rebound from the side of the net. Paul Gardner scored the third Toronto goal, a slapshot from the left side at 12:25 of the period.

The win gives the Bruins 15-point edge on second-place Buffalo Sabres.

BLAZERS WIN SERIES OPENER

BELLINGHAM, Wash. (CP) — Bellingham Blazers scored two goals in the first minute of play, then cruised to a 6-1 win over Kamloops Rockets in the first game of the best-of-seven British Columbia Junior Hockey League final.

The Blazers, runaway winners in the league's Coastal Division during regular-season play, led 4-0 after one period, added one goal in the second and another in the third.

Only a goal by Kamloops' Al Graves with 24 seconds to play ruined a shutout bid by Steve Abbott, who came well with 29 saves on the night. His counterpart in the Rocket, Ian McEachern, stopped 28 shots.

Kevin Taskula got two goals for Bellingham while Jim Miller, Chris Tucker, Wayne Van Dorp and Don Fraser added one each.

The Blazers took four of six minor penalties and each team picked up one major as the teams faced off in front of 875 fans.

U.S. alone on top of pack

PERTH, Scotland (CP) — Iven Larsen of Denmark and Paulette Delachet of France were 2-2 in the round-robin at the Perth Ice Rink while Nella Alvers of Canada lost its first game in the women's world invitational curling championships.

The Canadians, from North Vancouver, did nothing right in the fourth round, allowing Brittina Torn of Sweden to steal a total of five points for a 3-3 victory.

In another four-round game of the 11-country tournament, Nancy Langley of Seattle, Wash., stole one point in the 10th and final end to give the United States a 8-8 decision over Susi Kiesel of West Germany.

The victory left the U.S. in sole possession of first place with a 4-0 record while Sweden moved to 3-0.

Scotland's Beth Lindsay was 3-1, while Sparkes, winner of the 1976 Canadian women's title at Montreal, and Gabby Casanova of Switzerland, both were 2-1.
