

Trem nau the winner in big fishing derby

Gordon Trempanu's first-ever fishing excursion on Okanagan Lake proved to be more than just a leisurely outing with his parents Sunday.

It turned out to be a big day in the 17-year-old Vernon man's life as he caught the biggest Rainbow in the Second Annual North Okanagan Fishing Derby.

After pulling in the 10 pound, 5 1/2 ounce fish, Trempanu was awarded the grand prize of a four-horsepower Evinrude outboard motor (donated by Seymour Equipment) and a 12-foot car-top boat (courtesy of the Vernon Yacht Club and Harbor Mtd., B.C. Ltd.).

"I caught it around 10 a.m. right in front of Allison Park," a very delighted Trempanu told the Daily News. "It gave up a pretty good fight though. I'll give it that much. I used a lure and weight and I had most of my line out. The fish was about 20 feet behind me."

He added that he had expected to catch a much smaller fish since it was his first experience on Okanagan Lake.

Trempanu was joined in the derby by his parents, Margta, and Heinz. They were both jumping up and down when he was hauling the fish in. They were getting me nervous. When I pulled the fish in I was jittery."

He added, "I'm quite pleased with the prize because now we can fish in the smaller lakes."

SECOND PRIZE
Second prize winner was Brian Littenberger of Vernon whose catch of a 9 1/2 pound rainbow earned him a week for two on the Sunbeam Coast at the Beachcomber Resort at Powell River (with air transportation supplied courtesy of Pacific Western Airlines.)

Jack Olsen of Vernon placed third by pulling in a nine-pound, four-ounce Rainbow, enabling him to receive a Marin electronic depth indicator donated by Lake Country Sports of Vernon.

Fourth prize winner was Russ Austin of Vernon who caught a nine-pound, three-ounce Rainbow, earning a downrigger donated by Vernon Sport Centre.

Dave Shinduke of Vernon fished to a fifth place performance by hauling in an eight-pound, six-and-a-half ounce Rainbow. For his efforts, Shinduke won a light action, seven-foot custom built spin-rod courtesy of Armstrong Sporting Goods.

Meanwhile, the largest Kokanee (no weight given) was caught by Lloyd Johnson of Vernon who won a Coleman propane stove with lantern and tank donated by Sun Valley Sports in Vernon.

The second largest Kokanee was caught by John McLeod of Burnaby who won two nights accommodation for two at the International Plaza Hotel in North Vancouver.

Bill Ruks of Vernon actually tied McLeod for second place, but a tie-breaking number draw was held with McLeod winning.

Derby chairman Ron Pusey is quite pleased with the way things went at the two-day affair which attracted 687 entrants, close to 100 more than last year.

Pusey said, "It was a fantastic success. We had beautiful weather and the fantastic support of people who donated prizes and to the people who took part in the derby."

All the proceeds from the derby will go towards the restocking of Okanagan Lake.

Canadians out of BCJHL

Three teams have withdrawn from the British Columbia Junior Hockey League because of financial problems, league president Ron Livingston said today.

Division will be Vernon Canadians while Langley and Delta Stars have dropped out of the Coast Division.

Livingston said the league will endorse applications to the British Columbia Amateur Hockey Association by all three clubs for a one-year leave of absence.

The departures leave a five-team Interior Division and six Coast Division clubs. Because of the uneven divisions, the Interior teams will play a 68-game schedule and Coast clubs will play 70 games.

Livingston said if there is a tie in points between the division leaders for the overall title and home-ice advantage in the playoffs, the champion will be the team with the best win-loss percentage.

Nor-West Caps, who play out of North Vancouver, and Richmond Sockeyes are the new teams joining Nanaimo Clippers, Bellingham Blazers, Abbotsford Flyers and Chilliwack Colts in the Coast Division.

Kamloops Rockets, Revelstoke Bruins, Kelowna Buckaroos, Merritt Centennials and Penticon Knights, formerly the Vees, make up the Interior division.

Ottawa clips Eskimos

EDMONTON (CP) - Gerry Organ kicked a pair of 22-yard field goals in the final minute to overshadow a strong second-half performance by Edmonton, Eskimo, quarterback Warren Moon and give Ottawa Rough Riders a 30-27 victory in a Canadian Football League exhibition game Sunday.

The Eskimos trailed 21-14 at halftime but dominated the second half as Moon threw three touchdown passes and led the defending Grey Cup champions to 28 points and a 27-24 lead going into the final minute of the game.

But as many of the 41,579 spectators began to file out of Commonwealth Stadium, Ottawa struck back. A 33-yard pass from Jimmy Jones to Cornell Barlow put Ottawa on the Edmonton 41-yard line and four plays later, at 14:05, Organ tied the game.

Ottawa defensive back Doug Fulconer intercepted a bullet-ed Moon pass moments later and ran 33 yards to the Eskimo 22, two plays later, on the final play of the game, Organ kicked the winning points.

Organ finished with three field goals and three converts. Calgary Halfback threw first-half touchdown passes, including one from the 14 yardline to Tony Gabriel, from the 31 to Richard Holmes and from the 10 to Jeff Avery.
