The crowd which eventually grew to more than 75,000 had originally gathered on the waterfront to wait for the then-famous distance swimmer to try and conquer the lake which had been offered money by the Canadian National Exhibition to be the first to cross it.

Twenty-five years later, she still is a petite woman, she still is in Willingboro, N.J., she still is married to Toronto several times to the Ontario sports writer and her husband do not lend her support to the crippled children who are helped

by the association. And she still is one of the most interviewed swimmers. Her reason for trying the swim had patriotic undertones.

"This just didn't seem right to me," she said in an interview. "I was 16 and a Canadian and I didn't think I should swim across the lake and let somebody else be the first to cross the lake."

"I guess that's a 16-year-old's thinking or only one way anyway I talked about it with Gus and he agreed that I could take a crack at it."
