The Bruins dealt Edmonton Oilers a 4-2 loss while Buffalo Sabres played to a 2-2 stalemate with Chicago Black Hawks.

In Boston, Bobby Schmautz scored his eighth goal in 12 games as the Bruins extended their unbeaten streak to five games. Wayne Cashman, Bobby Lonnelle and Dick Redmond also scored for the Bruins.

Dan Newman and Pat Price scored for the Oilers, who now have a record of two wins, four

losses and eight losses in 14 games.

Off-season management criticism had Schmautz, 34, wondering whether his days with the Bruins were numbered.

"I wanted to be traded last summer, it's no secret," Schmautz said. "They told me they weren't happy that I scored only 20 goals last season, that I should be playing more offense."

Sittler attacks his boss

TORONTO (CP) — Darryl Sittler, publicly dragged over the coals with a few of his Toronto Maple Leaf team mates by general manager Punch Imlach, returned a sharply directed mouthful at his boss Thursday.

In an interview in St. Louis, the Leaf captain told a Globe and Mail reporter he and other players on the National Hockey League club are upset with moves and statements by Imlach.

"I wouldn't say there's a lack of communication between Punch Imlach and the players," Sittler said. "There is no communication at all."

Sittler, waiting with his teammates for a flight to Winnipeg where the Leafs play the Jets on Saturday, opened up after being informed of a selection of choice Imlach darts thrown during radio and television broadcast of Wednesday's game in St. Louis, which Leafs won 7-4 over the Blues.

Imlach said during a discussion on a post-game television show he felt Sittler was playing as though he still had not recovered fully from torn knee ligaments suffered last season.

Imlach said during the radio broadcast of the game and again on the post-game television show that Sittler would be available in a trade for any NHL star.

"LOST A STEP?" Sittler used to be an all-star, he said, but "might have lost a step or two."

Last week, Sittler high-scoring right winger, Lanny McDonald and defenceman Ian Turnbull, Leaf veterans around whom the club has been built in recent years, were among a group of players placed on waivers then recalled.

The move by Imlach was interpreted as a manoeuvre to see which other NHL teams were interested in trading the players, said Sittler, didn't appreciate the fact they were not advised. They were upset when they learned through newspapers that they'd been placed on waivers.
