

## McLEAN FACES LESSER CHARGE

PORTLAND, Ore. (CP) — A lesser charge of harassment has been laid against Coach Ernie (Punch) McLean of New Westminster Bruins of the Western Hockey League, authorities said Tuesday.

McLean was originally charged with fourth-degree assault Friday following an incident after a major junior game here against Portland Winter Hawks.

Jackie Jones, a 19-year-old female student, alleges she was struck by McLean following the game in the corridor leading to the New Westminster dressing room.

McLean was arrested following the incident and later released when general manager Brian Shaw of the Winter Hawks posted bail.

The harassment charge carries a maximum penalty of six months in jail or a \$500 fine, or both. A pre-trial conference will be held on Dec. 31.

The incident followed a 5-1 Portland victory and an incident last March in which McLean was charged with seven members of the Bruins pleading guilty to assaulting two members of the Winter Hawks in an on-ice incident. The players were barred by the courts from playing in league games at any level until Dec. 1.

# Esquimos healthy thanks to grass

EDMONTON (CP) — Edmonton Esquimos are going into the Grey Cup game against Montreal Alouettes this Sunday in the healthiest condition in recent years, says trainer Jim Adams, and at least part of the reason is because the club plays half its games on natural turf.

The Esquimos are missing offensive linemen Dave Zacharko because of a knee injury and backup running back Don Warrington with a torn hamstring. But everyone else, including both quarterbacks, all the starting receivers and star running back Gerry Adams, are fit.

In fact, says Adams, over

the season the Esquimos have lost only Ian Bryans with a torn knee cartilage. Veteran offensive tackle Mike Wilson had a slight back injury which kept him out for two games but he's back in the lineup.

Adams says experience in the Canadian Football League seems to be underscoring studies done in the National Football League that players get more serious injuries playing on artificial turf.

"Most of our serious injuries have happened on artificial turf," says Adams, noting both Bryans and Zacharko were hurt on Saskatchewan's plastic grass.

"Both had their feet planted and got hit in the knee and ended up with stretched knee ligaments, which is a typical injury that you find on artificial turf, whereas on grass the foot will give and you don't have such a serious injury."

natural grass field, says Adams.

"David Boone, when he was traded here, mentioned that he thought he could extend his career by three or four years because now he's going to be on grass practicing and playing every day instead of hard artificial turf."

"You can't get artificial turf that matches that because if you try to get more padding underneath it starts sliding on top and if you reduce the padding then it becomes concrete hard."

## Perez joins Red Sox

BOSTON (AP) — At 37, first baseman Tony Perez, a seven-time all-star in 18 years in the National League, believes he can give Boston Red Sox \$1 million worth of baseball over the next three seasons.

"I feel great, the same as I did four or five years ago," Perez said Tuesday after signing a three-year Red Sox contract as a free agent with the American League.

"I have no physical problems, and I think I can help the Red Sox. And I think I can help at least three years."

Terms were not announced, but the multi-year pact will provide Perez, who will be 38 next May 14, more than \$1 million, it was reported.

Perez, who, with agent Reuben Katz, agreed to terms as a free-agent draftee last Friday, flew to Boston from his home in Puerto Rico for the formal signing at Fenway Park.

## Regional District of North Okanagan

Synopsis of By-law No. 248 being the "Regional District of North Okanagan Subdivision By-law No. 248, 1977".

Pursuant to the provisions of Part XXI, Division 4 — Subdivision of Land of the Municipal Act of British Columbia, the Board of the Regional District of North Okanagan, after receipt of approval from the Minister of Municipal Affairs, proposes to adopt By-law No. 248, 1977, which By-law provides as follows:

**Division One** — Title of By-law: Regional District of North Okanagan Subdivision By-law No. 248, 1977.

**Division Two** — Purpose

**Division Three** — Interpretation

**Division Four** — Procedure: This Division outlines the procedure for obtaining approval for the subdivision of land. This Division: (1) Defines the Approving Officer; (2) Establishes a fee for subdivision approval of \$25.00 for the first parcel to be created and \$10.00 for each additional parcel; (3) Requires that certain information be provided by the applicant; and (4) Establishes a procedure for Preliminary Layout Approval and Final Approval of the subdivision.

**Division Five** — Basic Provisions: This Division determines the suitability of a subdivision and defines the characteristics of a subdivision that are not approvable. Reference is made to other legislation, including the B.C. Agricultural Land Commission. Also, provision is made for the location of all works and services (water, sewer, telephone, electrical, and cablevision lines, etc.) according to standards set out in Schedule "C" of the By-law.

**Division Six** — Lot Design: The lot area and lot frontage requirements of Zoning By-law No. 229, 1977 are incorporated into the Subdivision By-law and provision is made for waiver of the minimum frontage requirement by the Board. Standards are also established for the creation of "panhandle" lots.

**Division Seven** — Services: This Division establishes minimum standards for the clearing, construction, grading, and surfacing of all highways; the provision of potable water to each proposed lot within the subdivision either by surface water supply, wells, or by a community water system; the disposal of sewage by connection to a community sewer system or by ground disposal; the installation of ornamental street lighting in all residential zones within Electoral Areas "A", "B", and "C"; the installation of underground wiring services within Electoral Areas "A", "B", and "C" for all subdivisions of three (3) lots or more where any lots are less than 1 ha (2.47 acres) excluding lots for commercial and industrial use; the provision of fire hydrants or yard hydrants in all areas with fire protection and serviced with a community water system capable of producing 1,000 l (219.7 imperial gallons) of water per minute; the dedication of parkland; and the installation of hydrate service for all subdivisions of lots less than 8 ha (19.77 acres) in size.

**Division Eight** — Highway Clearing, Construction, Grading, and surfacing Standards — Schedule "A"

**Division Nine** — On-Site Sewage Disposal Requirements — Schedule "B": Establishes the procedure for determining the suitability of soil for on-site sewage disposal and designates required setbacks of sewage absorption fields from lakes, rivers, streams, or other bodies of water.

**Division Ten** — Location of Works and Services — Schedule "C": Schematically describes the required location for all works and services described in Division Seven.

Subdivision By-law No. 248, 1977 was read a third time by the Regional Board on November 14th, 1979 and has been submitted for the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

Any person affected by this By-law may file an objection with the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C.
