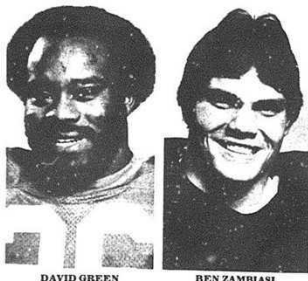

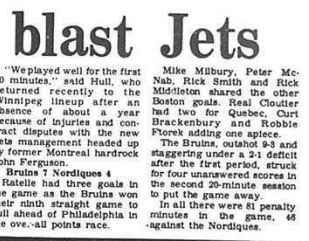

Training Opportunity Floorcovering

The Apprenticeship Training Programs Branch of the B.C. Ministry of Labour is offering a pre-apprenticeship course at Pacific Vocational Institute (Burnaby), designed to prepare men and women for employment as apprentices in the Floorcovering trade.

Course Term: From January 2 to April 11, 1980.

Fees and Allowances: All tuition fees of persons selected for training will be paid by the Ministry of Labour. In addition, training stipend allowances will be provided, where applicable.

Work Environment: The work environment for members of this trade is normally indoors. Installations will vary from large commercial projects to small residential applications. Persons engaged in this trade are required to kneel for extended periods and should have the necessary strength to handle heavy rolls of floorcovering materials.

Course Content: History of hand-surface floor coverings • Prospects of the trade • Customer and employer relations • Safe working practices • Hard-surface materials of the trade • Hard-surface installation tools • Subfloors and surface preparations • Adhesives and their uses • Trade mathematics and basic layouts • Tile layout and installation • Sheet goods layout and installation • Toppet base installation • Hard-surface stair installation • Tufted carpet installation requirements • Basic carpet installation tools • Tufted carpet preparation • Tufted carpet installation • Glue-down carpet installation.

Admission Requirements: 15 years of age and over • Good health • Minimum education, Grade 10 (Grade 12 preferred).

Fennell thinking about one thing

MONTREAL (CP) — For the second year in a row, Dave Fennell has brushed aside an individual award to concentrate his attention on the Grey Cup.

That could spell trouble for Montreal Alouettes who face Fennell and his Edmonton Eskimos team-mates in Sunday's Canadian Football League championship game.

Last year, Fennell, the 6-foot-4, 240-pound tackle who leads the Eskimos defence, was named outstanding defensive player of the year in the CFL.

Fennell accepted his 1978 award and then went on to lead the Eskimos in a 20-13 victory over Toronto, in the championship at Toronto, and was voted defensive player of the game as well.

Thursday night, Fennell again was a winner in the annual Schenley Awards presentations, "this time named outstanding Canadian player of the year."

And again Fennell let slip his feeling that the individual awards are a distraction. "I would like to be concerned with only one thing in this point in time and that's playing the game on Sunday."

When asked to suggest a better time to hold the presentations, which have become one of the major highlights of Grey Cup week.

One boy hospitalized after Alberta brawl

ST. ALBERT, Alta. (CP) — Seven disciplinary action will be taken against participants in a bloody brawl before the start of an Alberta Junior Hockey League game Wednesday night.

The league's board of directors will meet Sunday to discuss the fight that started during the warm-up before a game between St. Albert Saints and Red Deer Rufflers.

The brawl broke out in 15 minutes and spread from the ice to the stands behind players' benches and involved team officials and players who were not in uniform.

The game was called off by Glenn Johannessen, a Red Deer defenceman, was taken to hospital with a separated shoulder and a concussion.

Alf Gudman, owner of the Rufflers, needed six stitches to close a cut.

The fighting started when St. Albert players scented into the Red Deer end of the rink. A league director issued after a Nov. 12 meeting said players were to stay on their own side of centre ice during warm-ups.

Referee Bob Metzger said he was not sure if the 15 minutes and spread from the ice to the stands behind players' benches and involved team officials and players who were not in uniform.

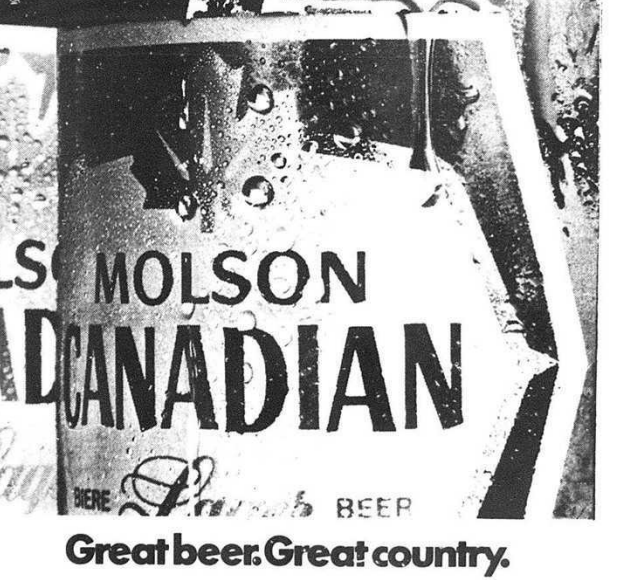
