

Canada and Russia sign sports exchange

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada and the Soviet Union have signed a sports exchange agreement under which Canadian athletes will compete in five different sports in the U.S.R. in 1980.

In return Soviet athletes will compete in five events in this country next year.

The agreement, the seventh since the two countries agreed to cooperate in sport in 1973, is over and above Canadian participation in the 1980 Moscow Olympics.

Canadian athletes will compete in freestyle wrestling, gymnastics, hockey, figure skating and diving in the U.S.S.R. The Soviets will visit Canada for hockey, figure skating, swimming, diving and judo events.

The events for Soviet athletes in Canada are:
—Soviet Skate Canada in Calgary, 10 (10 persons).
—Soviet hockey teams to play Canadian

Amateur Hockey Association teams for 17 days in December (20 persons).
—Youth team swimming competitions in Vancouver Aug. 16-20 (30 persons).
—Dive Canada in Winnipeg April 26-27 (eight persons).

—World Cup judo matches, Quebec City Oct. 26-10 (persons).
Canadian athletes will compete in the following competitions in the U.S.S.R.:

—Wrestling free style in the Tbilisi international competition Jan. 25-27 (four persons).
—Moscow international gymnastics March 30-April 1 (six persons).

—Riga international gymnastics April 3-5 (six persons).
—Minsk international diving competition March 15-16 (five persons).
—Moscow Javelin Cup hockey tourney, Dec. 14-23 (30 persons).

Grumbling highlights baseball meeting

TORONTO (CP) — Montreal Expos and Atlanta Braves have a happy, but most major league ball clubs grumbling, if they had any votes left.

There was plenty of talking but very little action during baseball's annual week-long winter meetings.

Most clubs arrived hoping to secure major league contracts for the 1980 season. However, only 11 deals involving players were made.

But just as well have stayed home," said general manager Spec Richardson of San Francisco Giants.

That summed up the feelings of most observers. A wave of money was wasted. Even with interleague trading, the wheels grinded to a near-halt, with the least productive winter meeting in memory.

At least half of the major league clubs packed up and headed home early Friday. Everyone agreed on one thing: intricate contracts with special clauses, many under the agreement with the player's union, prevented possible deals.

Four free agents were signed from the re-entry draft, began in 1978 and a matter club owners plan to fight to extract drastic changes in negotiations for a new basic agreement before spring training.

Signed as free agents were southpaw pitcher Fred Norman and outfielder Rowland Fowler by the Expos; shortstop Fred Patek by California Angels and outfielder Jay Johnstone by Los Angeles Dodgers.

The Expos, Bravs, Texas Rangers, St. Louis Cardinals, Cleveland Indians and even Philadelphia Phillies led the league in late contracts, even though the Phils came up empty-handed in the last hour.

The Expos' general manager, acquiring outfielder Ron LeFlore from the Tigers in a swap for the Expos' Dan Schatzeder, a 26-year-old considered one of the top young left-handers in baseball.

Loaded with outfield talent the Expos still elected to gamble on LeFlore, a 30-year-old hitter who stole 78 bases this year. He is eligible to become a free agent next year.

John McHale, president and general manager, whose team finished second in the World Series champion Pittsburgh Pirates in the National League East, said LeFlore is expected to start in center field. Regular center fielder Andre Dawson probably will move to left and Warren Cromartie to first base as a replacement for Tony Perez, lost via free agency to Boston Red Sox.

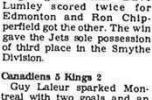
