MONTREAL (CP) — Centre Marcel Dionne of Los Angeles Kings holds a 14-point lead over right winger Guy Lafleur of Montreal Canadiens after the National Hockey League scoring race, statistics released Monday show.

Dionne has 66 goals and a league-leading 141 assists for 207 points, while Lafleur, who has 44 goals and 62 assists for 106 points.

Three points behind in third place is centre Wayne Gretzky of Edmonton Oilers, who has 35 goals and 68 assists.

Dave Taylor, Dionne's and St. Louis' right winger, is sixth with 85 points, including 34 goals.

FIFES WINNERS

Right winger Danny Gare of Buffalo Sabres leads in game-winning goals with eight, while centre Terry Ruskowski of Chicago Black Hawks is top in tying goals with four.

Simmer has 17 power-play goals to lead that category, and right winger Mike Murphy of Los Angeles, right winger Reggie Leach and centre Rick MacLeish of Philadelphia Flyers and centre Larry Patey of St. Louis were tied with three short-handed goals each before the Blues' game Monday night against Pittsburgh Penguins.

Tony Esposito of Chicago leads NHL goalenders in shutouts with six and victories with 27, while Jim Craig of Atlanta Flames has the best personal goals-against average at 1.00 after making his debut Saturday night against Colorado Rockies.

Among goalies with at least 800 minutes played, Bob Saver of Buffalo has the best average at 2.38.

Montreal has the most power play, having scored 66 goals in 211 man-advantage situations for a scoring percentage of 3.1. Los Angeles, with 72 goals in 235 chances, is next at 28.2 per cent, and New York Rangers, with 54 goals in 237 opportunities, are third at 27.0.

The Kings' 72 power-play goals lead the league.

TO ROBITAILLE

Vancouver Canucks must pay \$400,000

ROBITAILLE (CP) — Vancouver Hockey Club was ordered Monday in British Columbia Supreme Court to pay 100 per cent of the \$400,000 judgment won earlier by Seattle's Mike Robitaille of the National Hockey League.

The hockey club is appealing the judgment and resisted the application to pay the judgment.

"It seems to me to be patently unfair and unjust for the defendant to have the use of the plaintiff's money pending appeal," said Justice Patricia Proudfoot.

She ordered that the amount of money involved, which she said was in excess of \$400,000, be paid into court so that the interest could accrue to Robitaille.

The order provides that the interest can be paid out to Robitaille upon his filing a bank letter of credit to reimburse the hockey club. The appeal should be successful.

Robitaille was awarded judgment for \$347,840 in December when Mr. Justice W.A. Evans of the B.C. Supreme Court ruled that the hockey club was negligent in ignoring Robitaille's complaint of injuries three years ago.

REDUCED AWARD

The judge ruled that Robitaille's 200-cent blame for his own misfortune and reduced his total award of \$435,000 to that amount.

Justice Proudfoot followed an earlier decision by the B.C. Court of Appeal in 1977, in a game here against Pittsburgh Penguins. Mr. Justice Evans ruled that a bodycheck to Robitaille by Pittsburgh's Dennis Okechar caused an earlier injury and caused permanent spinal cord damage, leaving the player permanently disabled.

Robitaille now 31, hasn't played since he suffered a spinal cord injury Jan. 19, 1977, in a game here against Pittsburgh Penguins. Mr. Justice Evans ruled that a bodycheck to Robitaille by Pittsburgh's Dennis Okechar caused an earlier injury and caused permanent spinal cord damage, leaving the player permanently disabled.

Robitaille now is a resident of East Amherst, N.J.

Another Olympic star signs NHL contract

NEW YORK (AP) — David Silk was smiling when he signed a telephone call ended. He had been speaking with Phil Haulton, one of his former New York Ranger team-mates.

"I can't believe this," said Silk, who Monday became the seventh member of the U.S. Olympic team to sign with the National Hockey League club.

"He made me feel so at home."

Home for Silk is Scituate, Mass. Boston Bruin territory is worse.

"The Boston Bruins had more than their chance to draft me and make me a part of their hockey club, but they saw fit that they didn't want to draft me," said the right winger, 22, a cousin of Bruins' defenceman Mike Milbury.

"The New York Rangers gave me the chance to try to play hockey and they got it done. I've become a New York Ranger all the way."

The Rangers made the former Boston University star their fourth-round selection in the 1978 draft. Assistant coach Mike Nykoluk said Monday night team management would decide after this morning's workout, whether Silk would join the Rangers for their first Wednesday night game against Buffalo Sabres.

"He'll play Wednesday," said Nykoluk. "We'll have to take a good look at him in practice to see what we're going to do."

Hull cited for conflict

TORONTO (CP) — John Ziegler, president of the National Hockey League, said Monday he is investigating a potential conflict of interest in Bobby Hull's playing for Hartford Whalers while retaining 12.5 per cent ownership of Winnipeg Jets.

Hull, 41, is expected to play his first NHL game in three months Saturday night when Hartford visits Washington to face the Capitals. He came out of retirement to join the Jets at the start of this season after injuring his shoulder. The Jets traded him to the Whalers last week.

"What the league must determine is whether the operations of the Winnipeg Jets are influenced in any manner by someone who is involved either directly or indirectly with another NHL franchise," Ziegler said. "It's the league's viewpoint that an individual can't have this type of influence over two franchises."

"This is a unique situation, we must address. We have never encountered a similar situation involving a player. It may be that Mr. Hull will be forced to sell, or at least entrust, his share in the Jets while he plays in Hartford."

Hull has never taken an active role in running the Winnipeg club. His investment in the Jets is worth as much as \$1 million.

Michael Gubny, Jets' president and part-owner, said it is unlikely the league would take any action this late in the 1979-80 season.
