Junior team is ready to roll



Local businessman Hank Aarsen has been named general manager of Vernon's new entry in the British Columbia Junior Hockey League.

After a one-year absence from the BCHJHL, a Vernon group headed by Aarsen and Vern Dye, was recently granted a league franchise. Aarsen announced Russ Newton, 29, will coach the club. Newton, who coached a Vernon minor hockey team last year, played for the junior hockey in New Brunswick. The new GM said he also plans to name two assistant coaches in the near future.

Aarsen told the Daily News his group is determined to make the franchise a success. He said, "We know the previous owners experienced financial trouble. We're starting with a clean slate and we plan to keep it that way." CUT BUDGET In an effort to get the team on its feet, Aarsen has done some budget trimming. The 1980-81 operating budget will be between \$35,000 and \$40,000.

The club, as yet unnamed, will play 28 home games. Season tickets are scheduled to go on sale later this week. In an effort to create interest in the team, Aarsen has set up a series of meetings where players and parents can meet Newton and himself. First of those meetings will be Wednesday, in the Coldstream Hotel board room, from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

On July 10, Eddy's Cycle Sixty-Eight will be the site of a second meeting from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. and on July 11, a third meeting will be held, from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m., at the Salmon Arm Motor Inn. DRYLAND TRAINING A dryland training program will run from Aug. 18 to Sept. 6. Training camp for North Okanagan players only, will run from Sept. 8 to 12. And an open camp is scheduled from Sept. 14 to 18.

An entry fee of \$20 will be charged for each player attending the camp. However, those who make the club will be reimbursed. "We're going to emphasize entertaining hockey, with the emphasis on local players and the absence of goon tactics."

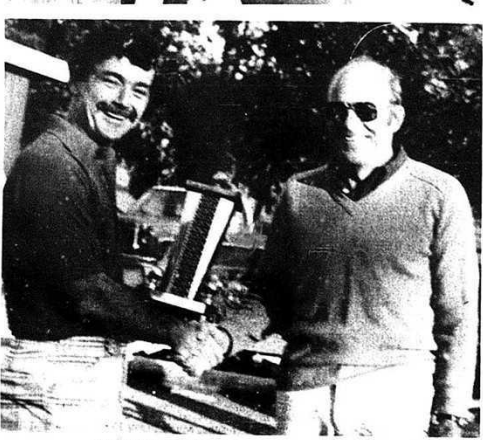
