Lakers land top prospect

Vernon Lakers, of the B.C. Junior Hockey League, landed a good one this week. Lakers' General Manager Hank Aarssen announced his team has signed right wing Bruce Dougherty, from Slocan. Dougherty started with the Enderby juvenile last season.

Aarssen said, "I've been talking to Bruce for a couple months and he made up his mind this week. He attended our first workout on Monday."

At least two other BCJHL teams were actively pursuing the high-scoring forward.

Meanwhile, the status of 20-year-old John Need appears uncertain. Need has indicated he will play for Lakers if he is unable to land a pro contract. He has been invited to a rookie camp by Washington Capitals, of the National Hockey League.

Last year, the slick center led Seattle Breakers, of the Western League, in scoring with 97 points. In the 1978-79 season, he collected 112 points with the Vernon junior club.

Lakers have started dryland training, with the on-ice training camp scheduled to get under way Sept. 2.

The club will be on the ice 11 consecutive days prior to an intra-squad game Sept. 13.

Two exhibition games with Revelstoke Bruins are scheduled. Lakers travel to Revelstoke on Sept. 14, then host the Bruins on Sept. 16.

The BCJHL regular season begins Sept. 19 when Lakers travel to Penticton. Penticton pays a return visit to Vernon for the Lakers' home opener Sept. 21.

Two young Vernon tennis players suffered disappointment Thursday, in the consolation round of the Canadian Junior Tennis Championships being held in West Vancouver.

team won their games but the men lost.

Moss admitted that extracurricular activity affected their play, as the English visitors got their first taste of B.C.'s "wild west" living.

"We had a great time," he chuckled.

Following the Vernon stopover, the Pioneers move on to play in Vancouver then it's back home to Fortmouth.

Moss said volleyball is gaining popularity in England, and he has a lot of respect for Canadian talent.

"We come out here and find kids four years younger playing better volleyball," he said, adding that the teams will be taking back some of the hints they've learned.

He said most Pioneer members are physical education teachers, so the information will be passed on to students at Fortmouth.

"This will help to increase our standards."

Moss would like to see Vernon players involved with exchange visits and he praised the friendliness of the people the visitors have met in both Williams Lake and Vernon.

"We want to say thanks for their kindness and hospitality," Moss said.
