

Vernon hopes to end slump

Vernon Lakers hope to end a five-game losing streak tonight, in Revelstoke, when they battle the Rockets in B.C. Junior Hockey League action.

On Sunday, Lakers host Penitick Knights, at 7 p.m.

Since splitting the first two games of the season with Penitick, Lakers are winless.

Vernon will have two new

forwards in the line-up tonight. Centre Dean Hascari will play between Bruce Dougherty and Kevin Balfour.

Hascari scored 28 goals in the Vernon junior team in 1978-79. Last year he played with the Nakusp juvenile reps and he started this season with Revelstoke.

The new newcomer is big winger Brian Amies, from

Smithers. Amies will patrol the right side with centre Dave Fish and Darryl Horn.

WILL HELP

Vernon Coach Russ Newton said, "I know Hascari will help us and we want to take a good look at Amies. We'll use four forward lines tonight and see how it goes."

Lakers will be without Earl Smith, who is suspended for

two games; and defenceman Mike Wiebe, who has an injured wrist.

Newton plans to start Jim Ballin in goal tonight, with Darren Zupp getting his first start at home, on Sunday. It appears goalie Rex Silank and the Lakers have parted company.

It has become evident to us, Rex doesn't want to play hockey here," Newton said.

"We haven't been able to trade him so the only option we have is to release him."

In BCHL action Friday night, Revelstoke dumped Kelowna Buckaroos 10-8. Penitick downed the visiting Merritt Centennials 7-5, and Nanaimo Clippers beat Vancouver Blue Hawks 3-1.

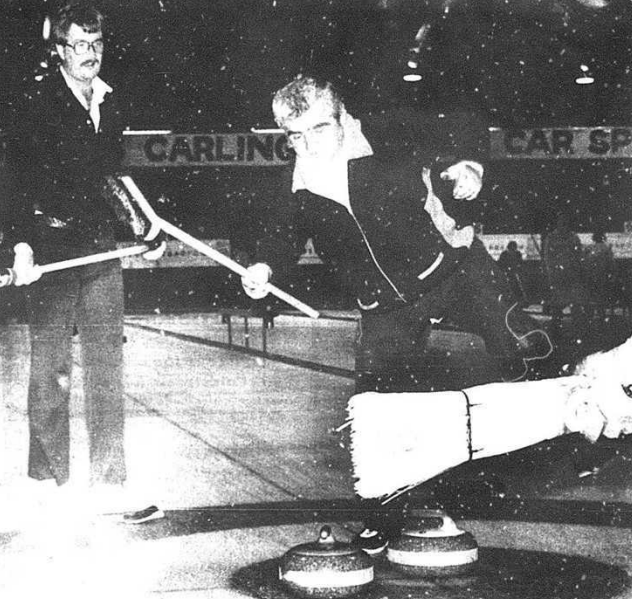

Sharp decline in grouse shot

Grouse hunters, in the B.C. Interior, are not enjoying the same success they experienced in 1979.

Statistics released this week by the Cache Creek Checking Station, operated by the Fish and Wildlife Branch, show the number of grouse reported is down 53 per cent this year.

To date, 278 grouse have gone through the station compared with 482 for the same period last year.

"There is an increase in several other animals harvested, which has gone from 85 to 145.

Other species that have shown an increase include: moose 23 to 351, goats 13 to 15, black bear 21 to 67, and grizzly bear 5 to 7.

Species that have decreased include: caribou 20 to 18, elk 25

Zoning By-Law No. 176 and Public Hearing

Zoning By-law No. 176 is a comprehensive by-law regulating the use of land, the size, shape and siting of buildings and structures, and off-street parking requirements. This By-law is intended to replace the current zoning regulations and affects every parcel of land in those areas of the Regional District outside the District of Peachland and the City of Kelowna.

Pursuant to Section 720 of the MUNICIPAL ACT the Public Hearing on the proposed new Regional District Zoning By-law No. 176 will convene on TUESDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1980 at 7:30 P.M. and WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 22, 1980 at 7:30 P.M. in the PARKINSON RECREATION COMPLEX, 1300 Parkinson Way, Kelowna, B.C.

All persons who believe their interests in property to be affected by the proposed by-law shall be afforded an opportunity to be heard. Submissions for consideration at the Public Hearing may be made in writing prior to the Hearing or in person at the Hearing. If necessary, the Hearing may be adjourned from time to time.
