In the other game played, Kelowna Price and Marikie Packers scored an upset 5-1 victory over reigning Canadian Intermediate "A" champion Burnaby Lakers.

The Cougars, in their match-up, jumped off to a 4-0 first period lead with Caldwell opening the scoring at 5:43. Subsequent goals were scored by Dave Schneider, at 10:02 by Terry Lowe, at 16:08, and Greg Walmsley who put his away with 30 seconds remaining in the period.

First star of the game was Caldwell, who was awarded a trophy.

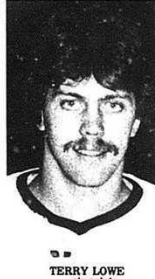
In Kelowna, Burnaby match-up, the interior squad got off to a fast 3-0 start against the Lakers, but Burnaby tied the score after the end of two periods.

KENDALL'S KORNER

Tassie ready for big race

It was a warm day in May, 1979, when I first saw Jane Tassie, run.

The Okanagan Relays were being held at Polson Park and the featured race was the Daily News Metric Mile. As expected, Mark Logan of Summerland easily won the boys' event.

Three runners, including two from the Coast, were considered the ones to beat in the girls' race. As the first lap was completed, a short girl from Kalamalka Junior Secondary took the lead. Few people recognized her, and most coaches expected her to falter in the final stages.

FIRST WIN

However, she maintained the lead and actually got stronger as the race progressed. Jane Tassie had won her first major race.

Okanagan Relays, Chairman Greg Fraser, who knows more about track and field in the valley than anyone, admitted he was surprised.

"I knew Jane was a good runner," he said. "But I didn't know she was this good."

Tassie, just in grade 10, had beaten some of the top grade 11 and 12 runners in the province is now recognized as one of the top distance runners in B.C. and is still improving.

WON TWICE

Tassie has won the Okanagan Relays two consecutive years and is a good bet to make it three straight next spring. The Okanagan cross-country title twice, and countless other races.

One of the biggest races in her career is just one week away, and she is ready. The B.C. Cross-Country Championship is scheduled next Saturday at Vancouver's Stanley Park.

"At the valley final (last Tuesday), I felt great. I had no stiffness and I ran well. It was a real morale builder," she said.

HIP INJURY

Tassie has been hampered by a hip injury for the past several months. Although it still hurts when she runs uphill, most of the discomfort is behind her now.

She credits three people with getting her ready for the provincial meet. Coach Jack Yamaoka helped her with the injury and training; Fraser helped her plan strategy; and teammate Bob Fitzsimmons runs with her.

"When you run alone, you tend to slant," she said. "Running with Bob, I know I have to be at my best to keep up with him."

Her training includes 4-6 mile runs as well as interval sprints.

At the recent Dairyland Race, in Vancouver, Tassie placed third behind the two top-rated runners in the province, from Abbotsford. She was up 15 seconds behind first-place Marcia Rempel.

FLAT COURSE

"I think I can beat Marcia," Tassie said. "Sixteen seconds isn't much to worry about pain going uphill."

In the years of training in rain and snow, with injuries, is behind her now.

It appears she is now ready, mentally and physically, for the culmination of her high school athletic career.

Canucks drop Minesota

VANCOUVER (CP) — Advancing scouting and videotape coverage are paying off for Vancouver Canucks. In their National Hockey League season.

The Canucks relied on both Friday night when they defeated the Minnesota North Stars 2-1 for their sixth straight win of the season at the Pacific Coliseum. In the other game, Edmonton Oilers defeated Winnipeg Jets 4-2.

Our pre-scouting reports and videotape helped immensely," said coach Harry Neale of the Canucks. "We got a good scouting report from Jack McCartan on the North Stars and their power play.

"We played our wingers up a little higher in our end and it helped us get the puck out. The video also helps because they didn't fool us with anything they

hoping one of our guys would be there for the rebound."

SMYL ACCURATE

There were no rebounds, however, and Smyl hit the far corner twice on Minnesota netminder, Michele Melrose.

Goalkeeper Richard Brodeur of the Canucks, making his ninth straight start in place of injured Glen Hanlon, was brilliant in the net and did not allow Vancouver to score after a 4-1 lead.

"I feel great playing so many games like this and I just want to keep playing every game," he said. "That's the job of the goalie, to play every night if necessary."

The loss was only the second of the season for the North Stars and left them two points back of leading Buffalo Sabres in the Adams Division.

The Canucks are looking to close to within one point of first place St. Louis Blues in the Smythe Division.

"We didn't get going until late in the game and that's not good," said McCarthy. "We need more intensity in the first 30 minutes of the game."

"Vancouver took advantage of their chances, got a 3-1 lead, and were good enough to hold on."

STRIKE QUICKLY

The Canucks' third-period goals by left winger Don Ashby and defenceman Lee Fogelin 14 seconds apart sparked Edmonton past the Jets.

Watt Hagman and Pat Price also scored for Edmonton while Hally Lindstrom and Dave Christian replied for the Jets before 12,744 fans.

The goal for Ashby was his first of the year after being recalled Thursday from Wichita of the Central Hockey League. Fogelin blasted a shot from just inside the blue line and the puck deflected into the net off the stick of goalie Lindsay Middlebrook for a 1-1 tie.

Price opened the scoring for Edmonton and Hagman made it 2-0 when he beat Middlebrook with a 25-foot screened shot.

Winnipeg did not score until 5:48 of the second period on Lindstrom's shot and Christian closed the gap to 4-2 on a power play with 10 minutes remaining.



Ken Norton a fortune

Norton wins decision

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Former heavyweight boxing champion Ken Norton, fighting on his insistence, won a close split decision Friday night over a younger, bigger and previously undefeated Randall (Tex) Cobb.

Norton, wobbly and exhausted from countering Cobb's left jab, barely stumbled in his corner at the end of the ninth round.

But he summoned enough strength to batter the equally tired and lumbering Cobb with a series of uppercuts in the centre of the ring to capture the final rounds in a match.

Referee Tony Perez of New York scored the match 97-94 for Norton, Judge Spivey of Dallas saw it 95-95 for Cobb and Judge Chuck Hassett of Norton's hometown of Los Angeles cast the deciding 96-95 for Norton.

Norton, 38, came out of a 16-month retirement with 33 pounds to enter the ring at a firm 218, while Cobb, 24, of Alamo, Tex., was a healthy 200.

The younger fighter was in command of the first three rounds, pounded out a close 10-9 round, but Norton's face at will while the older fighter sought the ropes and attempted to cover up.

LACKS SPEED

Cobb appeared to have Norton, the former World Boxing Association champion, in trouble but lacked the speed to land consecutive lefts and rights to the dodging veteran.

Norton, his left eye already swelling, began using his boxing skill and speed in the fourth round, knocking between Cobb's upraised gloves with a series of scoring counter punches.

In that round, Norton landed his only direct blow and caused a trickle of blood to drip from Cobb's nose.

"I never really got a good shot," Norton said. "He kept me off balance with his left jab."

"A year and a half layoff really hurts. I didn't have as much left as I thought I would."

Norton said he knew the fight was dead even going into the final round and realized he had to have a superior effort to sway the judges' final decision.

'ONE OF THOSE THINGS'

Cobb, a former football player and karate expert who had hoped for a title fight in 1981 after knocking out his first first 17 opponents, came into his dressing room laughing after the fight and told his supporters: "Hey man, it's just one of those things."

Norton said he planned to take off about 10 days and then return to training to continue a career he interrupted in 1979 because he said his poor conditioning might lead to him being injured in the ring.

In the middle rounds, Cobb was seen talking to Norton and the winner said later that he apologized for catching him in the eye with a thumb.

Weather system could drop snow on West final

WINNIPEG (CP) — A weather system moving east over Manitoba could leave up to eight centimetres of snow on the field at Winnipeg Stadium for Sunday's Western Football Conference semi-final between Calgary Stampeders and the hometown Blue Bombers.

Fans tough enough to brave over Manitoba could be cheering under cloudy skies with the temperature not expected to exceed minus three degrees. Vancouver is also expected, along with continuing light snow.

Miami Dolphins and Los Angeles Rams both have quarterback problems.

The Dolphins' problem is that none of their three quarterbacks Bob Griese, Don Strick and David Woodley seems able to get the team untracked. The Rams' problem is that Vince Ferragamo, currently on the bench and passing in the National Football League, feels he should be getting a lot more money for the job he's doing.

The teams, headed in opposite directions, meet Sunday in Anaheim, Calif. Sunday's other games are Philadelphia at New Orleans, Dallas at New York Giants, Cleveland at Baltimore, Detroit at Minnesota, Cincinnati at Oakland, Denver at San Diego, Pittsburgh at Tampa Bay, Washington at Chicago, San Francisco vs Green Bay, Milwaukee, Atlanta at St. Louis, Buffalo at New York Jets and Kansas City at Seattle. Monday night's game is New England at Houston.

All of Miami's quart-backs have been hot and cold this year. When he's been a starter, Griese has been semi-effective. But as

a reliever, coming off the bench as a late-game savior, he's been excellent. As of late, he's been bruised and has lost his starting job to Woodley, a rookie who was so impressive in training camp that coach Don Shula traded Guy Benjamin to New Orleans.

Woodley, too, has been erratic.

"Although we haven't been able to put points on the board, he has done some things well," Shula said. "I'll try to give him more help."

More help is what Griese thinks is order.

"I go in and the offence doesn't work. If Strick goes in and the offence doesn't work, and if Woodley goes in and the offence doesn't work, then maybe it's not the quarterback's fault."

MAKES NOISES

Ferragamo, meanwhile, is far below the par of the league's top-flight quarterbacks and wants his contract renegotiated. He has said no, and Ferragamo has made noises about looking for work elsewhere if his demands

aren't met. One report even had him saying he wouldn't accept it in the playoffs if his contract dispute wasn't settled.

Despite the trouble, Ferragamo, an early-season replacement for injured Pat Haden, has been good for the job. Just as he did it last year when he started late in the campaign and guided the Rams into the Super Bowl. He threw five touchdown passes, tying a club record, against New Orleans in a 45-31 victory last Sunday as Los Angeles remained tied with Atlanta atop the National Conference West.
