Welcome to 1981! It looks like a very busy year ahead for horse people and many exciting things have been happening already.

AUCTION WITH A DIFFERENCE

Most people are familiar with the normal horse auctions but not too many are aware of the mechanics of a stallion service auction to here goes!

From the stallion owner's point of view, these auctions are an opportunity for him to let the public know about his stallion. He has the opportunity to show him off and talk to visitors.

In order to enter an auction, which is generally sponsored by a horse club, he agrees to bring the stallion to the auction where one stud service will be auctioned off for that horse. It is agreed that the stud fee will not be auctioned off from any less than half the normal stud fee. The proceeds from this will then be split half and half between the stallion owner and the club. The bidder must pay for the service that day.

The mare owner who wishes to breed has the opportunity to stallion service auction, to view a good selection of different breeds and to discuss their ideas. There is also the added advantage of being able to obtain the stallion for a greatly reduced rate!

The club, for its part, agrees to make all the arrangements for the sale - securing the site, auctioneer, organizing helpers, selecting the stallions, producing the catalogue, promotion and advertising. In all, it is an ambitious venture and of benefit to all.

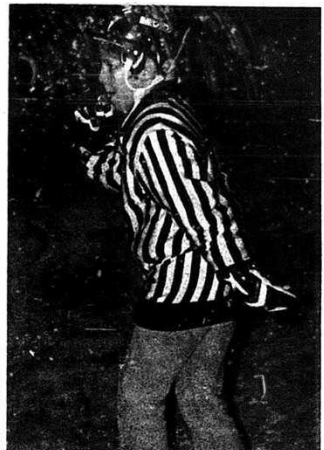
Kamloops opened up a first period lead of 1-0 before Vernon turned it around in the second to lead 2-2.

The challenging job of refereeing is being tackled by several youngsters in Vernon's minor hockey system.

To become a "carded" referee requires successfully completing clinics which are held annually for the six referee levels.

FINIMORE STRESSES THAT merely achieving certain levels does not necessarily make a good ref.

"We've had level one (the lowest) referees at juvenile games and they've done a good job. It depends on their ability to control the game, and their judgment."

He said the six levels are set by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, to provide uniformity in each province. Many new refs begin as linesmen, to gain confidence, but they advance at their own individual pace. Their advancement is decided upon by the more experienced officials.
