Hockey weekend



Vancouver Canucks must rate as one of the biggest surprises so far in the 1980-81 National Hockey League season. You'll get a chance to see Canucks live (March 13 and 14 on a Daily News Sports Weekend).

Vancouver hosts Chicago Black Hawks Friday (March 13). The following day, Danny Gare leads the Buffalo Sabres into the Pacific Coliseum.

With only six games remaining after that weekend, those matches could be crucial in Vancouver's final placing.

Total cost of the trip is \$378 per person. That price includes return airfare from Kelowna to Vancouver via Pacific Western Airlines, two nights accommodation at the Sheraton Lonsdale Park Hotel, game tickets, transportation in Vancouver, and refreshments.

JOHNSTONE HOT

While on the ice of hockey, Vernon's contribution to the NHL, Eddie Johnstone, is red-hot.

Johnstone, who patrols right wing for New York Rangers, had two goals and an assist Sunday in New York's 5-3 loss to Toronto Maple Leafs.

Ed had only two goals in his first 25 games this season. Now he has 12 goals in 40 games. His assist Sunday, on Walter Tkaczak's goal, was his 100th NHL point.

Johnstone, known for his aggressive play, said he hasn't changed his style since catching fire. "There's no substitute for hard work," he said. "Hard work got me here and hard work will keep me here. That's how I get my chances."

456 fishermen enter Hatchery Fund Derby

A total of 456 people took part in the CKAL Kalamalka Hatchery Fund Fishing Derby which ended Sunday.

Proceeds from the sale of derby memberships have been placed in a trust fund and will be made available to aid in the development of a natural fish hatchery program in Coldstream Creek.

Purpose of the hatchery and holding ponds will be for the rearing of Rainbow Trout and Lake Trout, to be released into Kalamalka and Okanagan Lakes. Fifty per cent of all Rainbow from the enhancement project will be released in each lake.

IN KALAMALKA
The Lake Trout will be placed in Kalamalka only. The last restocking of Lake Trout into Kalamalka was in 1978; and Rainbow have never been restocked

into the north end of Okanagan. Exact amount to be contributed to the program will not be known until a later date when all monies have been totaled.

More than \$5,000 in prizes were donated to the derby.

WEIGH-IN
Seymour Marina hosted the derby's weigh-in station, donated a major prize, hosted an open house for fishermen, and collected scale samples for the Fish and Wildlife Branch.

Largest Rainbow, or Lake Trout, was caught by Len Barry, of Armstrong. Barry's 22 pounds, 10 ounce fish earned him a 12-foot aluminum boat from Harbor Manufacturing, a four horse-power Eximide Motor from Vernon Marina, and a trophy donated by Fisher's Hardware.

Second largest fish was boated by

Doug Greenough, of Vernon. His 22 pounds, six ounce catch was worth return airfare for two to Vancouver (compliments Pacific Western Airlines), a weekend for two at Vancouver's Rembrandt Hotel, and a day of ocean fishing, for two, with Ted Peck.

Vernon's Peter Nickel landed the third largest fish of 21 pounds, 7 ounces. He won \$500 from the Vernon Fish and Game Club, and the Armstrong and District Fish and Game Club.

Tim Cleveley, of Vernon, won the draw prize... a 1981 Ski-doo, compliments Stai Marine and Leisure and NOCA Dairy. The ticket was drawn from a container with all derby registrations.

Fisher's Hardware, Sun Valley Sports, Star Marine, Armstrong Sporting Goods, and Tumora Sports (Enderby), served as ticket outlets.
