

# McCune eliminated

**VICTORIA (Special)** — Grant Barnes of Kelowna blasted Greg McCune of Vernon 9-3 in the deciding game of the provincial junior curling championships here Sunday.

**WON THREE:** Barnes will represent B.C. at the Canadian finals in St. John, N.B., from Feb. 15-21.

The Vernon foursome had won three consecutive games before losing twice to Barnes.

McCune beat Victoria 8-3, North Shore Winter Club 6-2, and Barnes 4-2.

The Kelowna team posted a 2-1 record in round-robin competition.

McCune needed only one win, in two playoff games against Barnes, to win the provincial title. In the first playoff meeting, McCune had an excellent opportunity to win the trip to New Brunswick.

McCune trailed 6-5 after nine ends, with last rock in the 10th. On his final shot, he

attempted to hit and stay in the four-foot circle, to count two. However, he bumped a guard, was wide, and lost 8-5.
