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Shirley breaks scoring record

National Hotel Raiders stretched their winning streak to five games with a 1-2 win over Lumby Flying Frenchmen in White Valley Hockey League action Saturday, at the Lumby Arena.

The 943 is the first Cat track loader to offer hydrostatic transmission, for infinitely variable travel speeds without gear shifting. This feature combined with less machine dead weight — plus a new 60 kW (80 hp) direct injected Cat 3204 diesel — makes the 943 highly fuel efficient. Under comparable conditions, it moves 20% more material per litre of fuel than the previous model!

Other improvements include 46% more breakout power and a 14% increase in static tipping load. As Will Terstra says: "I can back out of a hole, with a full bucket, without fear of the machine tipping forward. It's a much better balanced machine than the 941B!"
