

Flames thump Vancouver 11-2

CALGARY (CP) — Vancouver's Dave Williams didn't lose his sense of humor Tuesday night when the Canucks were burned 11-2 by Calgary Flames in a National Hockey League game.

Williams had a serious side in the post-game interview and, at one point, even questioned the strategy of Vancouver coach Harry Neale.

Williams said the decision to try and skate with the Flames was a "cardinal mistake" because "as far as I'm concerned, they have the superior players."

"We should have stayed with our game... pick up their wings and play a grinding game."

In other games, the scores were: Washington Capitals 4, Colorado Rockies 3, Detroit Red Wings 4, Hartford Whalers 4, Quebec Nordiques 6, New York Rangers 2.

Facing a 2-1 deficit after the first period, the Canucks decided to drop their close-checking style and, over the next 40 minutes, they paid the price as Calgary equalized its 1-1 tie goal production.

The colorful Williams described the last two periods as "the anti-giants of the dinosaurs."

STONING SURVIVOR — "Mostly, it was the survival of the fittest, because here we had two teams coming off long road trips," said Calgary assistant coach Pierre Page.

The loss was Vancouver's third in a row and the triumph was the Flames third straight, the first two of which came on the road.

Neale said neither strategy nor conditioning was the determining factor in the loss.

"We were mentally asleep and as far as that area of the game is concerned, it's a bad time of the season to be that in a National Hockey League game."

Lost in the shuffle of the highly-charged offence, Calgary also fired 11 goals against New York Islanders in a game here Feb. 25 — was the performance of Flames goalie Pat Riggin. He made 33 saves, 15 in the first period when the Canucks played well.

Meanwhile, Vancouver's goaltending — Glen Hanlon was replaced by Gary Bromley after two periods — sprang a leak, allowing 11 goals on only 33 shots.

Bob MacMillan scored three goals — the first came at 5:22 of the opening period on Calgary's first shot on goal — to lead the Flames to victory.

MacMillan scored twice for the Flames and Don Lever, Ken Houston, Kent Nilsson, Kevin Leswicki, Willie Plett and Guy Chouinard added singles.

Nilsson also had three assists in the game, which was the record of 73 — two more than MacMillan had in 1978-79.

Nilson's goal was his eighth of the season and the fifth he has scored this year while his team was short-handed.

The goal by MacDonald came only hours after he was acquired by the Canucks from Edmonton in a four-player trade.

Penitence led 2-1 after one period and 5-2 after two. Bruno Campese made 38 saves for the winners, while losing goalie Randy Kirby stopped 33.

Penitence meets the winner of the Kelowna-Merritt series in the division final.

At Kelowna, Paul Houck scored twice for the Buckaroos, while Ken Filbey, Pat Cullen, Mike Sturgeon, Glenn McRae and Earl Smith added singles.

Scoring for Merritt were Roly Lundquist, Rick Norberg, Allan Kerr and Paul Herron.

The teams were tied 1-1 at the end of the first period, but Kelowna pulled ahead 5-4 after two.

Mike Matsonneuve made 39 saves in goal for Kelowna while Karl Laundry stopped 33.

League play resumes tonight with Merritt at Kelowna.

14 teams trade prior to deadline

Veteran performers Glenn Resch, Michel Larocque, Richard Martin, Don Luce, Jim Rutherford and Garry Unger all have new homes today following frantic wheeling and dealing Tuesday as the National Hockey League's trading deadline passed.

Fourteen of the league's 21 teams seized the opportunity to either strengthen their rosters for the impending playoffs or build for the seasons to come.

Resch, a seven-year veteran netminder with New York Islanders, was shipped to Colorado Rockies along with centre Steve Tambellini for a defenceman Mike McEwen and goaltender Jari Kaarela.

Kaarela, 32, will report to Indianapolis Checkers of the International Hockey League and goalie Roland Melanson will take Resch's spot in the Islanders' lineup.

Resch appeared in 31 contests this season for the Islanders, posting a 3.14 goals-against average and a 17-5 win-loss-tied record.

Kaarela had played in five games for Colorado, earned two victories against two losses and had a 6.00 goals-against average.

Larocque, 28, of Hull, Quebec, his wish to be traded by Montreal Canadiens and was dispatched to Toronto Maple Leafs in return for defenceman Robert Picard and an unspecified late draft choice.

Unhappy with sharing the goaltending duties with Richard Sevigny, Denis Herron and Rick Wamsley, Larocque was said to be a "very, very happy" former member of the Canadiens by his agent Norm Caplan.

In 28 games this season Larocque posted a 3.03 goals-against average, one shutout and a 16-9-3 record.

Picard, a 23-year-old Montreal native, was acquired prior to the current season by Toronto from Washington Capitals in exchange for goalie Mike Palmateer. In 55 games with the Leafs he collected 25 points on nine goals and 16 assists.

Montreal also sent former U.S. Olympic team defenceman Bill Baker to Colorado for future considerations.

Martin, who had two 52-goal seasons with Buffalo Sabres and Luce, one of the league's premier penalty killers, were dealt to Los Angeles Kings for cash considerations.

A 23-year-old native of Verdun, Que., Martin was Buffalo's first choice and fifth overall in the 1971 amateur draft and had seven goals in 23 games with Buffalo this season and has been hampered by a knee injury.

"You don't like to part with a goal scorer, which he has been," said Buffalo general manager Scotty Bowman of Martin, "but we're in a bit of a youth movement..."

Martin could well find himself on Charlie Simmer's left wing beside Marcel Dionne and Dave Taylor following Simmer's leg fracture last week.

The Kings also picked up netminder Rutherford from Toronto, who became expendable after Larocque's acquisition.

Rutherford, who broke into the NHL with Detroit Red Wings in 1970-71, played in 15 games with Toronto this season and had a 4.99 goals-against average.

After 13 seasons in the NHL, Unger finally will get a chance to play for his hometown fans when he joins the Oilers at Edmonton. The durable centre was traded by the Kings for future considerations.

In other last-minute deals, Pittsburgh Penguins sent right winger Pat Hughes to the Oilers for defenceman Pat Price and the Merle Leafs acquired right winger Tom Zanussi and a third-round draft choice this year from Minnesota North Stars for Toronto's second-round selection in June.

Griffin asks to be traded

"Archie stopped in to see me two or three weeks ago and he did say he'd like to be traded," said Mike Brown, assistant general manager of the National Football League team.

Quebec foursome trounces Germany

MEGEVE, France (CP) — Denis Marchand's rink from Quebec-Rivieres, Que., stole four points Tuesday on its way to a 5-1 win over West Germany in the world junior curling championships.

The team's second win of the day and seventh straight left the Canadians alone atop the standings in the 10-country bonspiel.

In the first draw, Marchand and his crew beat defending champion Scotland 10-2.

With the win over West Germany, the Marchand rink is assured a playoff spot and should it win its two games today against Norway and Sweden, it would go directly into the final on Saturday.

After the seventh round, Canada is 7-4, the U.S. is second at 6-1, followed by Scotland and Sweden at 4-3, Switzerland, West Germany, Norway and Denmark 3-4 and France and Italy at 1-6.

In other games Tuesday, the U.S. rink from Seattle defeated Italy 8-3 and then won its sixth straight game 8-3 over Denmark.

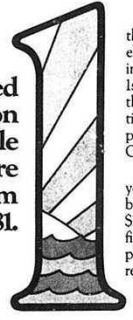
Earlier, Denmark defeated France 7-6. France also lost to Scotland 5-4.

Norway defeated Switzerland 7-6 and then lost 10-2 to Italy, which recorded its first win. West Germany upset Sweden 10-9 and Sweden beat Switzerland 9-5.
