

Valentine in dispute with his team-mates

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (CP) — Ellis Valentine is the angry young man at Montreal Expos spring training camp. The session was little more than a week's end when the 26-year-old right fielder and reporters he wanted to be traded because some of his team-mates were riding him unmercifully for having missed the last game of the 1980 National League baseball season with injuries.

Some team-mates hinted Valentine didn't try as hard as he might have to return in the stretch drive of the Expos' East Division title battle against Philadelphia Phillies.

"I've been the scapegoat here for five years," Valentine said recently, still smarting from the animosities I expected to hear those comments before I even got here.

"I can think of one player on this team — and I'm not going to name him — who injured several of his team-mates last year by wrestling and fouling around on the field and end up hurting other players physically."

Two rinks tied in mixed final

WINNIPEG (CP) — Ken Buchan's bid helped his rink from London, Ont., edge Saskatchewan's Rick Folk 8-6 Tuesday night and maintain a first place after eight rounds of play at the 42-annual Canadian mixed curling championship.

PLAYING STEADY "Team-wise, we've been fairly steady and consistent and I'm happy with my own shot," said Buchan, who led a steady one point in the fourth end and two in the fifth, forcing Folk into a come-from-behind situation.

Folk, who skipped the 1980 men's world curling championship rink, almost sent the game into an extra end when he attempted a tricky draw shot with Buchan having last shot. However, the draw was too heavy.

"I just had about five feet too much weight on the rock, otherwise it would have been okay," Folk said.

Buchan said his rink set a goal of defeating Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Buchan offered an 8-6 setback to Morken, but his rink has accomplished two-thirds of its goal. Earlier, Buchan edged Manitoba 4-4. Lang coasted to a 3-1 win over Desjardins. Lang led 4-0 after six ends over Desjardins.

Lang said: "We got the deuce on the third end and to come back is more difficult than to maintain a lead. Then a steal of one really put us into a good spot.

Jackson feuding with boss

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Claiming "I'm a walking keg of dynamite," New York Yankee superstar Reggie Jackson complained Tuesday his feud with club owner George Steinbrenner is bothering his play.

Jackson's comments came after an exhibition game incident involving the Yankee slugger and Atlanta Braves pitcher Al Hrabosky. Jackson wanted to catch a Hrabosky fastball with his bare hand after being hit by a bean ball.

"I can't hold in my feelings any more about Steinbrenner," Jackson told reporters later. "So much to want to have a confrontation with him that I can't wait for it to happen."

The two have not talked since Jackson went into Steinbrenner's doghouse by springing two days late at the start of spring training. Jackson wants to renegotiate his contract, which pays him \$1 million a year less than newly-acquired Dave Winfield makes. But Steinbrenner, upset by Jackson's interest, has delayed the negotiations.

"I'm tired of the whole situation," Jackson said. "It's affected my play."

On whether he had to be traded, he said, "I'm not going to say it."

Steinbrenner traces Jackson's feelings to "pressure he feels from Winfield's presence."

"I could have predicted it," he said. "Winfield has looked so good and you can see it in Reggie's actions."

SMYL SPEARED IN FACE

Canucks edge Penguins

VANCOUVER (CP) — The seamy side of professional hockey was exposed again Tuesday night in the National Hockey League.

This time it was a spearing incident during a 4-3 win by Vancouver Canucks over Pittsburgh Penguins which deflected from Jerry Butler's winning goal with less than three minutes to play.

In other games Tuesday, Buffalo Sabres topped Los Angeles Kings 3-1, Montreal Canadiens and New York Islanders tied 3-3 and Quebec Nordiques edged Detroit Red Wings 4-3.

Before Denis Moret penalties added 120 minutes in penalties as the Canucks in the face in the used his stick to spear Smyl.

The resulting melee was unpleasant as the Canucks, led by Smyl, wounded Rising to the ice while Vancouver defender Hanoi Sneypts wrestled with a linesman in a futile attempt to get his sticks in Rising's face.

The incident came just two days after Darryl Sittler of Toronto Maple Leafs was stabbed in the face by Philadelphia's Brian Propp during an altercation with Flyers playing-coach Bobby Clarke.

Coch Harry Neal of the Canucks, although happy with his team's third straight win, was angry about the numerous misconduct penalties to Vancouver players.

"The referees are giving out misconduct penalties this year like jelly beans," Neal said. "It just seems that they're automatic if they're light."

"Smyl was speared barbarically tonight and he and the rest of our guys after Rising more out of frustration than anything else," he said.

Rising and Smyl were both ejected from the game; Rising received a minor for roughing, major for fighting and match penalty for spearing with intent to injure, while Smyl got a minor for roughing, major for fighting and a game misconduct for spearing.

Sneypts got 22 minutes in penalties, including two for spearing, for not leaving the linesman, while seven other players were handed misconduct penalties for not leaving the fight scene.

NEALS OFFENCEMEN Neal found himself down to three defencemen when Sneypts and Kevin McCarthy were given misconducts.

"I could have shot myself for dressing just five defencemen tonight," said the coach. "We'll just have to find another one on our farm club at Dallas."

Pittsburgh coach Eddie Johnston was angry after Sneypts wasn't thrown out of the game.

"He misjudged an official and that's not showing much respect," said Johnston. "I've seen guys given three-game suspensions for less than that — that's a prime example of abuse on an official."

"Rising told me he got speared in the stomach and that wasn't called, so what else can I say about it (the incident)."

DENIED CLAIM Smyl claimed he didn't spear Rising and "all I saw was something coming off my face and I fell back."

"I was pretty upset after that and went after him," added Smyl. "But I can rightfully say

that I never speared him, not at all."

Butler's goal at 17:30 came against the run of play. Pittsburgh outshot Vancouver 15-7 in the last period and came at the expense of Pittsburgh defenceman Marc Chorney, playing his first NHL game.

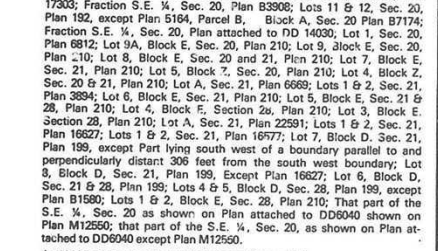

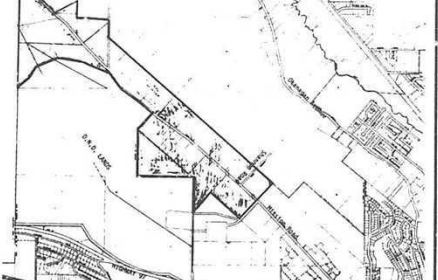
