## SAINTS LEAD JUNIOR SERIES

PENTICTON, B.C. (CP) — Brent Weller and Don Mercer scored goals less than two minutes apart in overtime Sunday to give St. Albert Saints a 5-win over Penticon Knights in the second game of their Centennial Cup Tier II Junior hockey series.

St. Albert, which won the opener Saturday night 8-5, now holds a 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven quarter-final. All Wednesday games, including the next one Wednesday, will be played at the Alberta community.

After a corseless opening period Sunday, St. Albert went into a 21-second period of advantage on goals by Dave Donnelly, Brad Hammel and John Reid. Lance Johnston tallied for Penticon.

The Knights forced the overtime with a pair of goals in the last five minutes of the final frame by Brent Gropp and Leroy Rempte, but the Saints got the jump in the 10-minute extra period with the goal by Mercer at 1:34 and Weller at 3:31.

Goal Pad-tac cut the margin to one 21 seconds after Weller's goal, but the Knights couldn't get the equalizer past Saints' goaltender Jeff Laspiwka who stopped 39 shots.

## Rockies looking for GM

DENVER (AP) — Colorado Rockies owner Peter Gilbert says he will begin looking immediately for a general manager following the resignation of Ray Miron.

Miron, the target of intense fan and media criticism as the Rockies' first manager, resigned after the team finished its 1980-81 season with a 5-3 tie with Los Angeles and a 22-43 record.

"It is my opinion that my own future in professional hockey and, hopefully, the success of the franchise can best be served by my decision," Miron said in a statement.

Gilbert said Miron had offered his resignation effectively May 1 and it was accepted. He said Miron's action was voluntary but added that the 38-year-old general manager had not resigned, he probably would have been fired.

"Ray Miron has done a personal job, and he has been responsible," said Gilbert. "But I do not believe that under the current circumstances he can act effectively, and Ray has consented."

"It was a mutual thing."
