

\$4,000 in prizes

FISHING DERBY will be held this weekend, regardless of weather.

About \$4,000 in prizes will be awarded to winners of 11 events plus trophies for largest rainbow, largest Kokanee, largest rainbow by a 15-year-old or younger, largest rainbow by a senior citizen, largest rainbow by a family team (Fathers Day Trophy), and largest fish by a team of four fishermen.

Sixteen prizes will be won by derby participants in open events and special events for largest fish registered during the derby. All prizes have been donated and proceeds from sale of derby tickets will go to restoration of Okanagan lake.

Derby tickets are \$5; and senior citizens and 15 year and under \$2. Participants must register prior to taking part in the derby.
