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Quarterback to miss game

VANCOUVER (CP) — Quarterback Roy Dewart of B.C. Lions has a slipped disc in his back and likely won't play Friday in Edmonton against the Eskimos, the Canadian Football League team said Tuesday.

Dewart has played just one quarter of football while the Lions have run up a 3-0 record in exhibition games.

Observers said Dewart was the most impressive of four B.C. quarterbacks in training camp, but missed a 20-12 win over Saskatchewan Roughriders because of a sore throwing shoulder.

Dewart played the fourth quarter on a 2-4 win over Calgary Stampeders, but missed a 20-18 decision over Winnipeg Blue Bombers here last Saturday.

He was injured last Friday while bending down after practice to tie his shoelace.

"He sure needs to play, but it doesn't look like Roy will be able to make the trip to Edmonton," said head coach Vic Rapp. "He saw the doctor, and has been told to rest for three or four days."

CAN'T PRACTICE

"He can attend meetings, but he can't go on the practice field," Rapp said.

Dewart is battling Mike Nott and Steve Psarikewicz for the second-string job behind starter Joe Pasqua, who has played half of all the exhibition games.

Rapp said that Nott and Psarikewicz both graded out about the same in the Edmonton game.

Defensive tackle Rick Gutzke and running back Don Taylor back, also are doubtful for the Edmonton game, but linebacker Ron Morehouse may get the green light.

14-year-old American enters the record book

LONDON (AP) — Kathy Rinaldi created Wimbledon history as tennis teenagers made their mark on the women's singles at the All-England championships.

Rinaldi, 14, had a 2 1/2-hour marathon before defeating Sue Rolinson of South Africa 6-3, 2-6, 9-7 Tuesday to become the youngest ever winner at Wimbledon.

Kathy's cool, calm approach in only her second tournament on grass captivated a full house on Court No. 2. The little American saved a match point at 5-6 in the final set before clawing her way to a gutsy victory.

"I thoroughly enjoyed myself," she said. "I didn't feel any pressure at all."

Rinaldi, who reached the quarter-finals of the French Open by defeating seeded players Dianne Fromholtz and Anne Smith, was joined in the second round at Wimbledon by a group of young compatriots.

They included comparative newcomers Tracy Austin and Andrea Jaeger, 18, and 17, respectively. Pam Casale, 17, and Mary Lou Piatek, 19.

Yet another teenage star, Susan Mascarin, 16, had a first-round bye and faces two-time champion Martina Navratilova in the second round.

Jaeger, who turned 16 earlier this month, was far too cautious for Nerida Gregory of Australia and cruised to a 6-1, 6-1 victory. Austin, seeded two places higher at No. 3, ousted Jennifer Mundel of South Africa 6-4, 6-2.

Piatek, the top junior the world two years ago, made an impact at Wimbledon for the first time by upsetting Sylvia Hanika of West Germany, the No. 9 seed, 6-4, 7-5.

The left-handed Hanika was one of three women's seeds to fall Tuesday.

Lucia Romanov of Romania ousted 15th-seeded Regina Mariskova of Czechoslovakia 5-7, 6-1, 6-3, while Pam Teeguarden of the United States downed her 16th-seeded compatriot, JoAnne Russell, 6-2, 6-7, 11-9.

The big guns all had straight-set victories.

Top-seeded Chris Evert Lloyd beat Chris O'Neil of Australia 6-3, 6-0 and then said, "I am in better form than last year."

Second-seeded Hana Mandlikova of Czechoslovakia defied doctors' orders to rest a back injury and ousted French junior Catherine Vanier, 12, 6-3, 7-5.

And fourth-seeded Navratilova defeated American Joyce Portman 6-1, 6-0.

Guillermo Vilas of Argentina, the No. 10 seed but essentially a clay court specialist, was upset in a men's singles match left over from Monday. Mark Edmondson, the big-serving former Australian Open champion who won a grass court tournament last week, defeated Vilas 6-4, 6-1, 1-6, 4-6, 6-3.

That left only 11 of the original 16 men's seeds remaining in contention.

NHL president to meet with Czech Federation

CHICAGO (CP) — John Ziegler, bound for Vienna this week to settle differences with the Czechoslovakian Ice Hockey Federation as to whether he has an agreement with that body, said Tuesday he doesn't believe the issue is the supreme test of his presidency of the National Hockey League.

"Somebody else might, but I don't see it that way," Ziegler said after a two-day NHL governors meeting that left him grappling with Vancouver Canucks signing of two Czechoslovakians selected by other clubs in a special draft.

"We've had a lot of problems, and at times when I've seen them I've thought, 'How in the hell are we going to work them out?'"

Ziegler said he will go to Vienna, site of a Canada Cup tournament meeting, to discuss the apparent agreement with the CIHF. The draft of four players followed Ziegler's announcement he had come to terms with the Czechoslovakian federation.

But the Canucks, upon hearing from the head of Czechoslovakia's foreign sports governing body that no agreement would be in effect next season, signed centre Ivan Hlinka and defenceman Jiri Bubla, taken first and third by Winnipeg Jets and Colorado Rockies, respectively.

A hearing Ziegler will hold with the Canucks, Jets and Rockies will have to wait until later.

McNabb stays with Clippers

NANAIMO, B.C. (CP) — Larry McNabb will return to coach Nanaimo Clippers for a ninth season in the B.C. Junior Hockey League in 1981-82, the club said Tuesday.

McNabb and partner Adrian Jacques, both of Nanaimo, recently sold the Tier Two team to Victoria businessman Ron Midgley and Gordon Rendle.

The Clippers completed their agreement with McNabb after lengthy negotiations and also announced that Ron Opheim will be back as assistant coach for a fourth season.

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
