The salmon (in its missing) (about one 1/40 are missing) and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans wants the head of the Chinook, which contains a one millimetre coded wire tag.

The tags recovered through the Voluntary Sport Head Recovery Program provide data on the migratory routes and exploitation of hatchery and other salmon. If the head is found to contain a tag, the angler's name is entered in one of the eight annual draws for a one \$500 prize and six \$50 prizes. ROSE TOP PLAYER. NEW YORK (AP) — Pete Rose of Philadelphia Phillies, who became the National League's all-time leader with his 3,611st hit on Aug. 10, was named NL player of the week for the period ended Sunday. Rose had nine hits last week and led the NL with 22 through Sunday's games. He also scored twice in a tie with the Texas Rangers on the all-time list for runs scored with 1,881.

PACIFIC NAME. NEW YORK (AP) — Tom Paciorek of Seattle Mariners, who had 15 hits to raise his batting average to a league-leading .341, was named Monday "the American League's player

of the week for the period ended Sunday. The all-star outfielder was 15-for-35 in leading the Mariners to a 2-0 record last week. He had six doubles, one triple, two homers, drove in 10 runs and scored eight.
