"Bob is a fantastic worker," Morden said. "He is completely dedicated to sports."

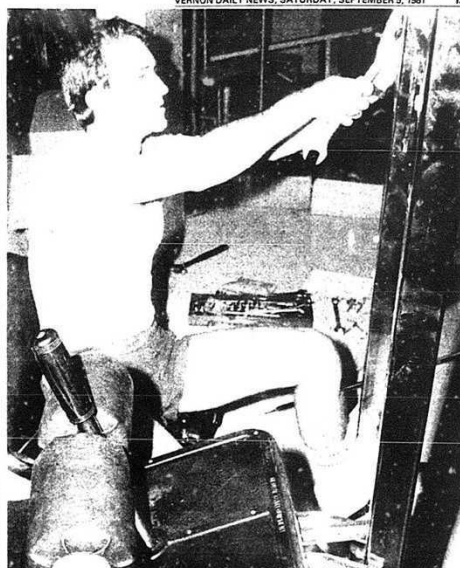
Collins will act as a liaison between the players and executive. His other duties will include supervision of minor officials and the day-to-day opera-

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Jaeger loses battle
of teenage tennis stars

NEW YORK (AP) — In the brave new world of teenage tennis stars, you expect a few tears now and then. Little girls are not expected to be philosophical.

Andrea Jaeger, the 16-year-old seeded second in the U.S. Open tennis championships, lost in the second round Friday to one of her old rivals, Andre Leand 17. But Jaeger was dry-eyed and looking ahead.

Leand looked like so many of Jaeger's opponents, a sure loser at 2-5 down in the second set, before carefully changing gears.

"I played each point as though it was the most important point of the match," she said.

Jaeger may have shed some tears in private, but quickly faced the press and offered this bit of wisdom:

"If life ends after the Open or after Wimbledon, then you're really hurting. There's tons more for me to do after this."

Jaeger, a right-hander, tore the rotator cuff of her right shoulder recently. She said that

it hurt her more Friday than in her first-round match, but added she did not lose because of it.

"She (Leand) didn't have any weaknesses," Jaeger said.

WILL START SCHOOL. Leand, from Brooklandville, Md., is an amateur and will start school at Princeton in 10 days. She won a gold medal in the Maccabiah Games in Israel.

With Jaeger out of the picture, the focus shifted more to the possibility of a Chris Evert-Lloyd-Tracy Austin clash.

Lloyd, the defending cham-

pion, beat Kate Latham 6-0, 6-1 on Friday. Austin, a former champion here and seeded third, downed Betsy Nagelsen 6-3, 6-0.

On Friday night, second-seeded Bjorn Borg advanced to the third round with a 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 victory over Larry Stefanki.

Vitas Gerulaitis, seeded 15th, defeated Alejandro Cortes of Colombia 7-5, 6-4, 6-1.

Earlier, fourth-seeded Jimmy Connors turned back the unexpectedly stiff challenge of Yugoslav's Marco Stosija, 7-6, 6-4, 6-3.

fun run next Saturday

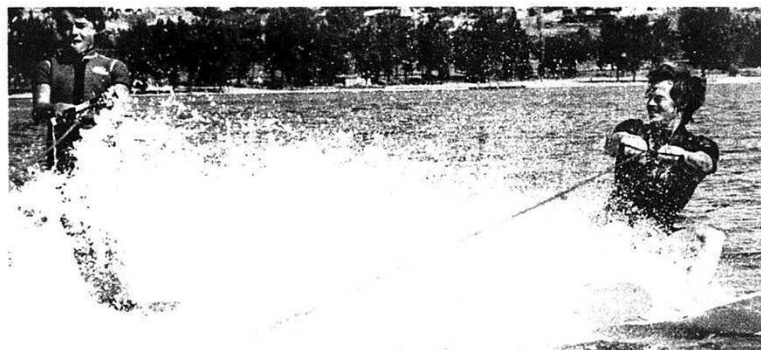
The Dairyland-IPE Fun Run is scheduled Sept. 12.
