

Lakers suffer loss in their season debut

Defending B.C. Junior Hockey League champion Penitence Knights blasted Vernon Lakers 7-1 Sunday, before 419 fans, at the Civic Arena.

Knights, who lost their season opener Friday to Revelstoke Rockets, served notice Sunday they aren't going to surrender their title without a battle.

Penitence dominated virtually every aspect of the game as the shots on goal, 44-16, indicate.

SCORED THREE
Brent Groppe scored three goals for Knights while Randy Maxwell and a Paul Anthony and went to Albert Anthony and Rick Trupp.

Vernon goal after Penitence had taken period leads of 3-0 and 4-0. Despite the lopsided score, Lakers' Director Monte Morden remains optimistic his club will be competitive in the near future.

"It takes some time to mold 20 hockey players into a team," Morden said, "because we've had so many boys trying out, we haven't really been able to work on powerplays, penalty killing, or any special plays."

Vernon Coach Grah MacBeth reduced his roster from 34 to 22 after a workout Saturday.

Morden said, "The boys are still getting used to each other, but I won't take long for them to come together as a team."

EXPERIENCE
Experience is one of the ingredients that makes Penitence a powerhouse. Knights have nine returnees, including several 19-year-olds.

Vernon had only four players with any previous BCHL experience in the line-up ... and no 19 or 20 year olds.

Knights were assessed 43 of 6 penalty minutes, including a game misconduct to 1st Boush.

Westside midjet graduate Shawn Oswald was between the pipes for Vernon and Al Hryniuk was in goal for Penitence.

Lakers return to the ice next Friday, at home, against Merritt Centennials.

GOAL POSTS
Vernon defenceman Tom Roy missed the game due to a one-game suspension handed to him after a fight during Friday's exhibition match with Prince George.

Also didn't play due to work commitments ... Vernon's tier one affiliate, Kamloops Oilers, were on an exhibition road trip over the weekend. Oilers are expected to assign about four players to Lakers this week.

The local junior club has sold 170 season tickets to date.

Rugby squad defeats Trail

Vernon clinched a playoff berth with a 14-12 win over Trail in Okanagan-Mainline Rugby Union action Sunday, at Kalamalka Junior Secondary School.

The win moves Vernon into a tie for third place with Trail. The local squad can take over sole possession of third spot with a win or tie, in its final outing, against first-place Kamloops, Thursday.

Vernon player-coach Stu Marshall called the victory a total team effort. "Everyone worked hard," he said. "The scrum had probably its best game as a unit."

The host club took a 14-0 lead at half-time and hung on for the victory. Bruce Townsend, Eugene Hampshire, and Jock McKinnon scored tries for the locals. Townsend also added a convert.

McKinnon, who plays back forward, and scrum-half Mike Potryna were standouts for the winners.

Marshall said, "We substituted with some of our inexperienced players in the second half and it showed. We made some mistakes we weren't making in the first half."

Placing third in the loop is important for Vernon because it would then meet second-place Kamloops, instead of powerful Kelowna, in the semi-finals. Thursday's game will be played at Kamloops.
