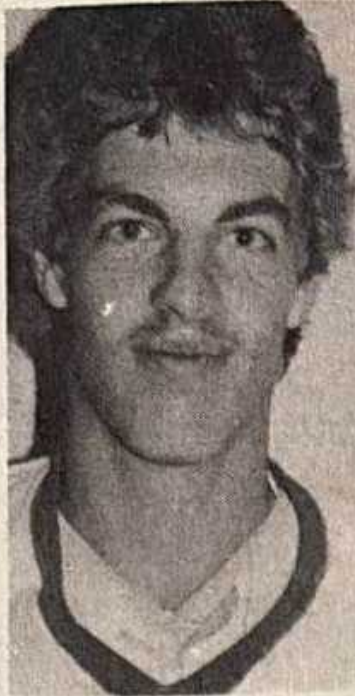

Four Lakers named as Interior all-stars

Four Vernon Lakers were selected to the BCJHL Interior Division's two all-star teams while Lakers' coach Mike Enemark will be the man behind the bench when the Interior players take to the ice Jan. 19, in Richmond.

Defenceman Gavin Shuya was the only Vernon player to make the first all-star team with Tony Savarin, of Penticton, the second defenceman chosen by league balloting.

Up front, Knights' Brett Hull will center Ron Bonora, of Revelstoke, and Rob Klenk, of Shuswap.

Goaltending duties will go to Ralph Bechtold, of Shuswap while Summerland's Mark Taylor was selected goaltender

for the Interior Division's second team.

Also on the second team squad are Vernon defenceman Ken MacKenzie and forwards Dave Wnsley and Rob Kossan.

Both Kossan and Shuya will be making their second appearances as players while Enemark will appear in his second all-star contest, as well, only last year the Lakers' coach was a player.

Rounding out the roster of the second team are defenceman Dale Reimer of Summerland, and Brent Demerais, of Merritt.

Despite putting four players on the two teams, Lakers' General Manager Carl Enemark was somewhat disappointed that more of his players weren't chosen.

"We're a first place club so I'm a little disappointed we didn't get more players chosen," said Enemark.

Meanwhile, Mike Enemark, as coach of the Interior lineup, will have the opportunity to select the remaining eight players to fill the roster.

"I'll have to talk it over with the rest of our coaching staff and we'll decide later today," said Enemark. "I'll have to pick up eight players including at least one from Revelstoke and one from Merritt."

Presently Enemark is considering Revelstoke's Mike Dickerman, a right winger, and Merritt defenceman Pat Seeley.

The Coastal Division all-star teams include five Nanaimo players and four from Langley.

Rangers help Lakers hang on to first place

Vernon Lakers managed to keep their hold on first place in the BCJHL Interior Division thanks to Revelstoke Rangers.

Rangers edged Penticton Knights 5-4, Sunday night, to give Penticton a 25-9 record, the same as

Lakers have after 34 games.

Knights have three games remaining before the Christmas break including one against Revelstoke and a home-and-home series with Shuswap Totems.

Lakers are idle until Dec. 28 when they travel to Summerland.

In other BCJHL action Sunday night, Summerland Buckaroos edged Shuswap 5-4, and Cowichan Capitals doubled Nanaimo Clippers 10-5

on the Coast.

Saturday night, Penticton trounced Summerland 12-3, and Revelstoke bombed Merritt 16-3 while on the Coast, it was Nanaimo over Langley 8-6, and Abbotsford over Burnaby 5-4.

In Salmon Arm, Doug Knowler scored twice for the Buckaroos and Campbell Blair, Brent Polischuk and Jim Perich added singles.

Henry Reimer got a pair for Shuswap while Albert Anthony and Vern Williams scored one each.

In Revelstoke, Gary Ruff scored two goals, including the winner at 13:35 of the third period to lead Rangers.

Guy Phillips, Craig Penner and Ron Bonora also scored for Rangers who led 3-1 after two periods. Rod Schluter, Mikael Jonsson, Aaron Scott and Cal Boyle replied for Penticton.

On Saturday in Summerland, Murray Winnicki scored four goals and set up two others to lead Penticton. Scott and Ian Kidd each scored twice for the winners while Greg Cyr, Tom Benson and Jamie Nichols replied for the Bucks.

In Revelstoke, the Rangers drove Merritt goaltender Ray Palmer to the dressing room after the seventh goal in the first period which ended 8-0 in favor of Revelstoke. His replacement, Gerald Forbes, fared little better, allowing nine more goals.

Bonora and Mike Dickerman each scored three times for the Rangers while John Tent led Merritt with two goals.

Saturday in Coastal Division play, two goals and five assists by Glen Evans paced Nanaimo.

Canadian skiers dominate downhill

VAL GARDENA, Italy (CP) — Canada placed five finishers in the top 18 of a men's World Cup downhill race Sunday and Todd Brooker of Paris, Ont., soared to the top of the overall downhill standings, but there was no denying Urs Raeber of Switzerland the victory.

It was Canada's best team result in two years as Brooker finished second, Steve Podborski of Toronto close behind in third, Paul Boivin of St-Lambert, Que., in ninth, Gary Athans of Kelowna, B.C., 15th and Chris Kent of Calgary 18th.

Raeber posted his first World Cup victory down the Sasslong track with a time of one minute 56.80 seconds. Brooker clocked 1:57.41 and Podborski 1:57.79.

Boivin's time was 1:58.67 and his ninth-place showing gave him seven World Cup points and should jump his start number to the low 30s from the 40s when the competition resumes in January.

Athans received one point for his finish in a time of 1:58.92. Kent, who tore knee ligaments at Val Gardena two years ago, was clocked in 1:59.27.

ONE-POINT LEAD
"Steve and I were talking together up at the

start," said Brooker, who now leads the downhill standings with 50 points, one more than Raeber. "We were really relaxed."

"We agreed to meet on the podium several times," he added. "I'm not surprised with how we did as a team today. If you look at our results from training, everyone was doing well except me."

"I was out in left field mostly because I was experimenting with skis. I had the utmost confidence in my rep (ski waxer), but I was a little uncomfortable with my training results here."

Podborski was pleased with third place, but is looking forward to the more technically demanding races when the World Cup season resumes.

"We're trying awfully hard and we did better on this course than we ever have as a team before," Podborski said. "It's not the kind of course we're best at."

"It was soft and there were a lot of flats," he added. "It's a slow race. We'll win soon. It's only a matter of time."
