Two Vernon players have been invited to tryout for a 15-year-old provincial all-star hockey team that will compete in the second annual Macs Super Series, in Vancouver, from July 1-8.

Dennis Holland and Troy Mick received invitations last week to attend a tryout camp, June 20-29, in Penticton. The team is sponsored by the Okanagan Hockey School and Penticton Knights, of

the B.C. Junior Hockey League.

The team will be coached by Walt Kyle, head coach at Northern Michigan University, in Marquette, Mich.

Knights' Coach Rick Kozuback, who is acting as a spokesman for the all-star team, said it is a great opportunity for the young players. "They will get a chance to play against the best 15-year-olds from across Canada and the Eastern United States," Kozuback said.

Holland and Mick, who have starred with Vernon rep teams for six years, have both indicated they will attend the camp.
