# A TRIBUTE TO BRUCE ALLISON

British Columbia lost a dynamic, hard working and dedicated hockey man with the passing of BCJHL President Bruce Allison. Bruce served B.C. hockey in virtually all capacities; coach, team operator, President and ultimately Director.

Originally from Alberta, Bruce settled in B.C.'s lower mainland in the late 1950s where he promptly started and became President of the Gulf of Georgia Minor Hockey Association, the fore-runner of Richmond Sea Fair hockey.

During the '60's, Bruce became active as a hockey coach — coaching teams at the Pee Wee, Bantam and Midget levels in both Richmond and Vancouver. It was at this time he became dedicated to the concept of hockey scholarships — the desire to see hockey players have the opportunity to further their education especially at Canadian Universities.

In 1972 he took over from Tom Shaw as the operator of the Richmond Cohos Junior 'B' team. The next year the team became the Junior 'A' Sockeyes and joined the newly formed Pac. 'A' league under Allison's leadership.

Bruce left the Sockeyes to become involved with the Pacific Coast Minor Hockey Association for whom he served as President for two terms. From there he evolved into the B.C. Amateur Hockey Association and progressed rapidly to the point of becoming President in 1983.

During his 4 years as President of the BCAHA he served as B.C.'s representative as a Director of the CAHA where he gained an impressive reputation as an administrator. At this point Bruce entertained several hockey opportunities, but it was the BCJHL that was fortunate enough to have Bruce agree to assume a leadership role as league President in 1988.

During his two terms Bruce served to lead and organize the BCJHL in a way characteristic of one of the most respected people in the hockey community.







#### HONORARY CHAIRMAN FRED PAGE



The 1990 Centennial Cup Canadian Junior 'A' Hockey Championships in Vernon is pleased to recognize Fred Page as the tournament's Honorary Chairman.

Mr. Page's involvement in hockey dates back to 1934-35 or the "Dirty Thirties" as he refers to it, when Page played junior hockey for his hometown team in Port Arthur, Ontario, now called Thunder Bay. After his playing days were finished, he became involved with minor hockey and officiating. In 1962, Fred was elected second vice president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and became CAHA President in 1966, the same year he became second vice president of the International Ice Hockey Congress. In 1973, Page was elected as a life member into the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

Page and his family moved west to Vancouver in 1965 and 8 years later, he was approached by the B.C. Amateur Hockey Association to help form the Pacific Junior Hockey League, with the emphasis on education first. Page became president of that league in 1975 and held that post until the league amalgamated with the B.C.J.H.L. in 1979. Page is currently the chairman of the board of the B.C.J.H.L.

Two more honors were bestowed upon Mr. Page in the mid-eighties. In 1984, the North Shore Winter Club of North Vancouver renamed its prestigious midget 'A' International Tournament after Fred, and in 1986, Page was inducted into the Northwestern Ontario Sports Hall of Fame for dedicated contribution to the sport of hockey as a "builder".





#### A SALUTE TO VERN DYE

This year's Centennial Cup Tournament in Vernon is perhaps the crowning glory to all the time Vern Dye has spent in junior hockey in this city.

Dye, who helped talk Lakers General Manager Mel Lis into bidding for this year's tournament, is a fixture in B.C. Junior Hockey circles.

Vern came to Vernon in 1949 from his hometown of Bashaw, Alberta and first got involved in hockey here with the Vernon Canadians Intermediate Team, who would go on to win the Allan Cup in 1956. It was in 1963 that Dye became involved with the junior ranks, as he and 17 others purchased the Old Vernon Blades for a price of three hundred dollars each. The Blades later became the Vernon Essos, a B.C. Junior Hockey powerhouse, which won a pair of provincial championships in 1970 and 1972, with Dye serving as general manager. Ironically, though, Dye says the 1970-71 club, which



lost to Kamloops in the B.C. final, was the best club he was involved in. That team featured current Lakers coach Ed Johnstone, late defenseman Bob Gassoff, and Vern's son Wayne, who passed away in 1988. Wayne Dye spent four seasons with the Essos and is still the all time leading scorer in Vernon Junior Hockey history.

In 1975, Vern Dye became a member of the B.C. Junior Hockey League executive and has been with the league ever since. He is currently the president of the B.C.J.H.L.'s Interior Division. Dye says the Centennial Cup Tournament is a great honor for the B.C.J.H.L. and the city of Vernon.







## THE CENTENNIAL CUP

Every fall when the first puck of the season is dropped, every Junior A team and it's fans dream of one thing — a berth in the Centennial Cup.

The proper name for the Centennial Cup, emblematic of Junior 'A' hockey supremacy in Canada, is the Manitoba Centennial Cup. It was presented to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association in 1970 to celebrate the Centennial of the Province.

The first final series ever played was somewhat of a rarity. An American team, Detroit Junior Wings, represented Eastern Canada against Red Deer and eventually lost the series 4 games to 2. Guelph, Ontario under two names, the CMC's and the Platers, have been in five finals and have two Centennial Cup Championships to their name.

The most successful team in Junior 'A' history by far, was the Prince Albert Raiders. Prince Albert moved to the Western Hockey League in the 1982-83 season after defeating Guelph in four straight games for the Centennial Cup. Among Prince Albert players who dominated Junior 'A' hockey at the turn of the decade were three members of Canada's 1984 Olympic team, Robin Bartel, Dave Topett and James Patrick.

The Raiders are the only team to win back-to-back Cups (1981 and 1982) and the only team to be in three straight finals (1977-79). In five appearances the Raiders have won four cups under coach Terry Simpson, who led Canada to the World Junior Hockey Championship in 1985.

The format of the Centennial Cup has changed over the years, and has featured two team confrontations (East, West), three team match-ups (Central, West and Atlantic), a 4-team format which included Central West and Atlantic winners plus a host team and the new format which extends the teams to five:

Pacific Region — British Columbia, Alberta
Western Region — Saskatchewan, Manitoba
Central Region — Ontario, Quebec
Atlantic Region — New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland
Plus the Host — Vernon Lakers

Under the new system all five teams play each other once in the round robin series commencing Friday, May 4. Following the round robin series there is a four team semi-final series (1st vs 4th — 2nd vs 3rd), with the two winners playing off in the championship final on Saturday, May 12.

In the fall of 1988, an agreement was reached between the CAHA and two major sponsors which in turn added stability and growth to the Centennial Cup Junior 'A' hockey in general.






The Vernon Lakers are proud to be the first team from the province of B.C. to host the Centennial Cup.

The national championship trophy is the only major cup that has eluded General Manager Mel Lis since he purchased the team in 1986. The Lakers have won a pair of BCJHL and provincial championships in that time, and last year represented Western Canada at the Centennial Cup finals in Summerside, P.E.I. A third consecutive BCJHL title this season was not meant to be, as the Lakers fell to the powerful New Westminster Royals, a team that lost only 3 times in 60 league games. During the regular season, Vernon managed a pair of ties against the Royals and extended them to six games in the final series.

The Lakers have 7 returnees from last year's club and also have 3 members of the Thunder Bay Flyers squad that was victorious in Summerside. The team is coached by Ed Johnstone, a pro hockey player for 14 seasons that included stops in the W.H.A. and in the N.H.L. with the New York Rangers and Detroit Red Wings. Ed's assistant is Keith Chase, who played 5 seasons in the B.C.J.H.L., four of them with his hometown team, the Lakers.

The Vernon Lakers will try to become the third B.C.J.H.L. franchise to win the Centennial Cup, following Penticton in 1986 and Richmond in 1987.

**NEW WESTMINSTER ROYALS — 1989 - 90** 

The New Westminster Royals came back to B.C. Jr. 'A' hockey circles in 1988-89, after being away since the 1970's and have promptly made an impact not only in the BCJHL, but in western Canada.

The Royals steamrolled their way through the 1989-90 BCJHL season, winning 52, losing 3 and tying 4. New West set a league record with a 39 game undefeated streak that stretched from October 22, 1989 to February 9, 1990. The Royals also broke the Vernon Lakers league record of 15 consecutive wins on the road by going 17 before tying Vernon 7-7. The Royals ended up going 19 consecutive games on the road without a loss.

Former WHL coach John Olver, along with G.M. Roy Henderson, assembled a well balanced New Westminster machine this year. The Royals led the BCJHL in goals scored with 444, and goals against with 181. The 181 was only 7 more than Penticton Knights allowed in 27 games before folding. Royals owner Bruce Taylor is no stranger to the Centennial Cup. He owned the Richmond Sockeyes — the last team from B.C. to win the Centennial Cup when they won the national championship in 1987.

A New Westminster victory at this years Centennial Cup tournament would give the Queen City both major junior hockey trophies, remembering the mighty New Westminster Bruins of Punch McLean, Stan Smyl, John Ogrodnick and Barry Beck, who won back to back Memorial Cups in 1977 and 78. Smyl's brother, Harvey, is currently an assistant with the Royals.

#### **NIPAWIN HAWKS HISTORY**

A patient developmental approach has brought the Nipawin Hawks from new kids on the block to the top of the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League in five seasons.

The Hawks completed their rise through the SJHL by defeating the Yorkton Terriers 6-1 April 18 at Yorkton to claim the league title in six games.

Nipawin had needed seven games to bypass the Weyburn Red Wings in the league semifinal, after eliminating the Flin Flon Bombers four straight in the opening round.

They concluded each series with victories in their opponents' home rinks.

Hundreds of Hawks loyalists were in Yorkton to savor the championship with the players, who are treated like adoptive sons in this close-knit community of 4,800 in northeastern Saskatchewan.

The strong bond between the team and the community is the key to the Hawks success.

Nipawin has always been a hotbed of hockey, but prior to 1985-86 had never been home to a team above Junior B or intermediate level.

That changed when rumors circulated prior to the 1985-86 season that the SJHL was considering expansion.

A hastily-organized public meeting prompted a franchise application that was favorably received by the league in the late spring of 1985.

The team's organizers had just a few weeks to hire a coach, develop a players' list and attend to the many other details involved in launching a new franchise.

The first season was more moral victory than artistic success, as the team finished 10th in the 11-team league. But they were close — the Hawks suffered 18 losses by one-goal margins that year, which buoyed spirits for the future.

The succeeding years have seen a gradual progression toward power in league play. In 1986-87, the Hawks made the playoffs and took powerful Yorkton to a seventh game before bowing out in the opening round. The next year, they won their first round, before being sidelined in the league semifinal by the eventual Centennial Cup champion Notre Dame Hounds. in 1988-89, the Hawks won their first two rounds — including a second-round win over Notre Dame — before losing to the Humboldt Broncos in the league final.

This year, the Hawks would not be denied, charging to the league championship with 12 victories in 17 games.

Except for a paid coaching staff, the Hawks organization is operated by volunteers on behalf of the community. The home Centennial Arena seats just 880, but town council has approved seating expansion prior to next season.

Extensive travel in the SJHL — from Flin Flon in northern Manitoba, throughout Saskatchewan and down to Minot, North Dakota — means operating budgets in the \$250,000 range for most teams, which might daunt some communities of Nipawin's size.

But when you see a Hawks' fan at playoff time — face painted, wearing a team sweater and cap, brandishing pompoms and with sirens wailing — it's easy to see why the franchise is flourishing.

Step by step, backed by their rabid fans, the Hawks have advanced further each year toward the ultimate goal, the Centennial Cup. This year, Hawks' fans hope to see them soar to the pinnacle.



#### LES SIEURS DU COLLEGE FRANÇAIS DE LONGUEUIL

The Quebec champions began play in Quebec Junior Double "A" competition in 1975 under the name "Rebelles", which lasted only one season before the team became known as Les Sieurs De Longueuil, or — in English — The Longueuil Lords. In 1988, the team became known as Les Sieurs Du College Francais De Longueuil.

That same year, Les Sieurs joined the tier 2 Quebec circuit and have quickly established themselves as a powerhouse, having won the league and regular season titles in their first two years.

Les Sieurs have a number of players that participated in the Centennial Cup playdowns, and under the direction of coach Pierre Petroni, hope to bring Quebec its first ever Centennial Cup title.

The 1989-90 edition of Amherst's junior hockey team brings back long-lost pride to the Town of Amherst and once again the name "Ramblers" has become symbolic of greatness in the Atlantic provinces.

The Ramblers name has been a part of sports in this Nova Scotia border town for close to 100 years with the first fame coming in 1905 when the Amherst senior Ramblers put in a bid for a crack at the famed Stanley Cup.

And now, some 85 years later, the Amherst Junior Ramblers have a chance to bring home one of Canada's top junior hockey awards, the Centennial Cup.

The present day edition of the Amherst Junior Rambler hockey club became a reality from a dream Amherst barrister Maurice (Moe) Bent had in the summer of 1967. That fall a team was iced and looking for a league to play in. Also, the Amherst Junior Ramblers Hockey Association, the backbone for fund-raising and decision-making, was formed and today it still plays a major role in the opera-

The Ramblers joined the Moncton Metro Junior Hockey League in early December and ended up winning the playoff championship in their first year of operation. But, best of all, Amherst fans got their first taste of junior hockey in over 15 years and they were

In the fall of 1968 the Ramblers joined a newly-formed Metro Valley Junior Hockey League and despite some up and down financial years and many seasons where they missed the league playoffs, the team is still part of a loop where many other junior squads

From day one, 22 years ago, the Ramblers have always enjoyed the largest home crowds of any team in the MVJHL. In the last three games of the Atlantic Region championship over 3,200 screaming fans were jammed into Amherst Stadium for each contest. Not bad for a rink that seats only 2,100.


Success, as far as winning, came slow to the Ramblers and up until this season, the furthest the team ever went was to the Metro Valley semi-finals before hanging up their skates for the season.

The turn-around point came with the appointment of new coach former NHL'er Bill Riley, a native of Amherst. It was back home for Riley who starred for the local Ramblers 20 years earlier winning two straight Rambler MVP awards.

Riley took the bull by the horns and turned the Ramblers around stressing hard work and discipline as the key to success. He also signed a number of top-calibre players that were unreachable before he took over the coaching duties.

The Ramblers also acquired a new sponsor this season with General Eastern Homes Ltd. of Amherst taking some of the financial load off the back of the Rambler Association. Financially it has been a successful season for the squad, but a deficit still remains from the lean days of years gone by.

The success of the Amherst Junior Ramblers this season and the winning of the Callighan Cup, symbolic of Atlantic Region junior hockey supremacy, has assured the future of junior hockey in Amherst for at least another season. A Centennial Cup victory would put the icing on the cake.





Each of the nominations were judged against players from their own region.





# The Abbott Memorial Cup

Captain E.L. Abbott was a noted hockey player in Western Canada. He captained the Regina Victoria's when they won the Junior Championship of Canada in 1913 and 1914. Captain Abbott died in active service in the war of 1914-18 and the trophy was presented in his memory in 1919 by the Saskatchewan Amateur Hockey Association and is awarded annually for the championship of Junior 'A' hockey in Western Canada.

# **BCJHL HISTORY**

The B.C. Junior Hockey League was established in 1961 following the demise of the old Okanagan Senior Hockey League, with the first league game played on October 31, 1961, featuring the Vernon Canadians hosting the Kelowna Buckaroos. The league was known at the time as the Okanagan Junior 'A' league and was comprised of the 4 Okanagan teams: Kelowna Buckaroos, Vernon Canadians, Kamloops Rockets and Penticton Vees. Penticton dropped out of the league after the 1962/63 season leaving only the 3 teams but re-surfaced in 1964 as the Penticton Broncos. In 1966/67 the league established an interlocking schedule with two teams from the coast, the New Westminster Royals and Vancouver. The Royals under coach Bob Fenton had a strong nucleus from the previous season and proved to be one of the strongest teams in league history. They won the Mowat Cup that season (66/67) and by defeating both the Alberta and Saskatchewan champions became the first BCJHL team to advance to the Western Junior 'A' final. In 1967/68 the Victoria Cougars replaced Vancouver and at this point the league established itself as the 6 team British Columbia Junior Hockey League. In 1970/71 the league expanded to 8 teams establishing a 4 team Coastal Division and a 4 team Okanagan Division. It was at this time crowds of up to three and four thousand would watch BC-JHL games and it was also during this season (70/71) the first BCJHL All-Star game was played, an annual event showcasing many future NHL players that continues to this day. During the 1970's, several teams were added, some shifted franchises, others folded. In 1972/73, the Nanaimo Clippers and Bellingham Blazers joined the league establishing the BCJHL as the only International Junior 'A' league in Canada. Some of the established BCJHL franchises such as Kamloops, Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster left the league when Major Junior Hockey moved into those centers at different stages during the '70's. The 1980's brought much more success and prestige to the BCJHL. A landmark event took place during the 1982/83 season as that season's Champions and Mowat Cup winners — Abbotsford Flyers under coach Don Berry — were the first BCJHL team to go all the way to the Canadian Junior 'A' final, the Centennial Cup. In 1984/85, 85/86 and 86/87 the BCJHL Champions in each of those seasons advanced to the Centennial Cup finals with the Penticton Knights coached by Rick Kozuback winning the Cup in 85/86 and the Richmond Sockeyes under coach Orland Kurtenbach winning the Canadian Championship in 86/87. The 85/86 Knights, the first BCJHL team to win the Centennial Cup, had a brilliant season which included recording 38 consecutive home ice victories, a BCJHL record. In 1988/89 the BCJHL again advanced to the Centennial Cup tournament this time represented by the Vernon Lakers. The 1989/90 season was highlighted by the John Olver coached New Westminster Royals, likely the most dominant team in league history, breaking 6 league records during the course of the season.

The League over the years has produced not only its share of high profile champions, especially during the '80's but has also seen many of its "graduates" move up the ladder to the NHL. Several NHL players such as Glenn Anderson, Stan Smyl, Ron Greschner, Brett Hull, John Ogrodnick, Ryan Walter, Mel Bridgeman, Geoff Courtnall, Barry Beck, Barry Pederson, Ray Ferraro and Andy Moog all played hockey in the BCJHL. The aforementioned Bridgeman became the first former BCJHL player (Nanaimo Clippers) to be picked number one overall in the NHL entry draft. This occurred with the 1975 draft. Former Penticton Knight Joe Murphy became the second, as he was the NHL's number one draft pick in 1986. In the 1989 NHL draft, Vernon Lakers defenseman Jason Marshall became the first BCJHL player to be picked in the first round (9th player picked) directly out of the B.C. Junior Hockey League.

Over the years the BCJHL has been very proud of the number of it's players who have continued their education through hockey scholarships, particularly with American Colleges and Universities. This trend started in the BCJHL in the late 1960's and has evolved to the point where there is now, during the 89/90 season, a total of 97 former BCJHL players playing hockey on scholarship with U.S. schools.

The BCJHL completes its 29th season, twice Canadian Champions, supplier of players to the NHL, and continuing to send more players to hockey scholarships than any other Junior 'A' league in Canada

#### A Thumb Nail History of Greater Vernon

Greater Vernon is a vibrant community of forty-five thousand, almost equally divided between the City of Vernon and the surrounding areas.

Vernon is the oldest incorporated City (1892) in the Okanagan Valley, and was for years, the centre for all federal and provincial government services for the entire valley.

The first settlers drifted into the area from the Cariboo gold fields, where most had not made the fortune they anticipated. They came to realize that the real gold lay in the rich soil of the Okanagan flatlands.

The City came into being because early ranchers had difficulty keeping workers. One of them, Charles Vernon, thought that a hotel, located equidistant from the four large ranches, might decrease the worker turnover. In 1884, on the present site of the Safeway Store, he built a log building that was a combination boarding house, bar and gambling place. There is no record that the hotel, which he named VERNON did decrease the worker turnover, but a tiny community grew around the hotel. It too, became known as VERNON.

The future of communities depended on the route taken by the Canadian Pacific Railway as it snaked across Canada. Fortunately for VERNON, the line went through Sicamous, forty miles north of Vernon. Three men of vision, Forbes Vernon, Francis Barnard and Moses Lumby promoted a spur railway line from Sicamous to Vernon and four miles beyond to Okanagan Landing, to connect with a proposed paddlewheel steamer, tug and barge service down Okanagan Lake, to promote settlement in the south of the valley. The line was completed in 1891. For the first time, settlers could comfortably bring their families, household effects and business equipment into the valley. It also enabled them to ship their produce to outside markets.

In 1904, Samuel Polson, travelling by train from Winnipeg to Vancouver, talked with a man who suggested he stop over at Vernon. Intrigued with the man's stories of the beautiful Valley, he stopped off to look it over. A few days later, he sent a telegram to his wife in Winnipeg which read:

"Get ready to move. I've found the garden of Eden."

Those of us fortunate enough to live in Vernon today, echo his sentiments.






