





Building on 28 years of tradition

Eventually, the National Junior A Hockey Championship, the Royal Bank Cup, had to find its way to Yorkton. The province of Saskatchewan and the city of Yorkton are proud torch-bearers for Junior hockey in Canada, and have been for years. Saskatchewan has produced six Junior A Champions, and three runners-up. As for the Terriers, they have been Yorkton's team for 27 years.

The Royal Bank Cup, known before 1996 as the Centennial Cup, saw the light of day a year before the Yorkton Terriers, in 1971. The Red Deer Rustlers of the Alberta Junior Hockey League defeated the Charlottetown Islanders that year in Prince Edward Island to claim the inaugural Canadian Junior A Championship.

Back in 1971, a long time before an all-sports television network existed in Canada, the first Junior A Championship, then called the Centennial Cup, was decided in league playoffs that led to a seven-game series between the nation's top two teams. (This format was maintained through 1978 to determine Canada's top Junior A team. From 1979 to 1981, the format changed to a round-robin tournament, then went back to a seven-game series from 1982 to 1984. It has been a round robin since 1985.)

And even back in the beginning, the Islanders vs. Rustlers series was the hottest ticket in Charlottetown.

"Their fans were literally hanging from the rafters!" recalls Perry Pearn, who played on that Red Deer team. He couldn't believe his eyes, a 19 year old kid at the time.

"I remember all these kids almost hanging from the roof," says Pearn, who is now an Assistant Coach with the Ottawa Senators. "[The Charlottetown Gardens] was an old wooden building. There were so many people, there was absolutely no place for [the spare players] to sit. They had to stand around the boards where the Zamboni came out."

Despite the outstanding play of Islanders star Al MacAdam, who also coached the St. Thomas University Tommies of the AUAA, the Rustlers stole the Cup from the

host team in six games. "I remember MacAdam for Charlottetown. The story was that he'd be out on the fishing boat with his dad all day, and then come to the rink and play."

MacAdam, who went on to play 12 NHL seasons, actually was an apprentice fisherman at the time. "It wasn't tough," MacAdam says from his Fredericton office. "It's just what you had to do back then."

The road to the championship was as memorable for Pearn as the national title series.

In a rough-and-tumble quarter-final series against the Penticton Broncos, the Rustlers lost the first two games but eventually won the series in seven.

Then the Rustlers hit the rails and traveled by train to Winnipeg, where they swept the St. Boniface Saints in four straight to win the western championship.

"I think it's the last time in hockey that a team traveled by train," says

Pearn, who 22 years later went on to coach the Canadian National Junior Team to a world championship in 1993.

"The contacts I made off that team have had a major impact on my hockey career," says Pearn.

Twenty years later, during the 1991 championship game in Sudbury, the general manager and owner of the Vernon Lakers was locked in his team's dressing room from the first intermission until after the final buzzer.

Lakers GM Mel Lis ran to his team's dressing room during the intermission in the championship game in Sudbury to answer a call of nature.

"I was in there using the can," Lis explains, "and when I tried to get out, the door was locked. Our trainer had locked it with a padlock on the outside."

Lis banged on the door and screamed at the top of his lungs, but his noise went unheard. The crowd in the arena had created a din that virtually silenced Lis's pleas for help.

But a strange thing happened while he was imprisoned. The Lakers, who were down by a goal after the first period, rallied to score two unanswered goals in the second.

When the padlock was unlocked during the second intermission,

Lis was rescued.

But he decided to stay put.

"The guys were down a goal when I went in there and got locked in, so I decided not to change things. They were doing better when I was out of the picture."

So Lis stayed in the dressing room during the third period, only to emerge at the end of the game for the Lakers' celebration of their 8-4 win over the host Sudbury Cubs. It was their second straight Centennial Cup with coach Ed Johnstone, a former NHLer with the New York Rangers and Detroit Red Wings.

The year before, the Lakers had beaten the heavily favored New Westminster Royals in overtime in front of a home crowd.

"The second win was nice, but the first was by far the best," says Lis, whose team made four straight trips to the championship from 1989 to 1992. "TSN broadcast the game [live] across Canada and somebody said it was the best junior game ever on TV."

Over the years, the Cup has always featured players whose names are easily recognized by NHL fans.

Bryan Murray, now General Manager of the Florida Panthers, coached the Rockland (Ontario) Nationals to the championship in 1976.

Terry Simpson, a former Head Coach with the Winnipeg Jets, guided the Prince Albert Raiders to

three Centennial Cups — in 1977, 1979 and 1981. "They were good times," says Simpson. "They helped me in my coaching career."

Three of the famous Sutter brothers — Brent, Rich and Ron — helped the Red Deer Rustlers win a second Cup in 1980. A teammate was defenceman Randy Moller, who played for the Québec Nordiques, Rangers and last season for the Buffalo Sabres. Moller teamed up with brother Mike in 1982 to win gold at the World Junior Championship, the first year Canada sent a true national team.

Joe Murphy, the first pick in the 1986 NHL draft, was the top scorer in the 1985 tournament, when his Penticton team was runner-up to the Orillia Travelways.

In 1988, the famed Notre Dame Hounds from Saskatchewan took the Cup with help from Rod Brind'Amour, now a star with the Philadelphia Flyers, and goalie Curtis Joseph of the Toronto Maple Leafs.

Nanaimo, British Columbia, hosted the 1998 Royal Bank Cup. The South Surrey Eagles avenged their 1997 loss in the final by overtaking the Weyburn Red Wings in the final.

The 1999 Royal Bank Cup will crown a new champion as South Surrey lost in the BCHL's Coastal Conference finals. Further proof on how tough it is to become Canadian champions in Junior A hockey.

Une tradition de 28 ans se perpétue

Il était approprié qu'un jour, le Championnat national de hockey Junior A, la Coupe Royale, se transporte à Yorkton. La province de la Saskatchewan et la ville de Yorkton sont de fiers porte-flambeau pour le hockey junior au Canada depuis des années. La Saskatchewan a remporté six championnats canadiens au niveau junior A, et a terminé deuxième à trois reprises. Pour ce qui est des Terriers, ils sont à Yorkton depuis 27 ans.

La Coupe Banque Royale, nommée avant 1996 la Coupe Centennial, a vu le jour un an avant les Terriers, soit en 1971. Les Rustlers de Red Deer, de la Ligue de hockey junior de l'Alberta, avait alors défait les Islanders de Charlottetown à l'Île-du-Prince-Édouard pour décrocher le tout premier titre national.

En 1971, bien avant que le Canada ait un réseau de télévision dévoué uniquement au sport, la première série pour la coupe Centennial a été disputée à Charlottetown. Le championnat était alors disputé à l'issue de séries entre les ligues culminant avec une série quatre-de-sept entre les deux meilleures formations au pays. (Ce format pour déterminer le champion

canadien est resté en vigueur jusqu'en 1978. De 1979 à 1981, le format a été changé pour un tournoi à la ronde, puis on est retourné à une série qua tre-de-sept de 1982 à 1984. On tient un tournoi à la ronde depuis 1985.)

Et dès les tous débuts du championnat, un billet pour la finale entre Red Deer et l'équipe-hôtesse des Islanders de

Charlottetown était la chose la plus en demande dans la ville.

«Leurs partisans ont rempli l'aréna à craquer!», se souvient Perry Pearn, qui jouait pour la formation de Red Deer à l'époque. Il ne pouvait en croire ses yeux, lui qui avait 19 ans à ce moment-là.

«Je me souviens qu'il y avait tous ces jeunes qui semblaient se tenir après le plafond,» dit Pearn, qui est maintenant l'entraîneur assistant des Sénateurs d'Ottawa, de la Ligue national de hockey. «Le Gardens de Charlottetown était un vieux édifice en bois. Il y avait tellement de monde que les joueurs qui n'étaient pas uniforme n'avaient pas de place pour s'asseoir. Ils devaient se tenir debout le long de la bande, à l'endroit où la Zamboni sortait.»

Malgré l'excellente performance de la vedette des Islanders Al MacAdam, qui est maintenant l'entraîneur des Tommies de l'Université St. Thomas, les Rustlers ont volé la coupe à l'équipe-hôtesse en six parties.

«Je me souviens de MacAdam, qui jouait pour Charlottetown, d'ajouter Pearn. On disait alors qu'il passait la journée sur le bateau de pêche de son père, puis qu'il se rendait à la patinoire le soir pour jouer.»

MacAdam, qui a ensuite eu une carrière de 12 saisons dans la LNH, dit qu'il était vraiment un apprenti-pêcheur dans ce temps-là. «Ce n'était pas difficile, dit MacAdam lorsque joint à son bureau de Charlottetown. C'était juste quelque chose qu'il fallait faire dans le temps.»


Le chemin menant au championnat national avait été tout aussi mémorable pour Pearn que la série finale. Lors d'une série quart-de-finale contre les Broncos de Penticton axée sur la rudesse, les Rustlers ont perdu les deux premières parties mais sont revenus pour gagner la série en sept matchs.

Puis les Rustlers ont pris le train pour Winnipeg, où ils ont balayé les Saints de St-Boniface en quatre parties pour mériter le championnat de l'Ouest.

«Je pense que c'était la dernière fois au hockey qu'une équipe voyageait en train», dit Pearn, qui,

22 ans plus tard, a guidé l'équipe nationale junior du Canada au championnat mondial junior de 1993.

«Les contacts que j'ai faits grâce à cette équipe ont eu un impact majeur sur ma carrière au hockey», dit Pearn.

Pendant la partie de championnat de la coupe Centennial de 1991 à Sudbury, le directeur général et propriétaire des Lakers de Vernon a été enfermé dans le vestiaire de son équipe du premier entracte jusqu'à la sirène signalant la fin du match.

Le gérant des Lakers Mel Lis a couru dans le vestiaire des siens pendant l'entracte de la finale pour répondre à l'appel de la nature.

«Il fallait que j'aille à la toilette, explique Lis, et quand j'ai essayé de sortir, la porte était verrouillée. Notre soigneur l'avait barrée avec un cadenas à l'extérieur.»

Lis a frappé sur la porte et crié le plus fort qu'il le pouvait, mais personne ne l'a entendu. La foule faisait trop de bruit, réduisant ses cris à l'aide au silence.

Mais quelque chose d'étrange s'est passée pendant que Lis était emprisonné. Les Lakers, qui tiraient de l'arrière par un but après la première période, sont revenus pour compter deux buts sans réplique au deuxième tiers.

Lorsque le cadenas a été déverrouillé pour le deuxième entracte, Lis était libre.

Mais il a décidé de rester en place.

«Les gars tiraient de l'arrière par un but quand je suis allé dans la chambre, ce qui fait que j'ai décidé de ne pas changer les choses. Ils se débrouillaient mieux sans moi dans le portrait.»

Lis est donc demeuré dans le vestiaire pendant la troisième période, ressortant seulement pour célébrer la victoire de 8-4 des Lakers aux dépens de l'équipe-hôte, les Cubs de Sudbury.

C'était la deuxième coupe Centennial consécutive des Lakers avec l'entraîneur Ed Johnstone, un ancien joueur de la LNH avec les Rangers de New York et les Red Wings de Détroit.

L'année précédente, les Lakers avaient vaincu l'équipe favorite, les Royals de New Westminster, en prolongation devant leurs propres partisans.

«La deuxième victoire était plaisante, mais la première était encore meilleure,» a dit Lis, dont l'équipe s'est rendue au tournoi de championnat lors de quatre saisons consécutives, de 1989 à 1992. «TSN a présenté le match (en direct) à travers le Canada et quelqu'un a dit que c'était la meilleure partie de hockey junior présentée à la télévision.» Au fil des années, la coupe a mis en vedette des joueurs dont les noms sont facilement reconnus par les amateurs de la LNH.

Bryan Murray, maintenant le d.g. des Panthers de la Floride, était l'entraîneur des Nationals de Rockland quand ils ont gagné le championnat de 1976.

Terry Simpson, maintenant un entraîneur-adjoint des Jets de Winnipeg, a mené les Raiders de Prince Albert à trois coupes Centennial — en 1977, 1979 et 1981. «C'était le bon temps, dit

Simpson. Ça m'a aidé dans ma carrière d'entraîneur.»

Trois des célèbres frères Sutter — Brent, Rich et Ron — ont aidé les Rustlers de Red Deer à gagner une deuxième coupe en 1980. Un de leurs coéquipiers était le défenseur Randy Moller, qui a porté les couleurs des Nordiques de Québec, des Rangers de New York et des Sabres de Buffalo la saison dernière. Moller et son frère Mike faisaient tous deux partie de la formation qui a remporté l'or au Championnat mondial junior de 1982, la première année où le Canada a envoyé une vraie équipe nationale.

Joe Murphy, le premier choix au repêchage de la LNH en 1986, avait été le meilleur compteur du tournoi en 1985, lorsque son équipe de Penticton s'est inclinée en finale devant les Travelways d'Orillia.

En 1988, les fameux Hounds de Notre Dame, en Saskatchewan, ont mis la main sur la coupe avec l'aide de Rod Brind'Amour, des Flyers de Philadelphie, et du gardien Curtis Joseph, qui est devenu un gardien de premier plan dans la LNH avec les Maple Leafs de Toronto.

La ville de Nanaimo, en Colombie-Britannique, a accueilli la Coupe Banque Royale en 1998. Les Eagles de South Surrey ont eu raison des Red Wings de Weyburn en finale, faisant oublier un peu leur défaite en 1997 en finale.

La Coupe Banque Royale de 1999 couronnera un nouveau champion puisque South Surrey a été éliminé en finale de Conférence lors des séries de la BCJHL. Autre preuve du chemin difficile à parcourir pour devenir Champions canadiens au hockey Junior A.
