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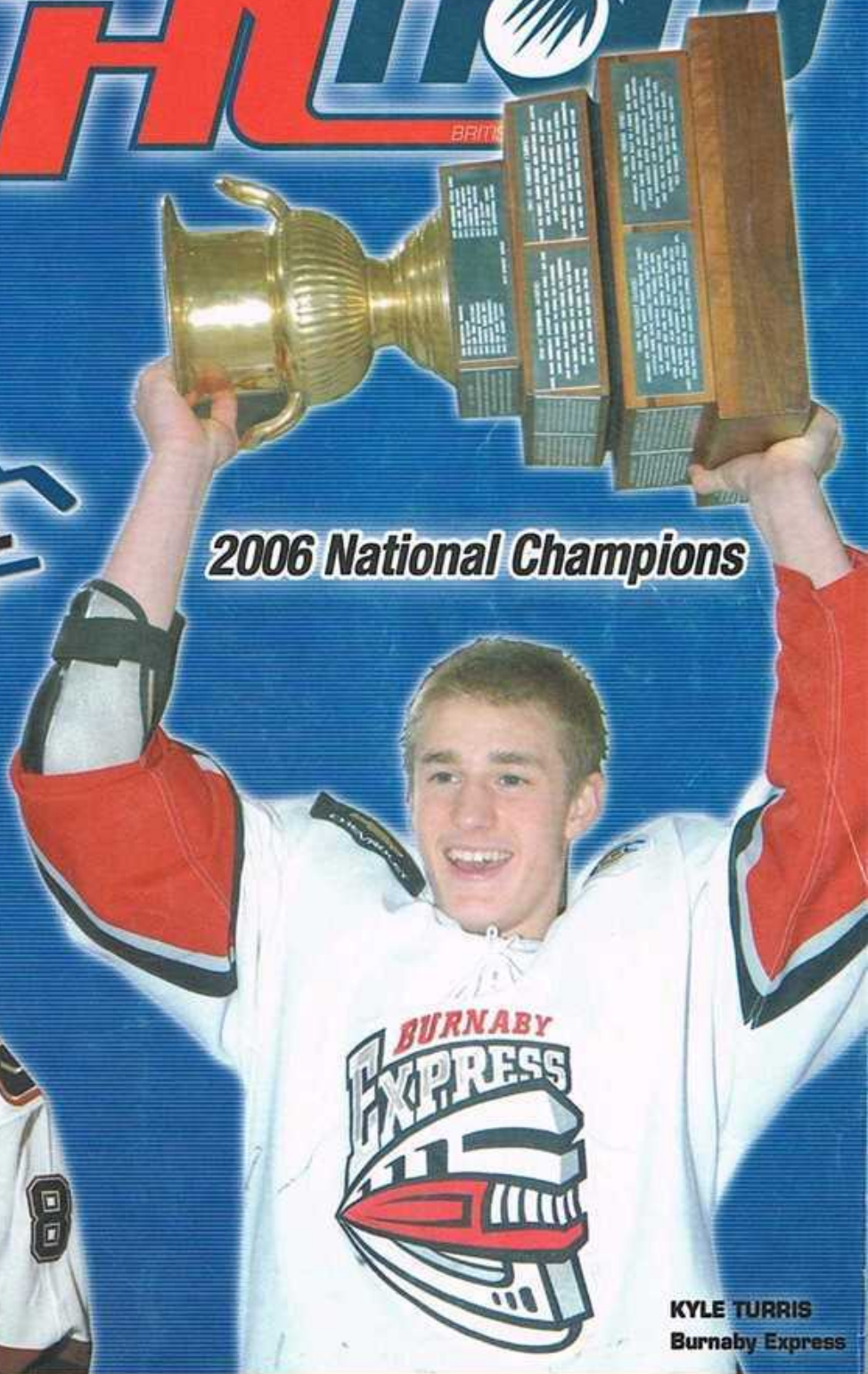

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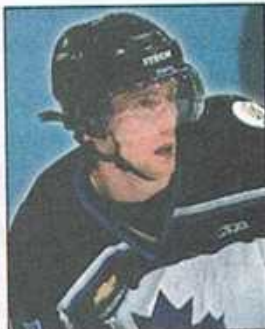

Long road leads to RBC crown

On the right track: Burnaby Express power through to earn national title

It's easy to understand just how far the Burnaby Express came in winning the Royal Bank Cup — Canada's Junior A national championship.

Like the NHL, the British Columbia Hockey League playoffs consist of four rounds of intense best-of-seven competition.

For the one team that survives that grind, it's off to the Doyle Cup to take on Alberta's best in yet another grueling best-of-seven series.

Win that, and it's off to the Promised Land — the Royal Bank Cup — to compete for the ultimate Junior A prize.

Talk about a long road — and what an amazing journey it was.

After an eighth-place overall finish and some

significant injuries, the Express were hungry.

"Once we got everybody healthy, I thought we had enough talent to do something," said head coach Rick Lanz.

Boy was he right.

From decent to dominant, Burnaby dismantled the Langley Hornets (4-0), the Chilliwack Chiefs (4-1), and the Victoria Salsa (4-1) in the first three rounds of the playoffs.

The Express then met the Penticton Vees in the final,

a team that had just set the all-time BCHL record for least goals allowed in a season with 137.

Two trends developed in the first five games of an extremely tight, defensive series: the team that scored first won, and neither team could win two in a row.

In Game 6, with Burnaby up 3-2 in the series and having just beaten Penticton 2-1 on the road, both of those trends ended.

The Express won their second game in a row and did it in comeback fashion — a sign of things to come. Dave Simoes tied the game at one, late in the first, and Tyler McNeely scored the 2-1 overtime winner as Burnaby won their first Fred Page Cup.

The Express train kept rolling.

Next, the Express faced the Alberta Junior Hockey League champions, the Fort McMurray Oil Barons, in a best-of-seven series for the Doyle Cup and a spot in the Royal Bank Cup.

Bryce Luker was solid in goal for Burnaby, posting a 2.33 G.A.A against a powerful Fort McMurray offence that averaged 3.40 goals per game in their regular season.

After establishing a 3-2 series lead, the Express handed the Barons their worst loss of the season with a definitive 6-0 victory to end the series in six.

Washington Capitals draftee Keith Seabrook scored a rare defence-man's hat trick for the Express.

After hoisting two major championship trophies in two weeks, Lanz

remained confident about his team's ability to refocus and prepare for the big dance.

"[The Royal Bank Cup] was always their focus," said Lanz. "With every win...they were able to manage their emotions and their celebrations to a level where it satisfied them as individuals but at the same time they were able to maintain their composure and keep a focus on going towards their next challenge," he said. From there, it was back on the road to

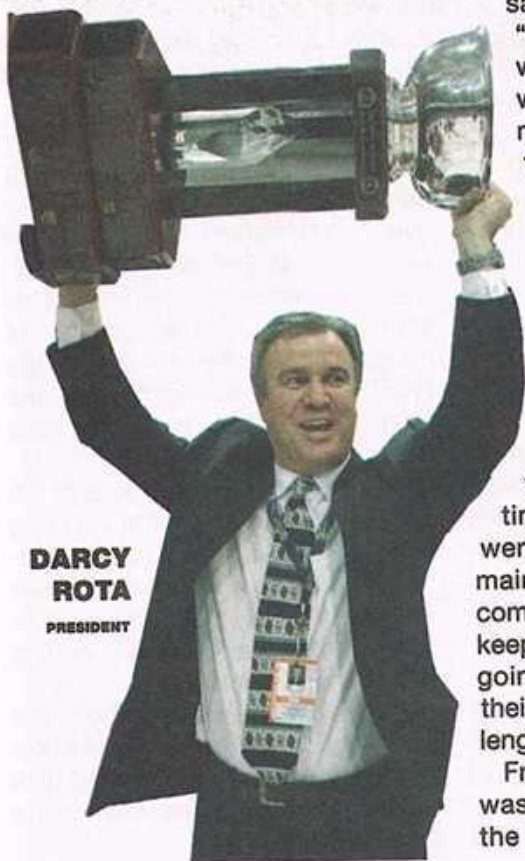
Brampton, Ont. for the Royal Bank Cup.

Burnaby lost the National Championship's opener 4-3 in overtime to the host team, the

Streetsville Derbys, but bounced back with three huge victories.

First it was a 4-2 win over the Yorkton Terriers.

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Jr. A game growing in popularity, opportunity

The popularity and importance of Junior A hockey is skyrocketing all across the country — not just because of the on-ice competition, but for the freedom it affords its players to fully pursue both their academic and hockey dreams at the same time.

"From a hockey development standpoint, Junior A is all-inclusive and for all options," said Canadian Junior A Hockey League president, Laury Ryan of the niche market Junior A has settled into in Canada.

Niche, in that it services many smaller-market communities around the country, but Junior A hockey is quickly becoming recognized as a launching pad for the careers — hockey and otherwise — for many young players from coast to coast.

The CJAHL is the amalgamation of the 10 Junior A leagues across the country, featuring 140 teams and over 3,000 skaters. From the Junior A level, players can go in a number of directions, making it a desirable choice for many.

"Players at this level are being developed for Major Junior hockey, NCAA hockey, Canadian University hockey, the various levels of minor professional hockey in North America, and professional hockey in Europe and in other parts of the world," said Ryan. "There is an extremely impressive list of former and current National Hockey League players who spent a portion of their careers playing Junior A hockey."

RBC fever hits PG

Jr. A National Championship heads west

Come May 5, 2007, the very best of the BCHL will emerge to take on the rest of the best at Hockey Canada's most prestigious domestic event, the RBC Royal Bank Cup in Prince George, B.C.

The Prince George Spruce Kings are this year's host team.

"We are extremely excited about the opportunity to host the nation," said Dan Rogers, tournament co-chair. "We spent four years trying to get the bid, now we've got a great host committee that's raring to go. They have put on their game face and are preparing to host a fantastic event."

"The tournament will showcase some of the best young athletes in the country, while also displaying our great community spirit and world famous northern hospitality."

Dubbed 'British Columbia's Northern Capital', the City of Prince George is located less than 100 kilometres from the province's geographical center. It is a bustling, resource-driven city of nearly 80,000. Located 780 km north of Vancouver, Prince George is situated at the junction of Highway 97 and the Yellowhead Highway 16. The area is serviced by an international airport. West Jet and

Air Canada both have several flights in and out of Prince George daily, with connections to all major regional, national and international centers.

Both VIA Rail and Greyhound Bus Lines have regularly scheduled service to and from Prince George.

With six hockey arenas including the 6,000 seat CN Centre that will host the RBC Royal Bank Cup, Prince George is definitely a hockey crazy city. It is home to a thriving minor hockey program that sees over 1,000 players take to the ice each year, as well as high school, men's, women's and masters leagues. Prince George is, of course, also home to the WHL's Prince George Cougars, and the 2007 RBC Royal Bank Cup host team, the Spruce Kings.

"With eight months to go until the puck drops on our event, the ground work is well laid," explained Rogers. "Our core committee has been working tirelessly behind the scenes for more than a year now putting everything in place."

"We're confident and proud about the direction we're going and know the event will only continue to pick up momentum as the months go by."

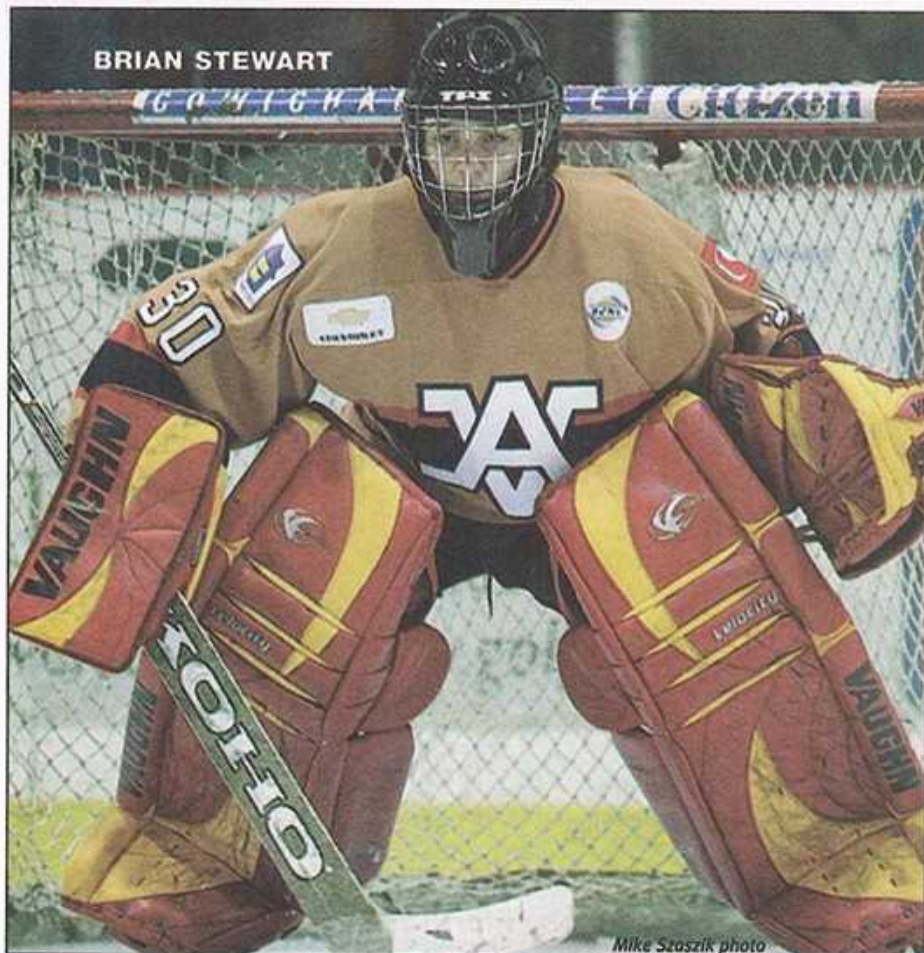

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'Dawgs push for the playoffs

New coach should help to give team's loyal fans a great product

The Alberni Valley Bulldogs are a hockey team with a lot of unfinished business to attend to.

Last year, the 'Dawgs heated up the BCHL, amassing one of the best records — going 43-12-5 — good for a second place finish in the regular season, just one point behind the powerhouse Nanaimo Clippers.

When the playoffs rolled around, the 'Dawgs looked strong.

They easily swept aside the struggling

Cowichan Valley Capitals in round one, before facing the upstart Victoria Salsa in round two.

After taking the first two games of the series, including a 13-2 game two win, the wheels fell off for Alberni Valley.

The Salsa rebounded to win the next four games, stunning the Alberni faithful, who expected their team to be there in the finals.

It was just not meant to be.

The team will look to

this year instead to push deeper into the playoff picture.

To do that, they've gone outside the country for help, bringing in former Sheffield Steeler coach, Dave Whistle.

He is a two-time British Super League winner, bringing valuable professional experience to help develop the Bulldogs players.

Whistle won championships in Belfast and Bracknell.

He was also an assistant coach for Great

Britain's national team.

That pro experience was instrumental in general manager, Randy Buffle's decision to bring in the Thunder Bay native to help guide the blossoming Bulldogs.

Buffle has been with the Bulldogs for four seasons, as GM, president and governor.

Formerly playing out of the Bill Copeland Arena in Burnaby, the franchise moved from there in 2002.

Since then, Port Alberni has been gripped with an intense Bulldog fever.

The city of 19,000 people manages to pack the 1,800 seat arena for every game, making Bulldog tickets a rare commodity in the small Vancouver Island community.

Fans last year were treated to one of the best Junior A teams in Canada during the regular season, and Buffie says fans can expect more of the same this season.

"We have a fast, skilled lineup again," he said. "The main difference is, we wanted to become tougher and add more beef to the lineup."

Buffie knows that in playing out of a traditionally competitive Coastal Division, a more physical team could be just what the Bulldogs need to have a longer playoff run this year than in previous years.

He has a handful of key players returning to the lineup, including Jordan Kremyr and Bradyn Melrose, two of the team's top scorers last year.

They will play an even bigger role this year.

Buffie is also excited about two prospects.

"Two kids from Manitoba that should contribute this year are Torry Lindsay and Dustin Clegg," said the GM. "They both lit up the Manitoba Midget league."

Goaltending is another strong point for the Bulldogs, with James Patterson between the pipes. Patterson was the backup to star keeper Brian Stewart last year.

This time around, it will be Patterson who will have the star billing.

The Bulldogs have been successful off the ice, also.

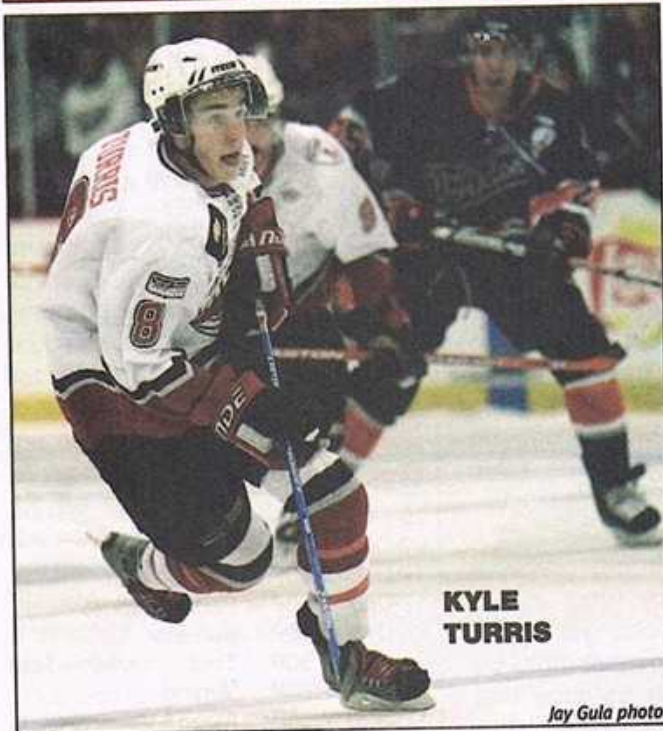

The Cowichan Valley Capitals have traditionally been a stronger team during the B.C. Hockey League's regular season than in the playoffs.

The only exception was way back in the 1993-94 campaign when the Caps returned to the league after a hiatus, under the direction of coach Bill Bestwick, and went on an improbable run to the BCHL finals against the Kelowna Spartans after a .500 regular season of 29-29-2. They haven't been back to the finals in the 12 seasons since then.

Current coach, Scott Robinson, who added the general manager's title during the off-season following the departure of Clayton Wright, has built the 2006-07 edition of the Capitals with a long playoff run in mind.

"Guys that are able to stand up to the physical part of it, we're deep in those," he said.

"We've definitely improved our defence and we're a much physically stronger team."

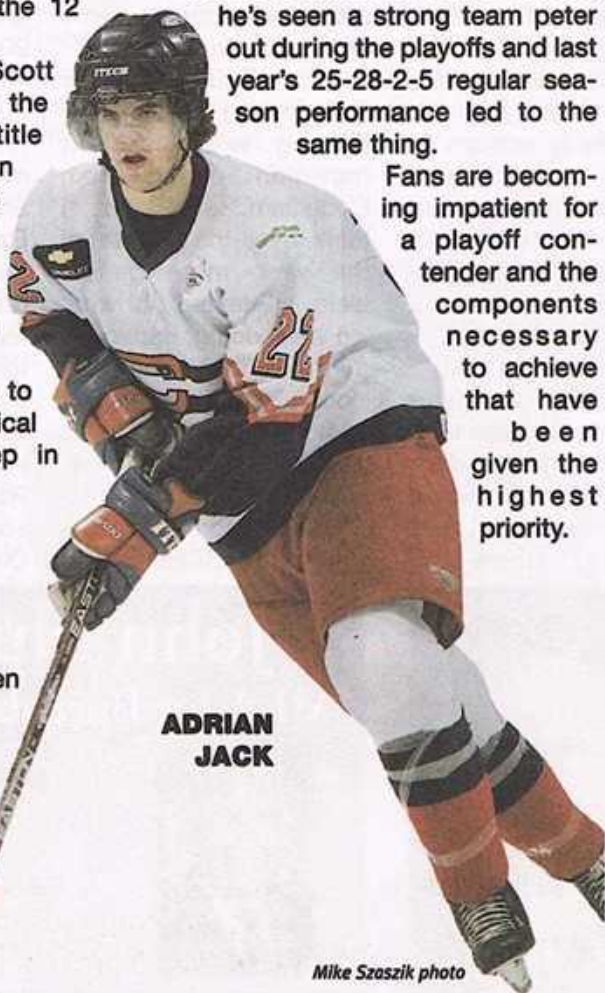
The Caps have been highly criticized in the past for making future considerations deals with limited returns. They vow to change that trend with the

addition of playoff-ready performers Jeff Obrand from Trail along with Luke Cain and Travis Holloway from Salmon Arm in deals made last season for Justin Frechione and Cam MacIntyre, respectively.

"They're all big physical players," said Robinson. "We've added three or four changes on the back end that are going to make us a better defence, a defence that gets out of our own end better."

During Robinson's three-year tenure behind the Caps' bench, he's seen a strong team peter out during the playoffs and last year's 25-28-2-5 regular season performance led to the same thing.

"Just in the time I've been here, we've come up against very tough teams and done well but not won any," Robinson said of the team's playoff plight.

"The first year, it was just clearly a case of injuries getting in the way of us going a long ways."

The Caps were swept in four games by the Alberni Valley Bulldogs in last season's playoffs despite playing them tough.

The Caps will have Doug Bodger, recently added to the B.C. Hockey Hall of Fame in Penticton, back as an assistant coach to Robinson.

There are no other staff changes, other than Robinson's added player personnel duties.

"It's certainly more time in the office, more time paper-work wise," he said. "When Clayton was here before, we worked together on most everything."

"He was really good that way."

Robinson concedes changes in the BCHL are inevitable no matter how prepared a team thinks it is and sometimes the unexpected poor performance of a returning veteran complicates the process of maintaining a set roster.

"I'd rather stick with the same 21 or 22 guys all year and just work with it," he said. "That's not the way it works."

The Caps had four players earn college or university scholarships last season.

Junior grads Kris Boyce and Aaron Spotts both went off to St. Scholastica in Minnesota, while Cam MacIntyre confirmed his plans to attend Princeton this fall before the Caps traded him to Salmon Arm.

Jeff Anderson landed a scholarship to Yale for the 2007-08 season and will play one more season

with the Caps. The Caps have sent many players to the American college ranks over the years, but their most famous grad remains forward Matt Ellison.

The Duncan product

started last season in the National Hockey League with the storied Chicago Blackhawks before being traded to the Philadelphia Flyers where he hopes to earn a regular spot after spending time with the team's American Hockey League affiliate team, the Philadelphia Phantoms.

The Capitals' biggest hindrance toward future growth and expanding their fan base is the lack of a new or expanded rink on the horizon.

Long-term plans to revamp or replace Cowichan Arena have been shelved — at least temporarily — leaving the Capitals behind other franchises with new facilities.

"All over the province, there are new arenas coming," noted Robinson.

For the Capitals, however, they just have slightly revamped their logo and added a third jersey for special outings this season.

New home, old traditions

Goodbye Chilliwack, hello Langley — Chiefs settle into new town

For the first time in 16 years the BCHL's Chiefs will not play their home games out of Chilliwack.

Instead, an off-season move to Langley will see the Chiefs now play out of the 33-year-old George Preston Recreation Centre. The move came after the Western Hockey League decided to expand to Chilliwack, and Langley moved their BCHL team to Westbank.

"I think it's been a rollercoaster ride to this point, with some highs and some lows said Chief's coach Harvey Smyl. "Langley is a community we're trying to be involved in, and be a part of, and it's a rela-

tively exciting time for us."

Other than its corn, the city of Chilliwack is well known for being loyal hockey fans, and it's something Smyl admits he's going to miss.

"We'll miss it big time, they were a part of the Chiefs' family, that loyal group back in Chilliwack, and so we'll miss them.

Hopefully we can create the same type of atmosphere here in Langley," Smyl said.

The original plan was to see the Chiefs move to close-by MSA Arena and later build a new 3,500-seat arena, however, the two sides could not agree on a lease agreement.



As a result, the Chiefs will now call the former Langley Hornets stomping ground home, a building that has struggled to attract fans in recent years.

At 32 home games last season the Hornets drew an average of just 720 fans, and failed to reach the playoffs, winning just 12 of 60 regular season games.

"We've got a really good response from the community to this point," said Smyl, who is returning for his 16th season. "So we're hoping we're able to (keep it up)".

The Chief's on-ice performance could be the difference in attendance between the Chiefs and Langley's former tenant.

Nanaimo rebuilds after losing key vets

If there's such a thing as too much time on your hands, Nanaimo Clippers GM/head coach had it this summer.

Character players like D-man, Craig Gaudet, and forwards Blair Riley, Colin Greening, Brennen Francon, A.J. Gale and Brandon Laidlaw are not replaced easily.

One major move this summer was the acquisition of forwards Tyler Mazzei and Shawn Overton from the Interior Conference's Williams Lake Timberwolves.

Add to the mix the likes of the defenceman-forward twin brother tandem of Mike and Joe Devin from Boston who are long on potential, forwards Tyler Sgro and Russell Goodman and goalie Mike Garman.

"Hopefully, we took full advantage of the extra time we had," said Bestwick.

"We know that we're going to be less experienced than we have been in recent years but I think we have recruited a team that has the character that the Clipper uniform has been known for."

Bestwick envisions a big, fast, abrasive team hitting the ice; one

reminiscent of successful Clipper teams in the organization's past.

One position of interest for the Clippers is goal-tending.

Second-year backstop Marc Cheverie is heir apparent to the starter's spot, although newcomer Mike Garman will likely push Cheverie for playing time.

Last season, Bestwick gave Cheverie and Simon LeBlanc equal playing time by alternating starts between the two goal-tenders freely, for the most part.

Both Cheverie (a seventh-round pick of the Florida Panthers in June's NHL Entry Draft) and Garman are veterans, but it is unlikely Bestwick will employ the same work schedule again this season.

"Will we enter into one of those alternating situations? I don't think so," said Bestwick. "Whoever is on top of their game will get the opportunity to play."

The Clippers joined the BCHL in 1972.

This is their 35th season, 34 in Nanaimo.

The team moved during the 1982-83 season

to Esquimalt and played as the Buccaneers while the WHL's Nanaimo Islanders made a brief appearance in the city of Nanaimo.

However, for the BCJHL playoffs that year, the team moved back to Nanaimo's Civic Arena and returned to the city on a full-time basis in 1983-84.

Perennial contenders, only twice in their 34-year history has the team not made the playoffs (1981-82, 1984-85).

They've won the BCHL title four times (1975-76, 1976-77, 1977-78 and 2003-04).

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Change is good

Vees bring back tradition and pride

It's been two years since the Penticton BCHL franchise dusted itself off and turned a page in the city's rich Junior A hockey history.

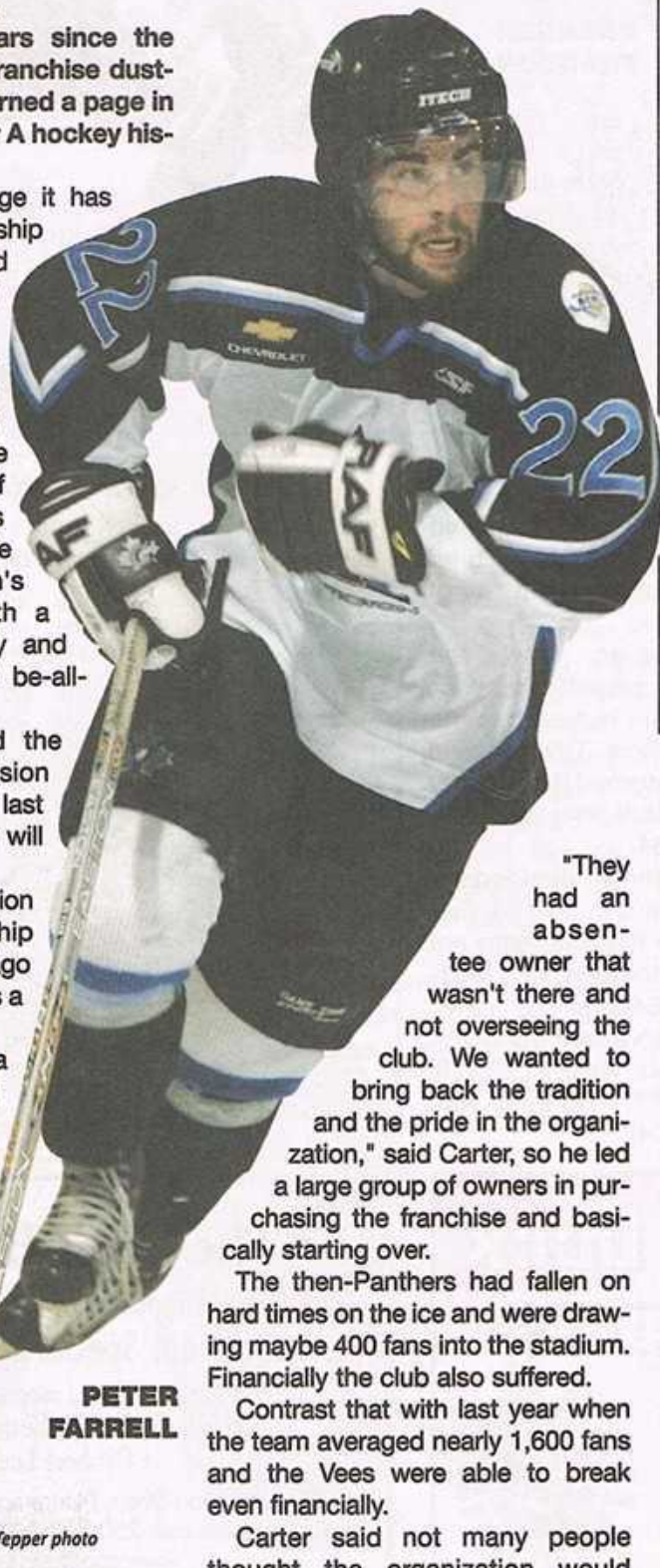
And what a change it has been: A new ownership group, a new head coach and a new name.

The biggest differences though have been on the ice and in the stands as the newest incarnation of the Penticton Vees have brought people back into Penticton's Memorial Arena with a focus on community and hard work and that be-all-end-all, winning.

Penticton claimed the BCHL Interior Division regular season title last season and this year will look to eclipse that.

It was a culmination of the ownership change two years ago that revived what was a stagnant franchise.

"Now we have a community owned team which was part of what we felt was the problem with the team," said Scott Carter, Vees, co-owner, managing partner and president.

"They had an absentee owner that wasn't there and not overseeing the club. We wanted to bring back the tradition and the pride in the organization," said Carter, so he led a large group of owners in purchasing the franchise and basically starting over.

The then-Panthers had fallen on hard times on the ice and were drawing maybe 400 fans into the stadium. Financially the club also suffered.

Contrast that with last year when the team averaged nearly 1,600 fans and the Vees were able to break even financially.

Carter said not many people thought the organization would

bounce back so quickly.

"Our first year we were picked by everybody to be last but we battled and made the playoffs," he said. "The fans really got behind us. Then last year we battled right down the stretch to win first place. We had these two great stretch runs that the fans really enjoyed.

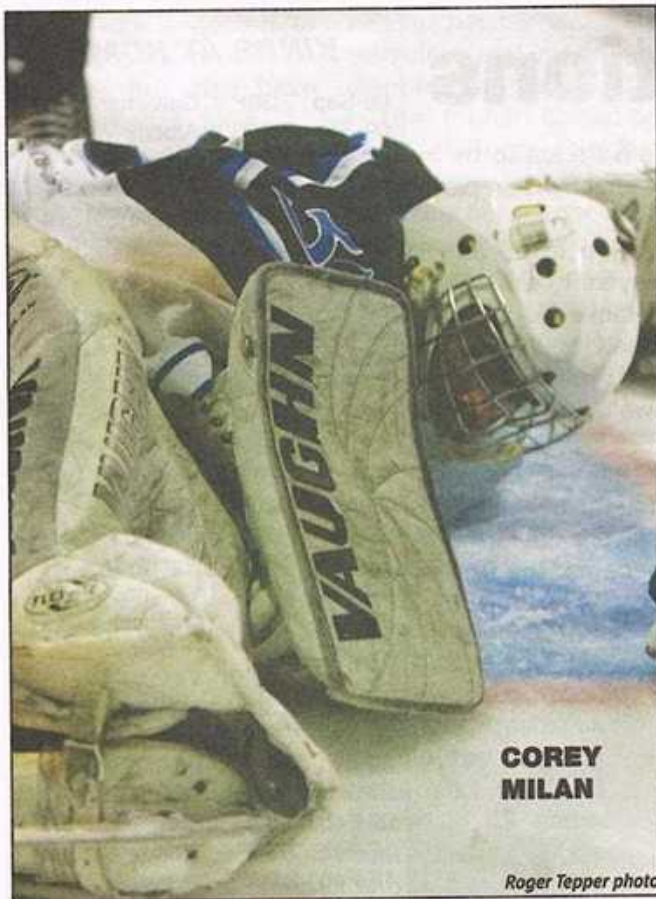
"It's been entertaining to watch and the outcome of the game is always in doubt."

Part of the success of the turnaround in Penticton goes back to getting people involved who are in the community and are proud hockey people. Carter was involved with the team in the 80s when Penticton won three B.C. championships, two Western Canadian titles and a Canadian Junior A crown with such names as Joe Murphy and Ray Ferraro on the ice.

Another Penticton alumni is Bruno Campese, a long time Junior coach who was the man the team turned to help turn things around on the ice. Campese was previously coach and general manager in Trail and had moved onto the WHL's Calgary franchise for two years as an assistant before he was brought back to the BCHL.

"The first year was about trying to re-establish the kind of program that was here in the 80s and 90s," said Campese. "We tried to re-establish an identity and we thought we did that in Year One.

"One of the things we wanted to do was build on that identity of hard work and commitment and really take it to the next level."

Last year the Vees did take another step winning the Interior division with a 41-13-2-4 record before losing in the BCHL championship series.

So Penticton appears to have restored its proud hockey history — the first Junior A team started in the city in 1961 — with two straight years that have brought people back into the arena.

A referendum will be held this year to decide if a new arena will be built in the city that is once again home to the Vees franchise, a named that also has a proud history.

"We wanted to bring back that tradition and couldn't think of a better way than to name the team in honor of the '55 World Championship team and what

Schoneck expects his team to be in the thick of the Coastal Division play-off race.

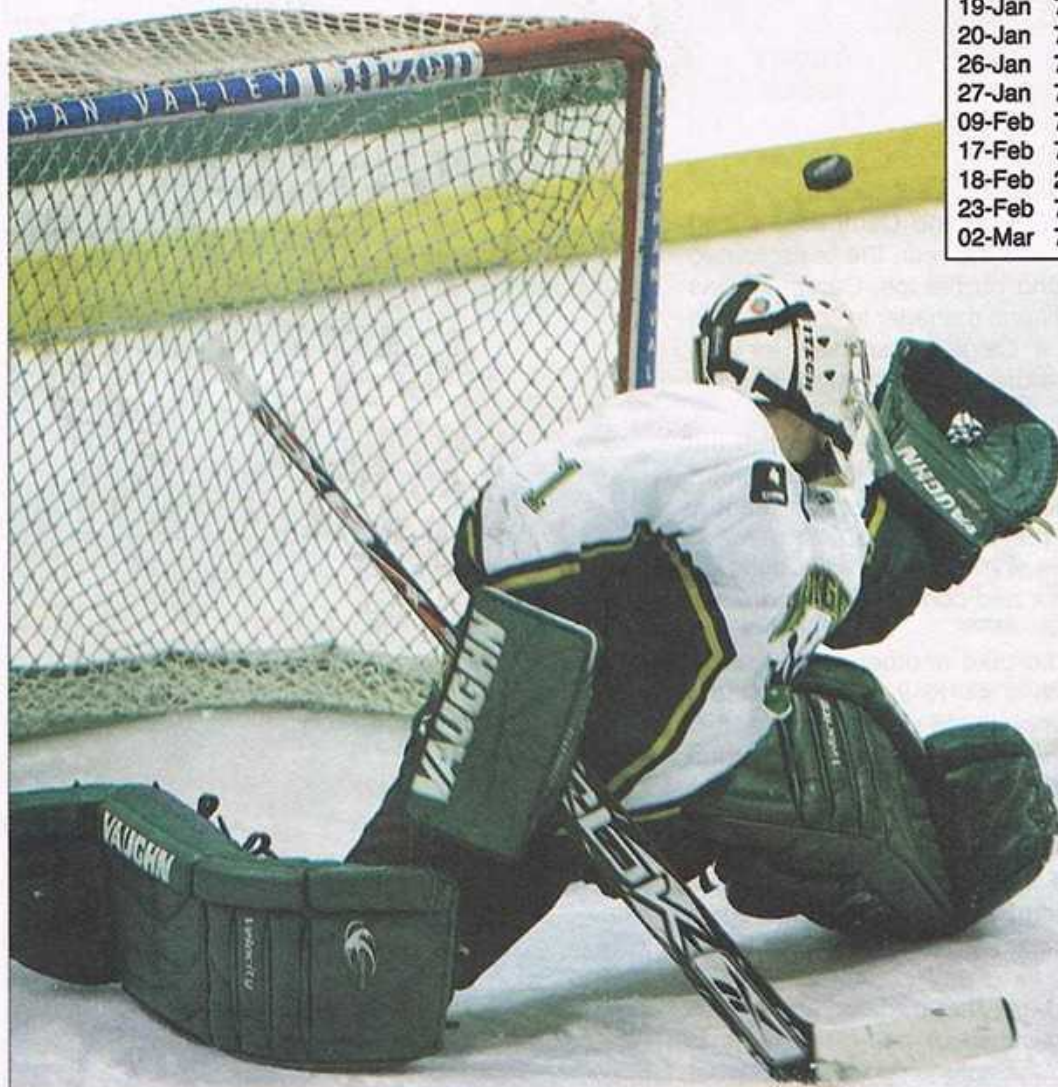

Players are expected to not only perform well on the ice, but also have high academic goals.

The Kings saw four players get scholarships from last year's team, including leading scorer Ethan Cox who's off to Colgate.

The Kings have seen their share of success in over the years, coming close to winning the BCHL title — making it to the finals three times in the 90s.

The team has been in the middle-of-the-pack in terms of the the standings over the last few seasons, but Schoneck looks forward to the challenge of making the Kings a top team again.

"I knew coming to Powell River that it had been a successful organization in the past, but had suffered a few blips the last couple of years," said Schoneck. "The history of this team and the passion the community

Spruce Kings RBC Cup bound

For over three decades, the Spruce Kings have been an integral part of the Prince George sports community.

From the Peace Cariboo Hockey League to the Rocky Mountain Junior Hockey League, the organization has evolved and will find itself in Junior hockey's national spotlight this season.

Prince George will host the annual Royal Bank Cup in May.

With the Spruce Kings already penciled in as the host team, general manager and coach Ed Dempsey is excited about the challenges his team will see in 2006-07.

"The biggest challenge is the fact that we all know we will be in the big dance at the end of the season," Dempsey said. "There is something in human nature, I suppose, that might result in somebody maybe choosing to relax. On the other side

of the fence, everybody involved knows we want to put the best possible team on the ice."

Recruiting has taken on a new importance, especially this season, as Dempsey sees another challenge in building a team that will first have to measure itself against BCHL teams and then compete with league champions from across the country.

On the other hand, hosting the Royal Bank Cup also makes playing in Prince George this season an even more compelling proposition for players aspiring to garner the most exposure they can.

At the end of June, the club completed a six-player trade with the Port Hope Predators of the Ontario Provincial Junior Hockey League, bringing veteran goalie, Paul

Dainton, 19, and defenceman Bobby Hineman, 20, to Prince George.

"With the acquisition of Dainton and Hineman, we have taken steps to solidify ourselves in two positions we identified as requiring upgrades," Dempsey said. "Dainton has the numbers to show that he is a qualified starting goaltender and Hineman adds some size and makes us a solid team on the back end."

The community is also excited about the upcoming season.

"There's definitely a buzz around here," Dempsey said. "Ever since we were awarded the Royal Bank Cup tournament by Hockey Canada, people around Prince George have been looking forward to the exposure.

"The snowball is getting bigger now and people are getting more and more excited."



Dempsey, who spent 15 years coaching in the WHL with the Kamloops Blazers and the Prince George Cougars, has not lost sight of the bottom line for his hockey team.

"This is a performance based business," he said. "I think hosting the Royal Bank Cup can be a huge motivator. As a player, you don't want to slip on a banana peel this season. You certainly do not want to be a guy who isn't getting the job done early in the year or else you might not be there at the end."

In the beginning, 1972 that is, the Spruce Kings became an organization the community was quick to support.

Since then, the powers-that-be kept the club in the forefront and are now making a point to celebrate its 35-year history.

"We have decided that this season we are going to honor that first team, the group from 1972," said Dempsey. "When Burnaby comes in Oct. 7,



most of the guys from that 1972 team will be here."

There is a two-fold significance in choosing to celebrate while the Spruce Kings entertain the Burnaby Express.

Firstly, the club is owned and operated by Darcy Rota, who played much of his minor hockey in Prince George. While the Spruce Kings took to the ice in 1972, Rota had

already departed to play Junior hockey for the Edmonton Oil Kings. However, many of the then Spruce Kings remember their minor hockey days with Rota.

Coincidentally, the Express just happen to be the defending Royal Bank Cup champions, having won the title last May.

Dempsey is confident he can help professional opportunities to materialize for BCHL players.

"In the WHL you will likely have at least two or three guys that are about a year removed from the NHL," he said.

"In the WHL, it's kind of

like a player saying, okay, I'm going to take my shot now. In the last five years, I think the BCHL has really closed the gap.

"Many players look at it as a stepping stone to the NHL. A large number of the guys in the BCHL are hopeful of scholarship opportunities in the USA, although they have professional aspirations in the back of their mind," he said.

"They may use the college route to buy some time in terms of development. Both the physical and emotional growth between the ages of 21-24 can be beneficial."

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Mills ready to go

Off-season changes give club new life

The fans in Quesnel have probably heard it all before. The Millionaires' off-season was characterized by some big moves, some new faces behind the bench, and the hopes of turning around a dismal, eight-win, last place season. For the past few seasons, Quesnel has gotten a little too comfy holding down the bottom spot of the Interior Division.

M New head coach and general manager, Tim Bohmer, is well aware of the team's history and the trend of losing but he remains optimistic about the future.

"It's definitely [a situation where] the environment's got to change," said Bohmer. "We have to be a group that can defend before we can outscore opponents. I think if we can be a defence-first team, take care of our own end, and make sure we can establish a forecheck from that, then I think we'll have our opportunities."

Bohmer came to the Millionaires as the assistant coach of the Penticton Vees, a team that excelled in the defensive end. Last season, the Vees set a BCHL record by allowing only 137 goals against in the 60-game regular season.

"If you look at our team last year in Penticton, we were real focused defensively and real structured and it ended up leading to a lot of our offence," said Bohmer.

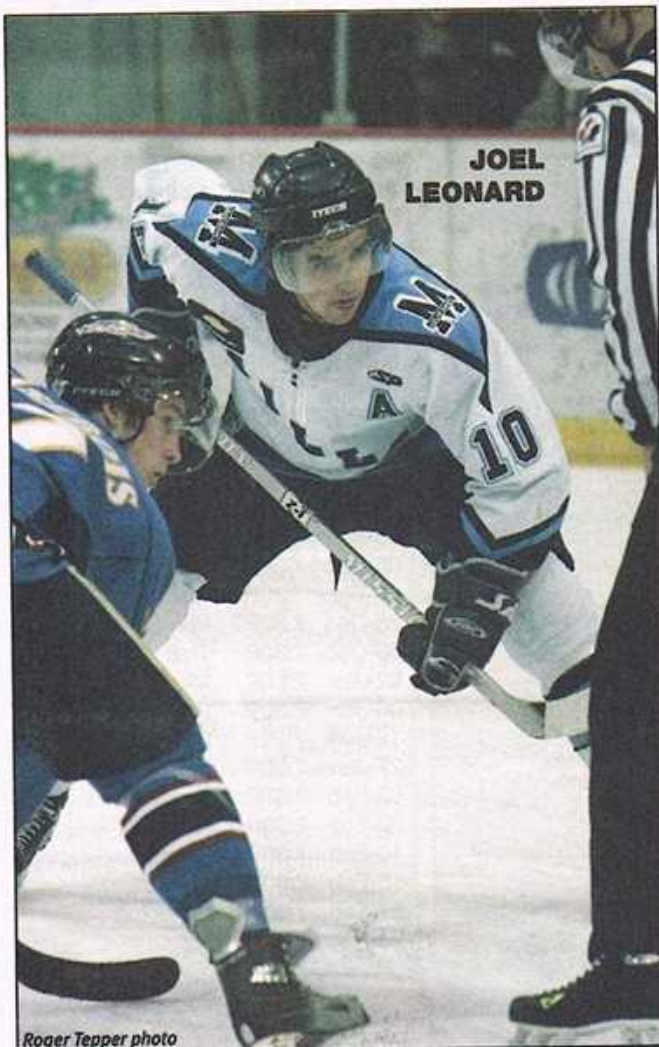

"Everybody said how structured defensively we were but we still managed to score quite a few goals throughout the season," said Bohmer.

Quesnel's off-season moves emphasized the importance of a pair of key qualities that will likely define the 2006/07 edition of the Millionaires.

"We made some moves in the off-season to try and make us a little grittier, a little tougher to play against, and I think that's going to be our sort of identity," said Bohmer. "We want to make sure we're a hard team to play against on a nightly basis.

"If we can be that type of team in conjunction with being a good defensive team, we should be okay."

Last season was not all bad news, as three key players from Quesnel's 05/06 campaign will have the opportunity to play post-secondary hockey this season including: Archie Henderson (SAIT), Kiel Sonne (Concordia), and Ted Vickers (Amherst College).

As for new players stepping into the lineup, Coach Bohmer is excited about high-scoring Major Midget sniper Jordan Harrison, who scored 59 points in 36 games with

the Okanagan Rockets last season.

"We're really happy with the signing of Harrison out of Kelowna," said the coach. "We thought he was a player that could potentially be a top-six forward on any team in the league at some point."

On the defensive side of things, Tanner Hlookoff of the KIJHL's Castlegar Rebels will suit up for his first BCHL season as a Millionaire.

"He's an experienced defenceman that's been in (the KIJHL) since he was 15," said Bohmer. "He's definitely ready to take the next step in his career."

When asked how he feels about "being the man" in Quesnel, Bohmer said that he prefers to stay out of the spotlight.

"I've never really been one about 'being the man' or thinking about that," said Bohmer.

"I just saw an opportunity to obviously be a head coach in a pretty good league, and I definitely was excited about," he added.

With a new head coach, a new assistant coach, and some key roster changes, the Millionaires' 2006/07 season could be the start of a major turnaround.

"I think the organization here wants to do the right thing and wants to have a club that is a good franchise or is considered a good organization within our league," Coach Bohmer added.

"In the talks that I had with the team, that was their focus, and it seemed to be a good fit for my philosophy and what I believe as a coach and as a person," said Bohmer.

"That was one of my primary reasons in taking on the job and... I'm really excited to do that."

The strong getting stronger

Salmon Arm squad developing into a premiere BCHL franchise

The Salmon Arm Silverbacks are nothing if not a family affair for the Davidson clan, led by longtime Junior hockey coach Garry Davidson, who, after a decade in the BCHL, has finally found resounding success in Salmon Arm — by reinvigorating a sleeping Junior hockey community.

Davidson, who owns the Silverbacks with childhood friend and professional coach Andy Murray, changed the

entertainment choices of thousands of Salmon Arm residents when he brought the expansion franchise to the Shuswap community starting in the 2001/02 BCHL season.

"We anticipated it would be a solid franchise and a solid market and it's turned into that," said Davidson. "It's been solid with the facility and in the community."

The Silverbacks burst onto the BCHL Interior scene, surprising almost everybody by being able to hold onto first place for a good part of the season

before finishing nine games over .500 and in third place — just three points out of the top spot.

The club has never looked back, quickly becoming a power in the Interior Division and a team now known for moving kids onto the next level.

Since Junior A hockey's rebirth in Salmon Arm five years ago, the team has graduated around 40 players into Canadian or American colleges and universities, and even had six players drafted by NHL teams,

including 2004 first rounders Travis Zajac (New Jersey) and Kris Chucko (Calgary).



"I think it's our job to develop players and move them on to the next level, whatever the level that may be," said Davidson who, after last season had six of his players receive NCAA scholarships. Three other Silverbacks moved onto Canadian university leaving just six players eligible to return this season.

"It's a little more difficult when you have so much turnover," he said. "Every year you are rebuilding but when you do well the tendency is players want to come and play with you."

Davidson left Trail when he was given the BCHL expansion franchise in Salmon Arm and also has spent time with the Penticton Vees, Victoria Salsa (now Grizzlies) and Nanaimo Clippers before what is his longest stint with one organization in Salmon Arm.

This year Davidson will take another step away from coaching and will not be an active participant on the Silverbacks' bench.

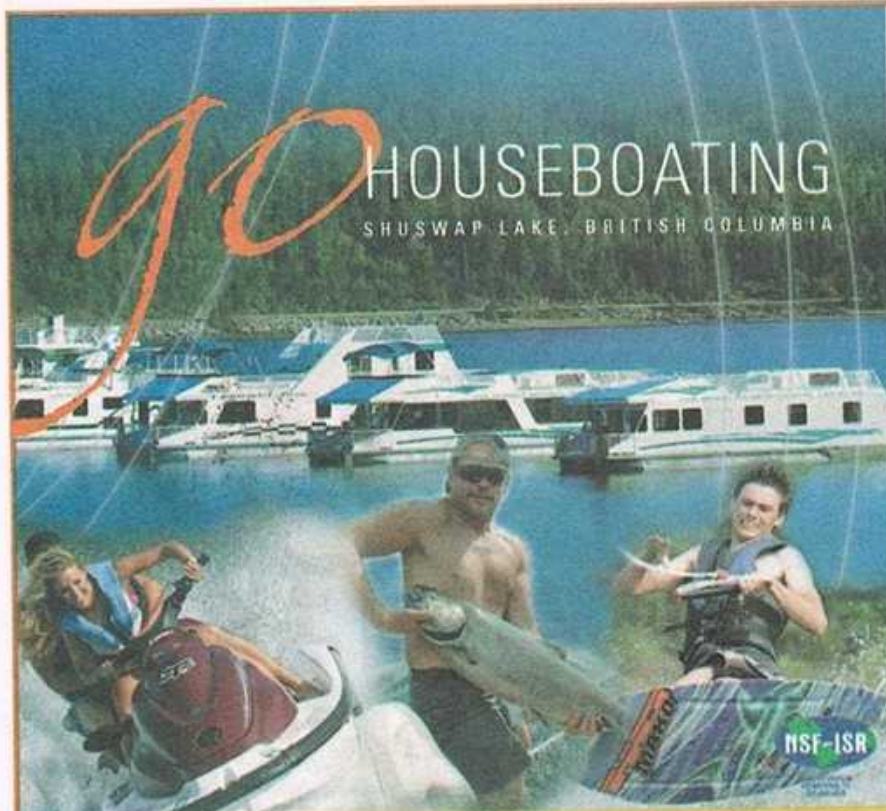
Davidson's son Ty Davidson will resume the full head coaching duties while he will act as general manager and owner and continue to work on a couple of BCHL committees.

two seasons. Fans of the Silverbacks' up-tempo style don't have to worry about any changes in

the way the team has played hockey since moving into the Sunwave Centre in Salmon Arm.

"I think our philosophies are very similar as far as how we like the game to be played," said Ty, who along with business manager Brenda is one of three Davidson's involved in the team. "I think we are definitely offensive-minded and nothing is really going to

change. We believe skill and speed are the types of teams you have to have to be successful. I'm not going to impose a defensive style anytime soon."

Ty Davidson is no stranger to coaching or the BCHL.

After a four year playing career in Penticton, Nanaimo and Bellingham, he played three seasons at the University of Brandon before joining his dad as an assistant in Trail.

When the Silverbacks opened play, Ty went on to two seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Calgary before re-joining the family business.

So there may be a changing of the guard in Salmon Arm and there is another bumper crop of new recruits and players but fans will likely see more of the same with the Silverbacks: Up tempo hockey and a spot near the top of the Interior conference.

"This is concrete evidence that Junior A hockey is a developing ground for the NHL," Ryan added, giving players an additional reason for going the Junior A route. What's more, Junior A is a less invasive way for young players to develop their skills.

"It provides opportunities for young hockey players to stay close to home, concentrate on their education, while still focusing on developing as a player," added Ryan. "This development certainly does not go unnoticed by the college and professional ranks."

Both the Alberta Junior Hockey League and the B.C. Junior Hockey League have established roots with recruiters — Canadian, US, and otherwise. More are finding true gems in both leagues each year.

Recognizing the explosion of Junior A hockey in the country, Hockey Canada has stepped in to help with its promotion.

"The CJHL and Hockey Canada are long-standing partners in developing our national game," said Ryan. "Significant strides have been made in the last couple of years in the build-up of some key international programs, which will be exhibited in the execution of the inaugural World Junior A Challenge."

The World Junior A Challenge, planned to be an

annual event exposing top Canadian Junior players to international competition, will be held in Yorkton, SK this November.


"The World Junior A Challenge is going to be a big step forward for Junior A hockey in this country," said Paul Lake, former president, now chairman of the CJHL.


"This will give us all an opportunity to gauge where the Canadian Junior A Hockey League is at, as it relates to developing high performance hockey players. It is also a special treat for the fans as they will see some of the best Junior A hockey talent from around the world."

The four countries confirmed to compete in the World Junior A Challenge are: Belarus, Germany, Russia and Slovakia. The schedule consists of 13 games, featuring six teams divided into two pools. Pool A will include Canada West, Russia and Belarus, while Pool B will have Canada East, Slovakia and Germany.

The Challenge is just one of several other high-profile Junior A events now hosted in Canada, including a new CJHL Prospects Game (this December in Vernon, B.C.) and a national championship in the RBC Royal Bank Cup in May in Prince George, B.C.

Another recognizable name for B.C. hockey fans, from the Eagles

alumni, is goaltender Dustin Slade, who back-stopped the WHL Vancouver Giants to their first league championship and led them to the 2006 Memorial Cup.

Slade was not drafted by a National Hockey League organization this off-season, but will tryout with the NHL's Vancouver Canucks at their training camp.

Slade also has hopes of taking the Vancouver Giants back to the Memorial Cup, this time as the host team.

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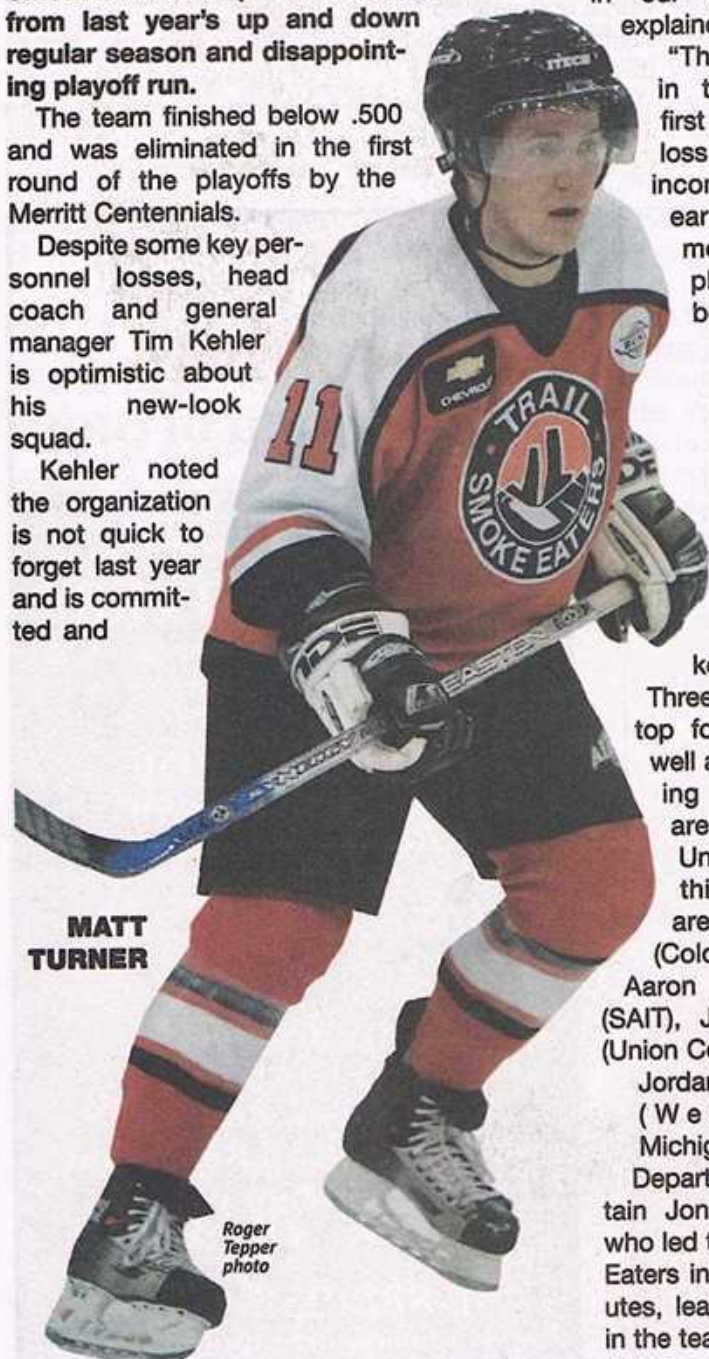

"We have recruited players who come from winning programs and have been in leadership positions with those teams," he said. "They know what it takes to win and will bring that winning attitude to our dressing room."

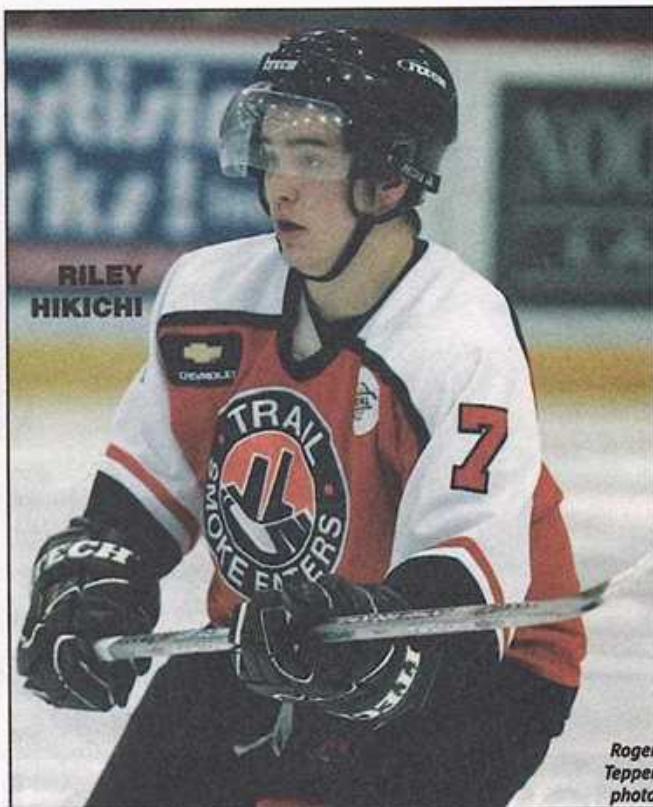
At the heart of this reshaped roster is Alex Greenlay, the "consum-

In the off-season the management team went looking for an experienced coach and signed Mark Hollick, a one-time coach of the Surrey Eagles, to guide the team.

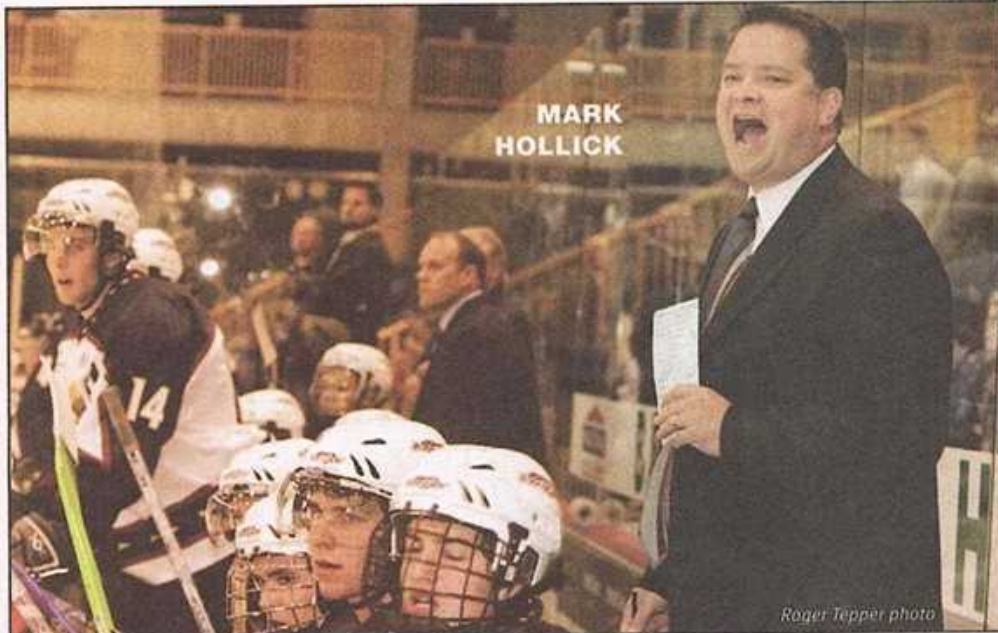

The Cinderella story continued but only for one more game.

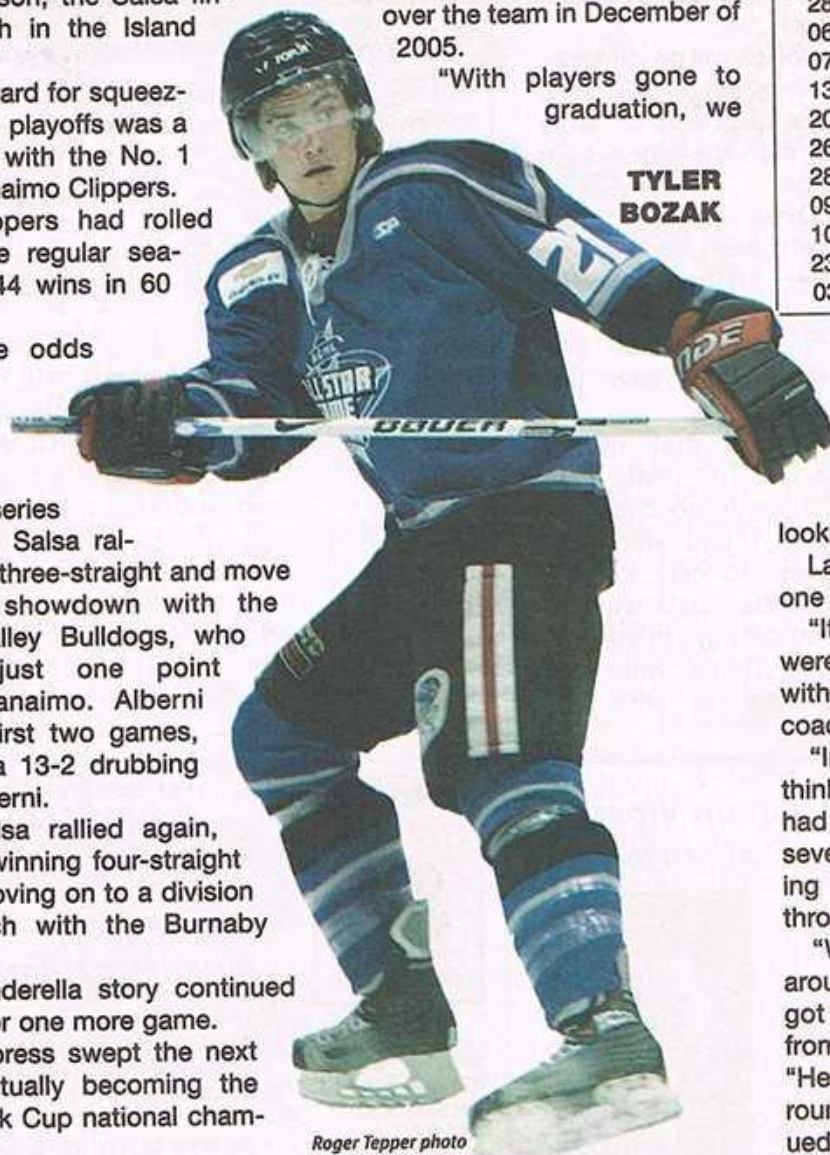
The Express swept the next four, eventually becoming the Royal Bank Cup national champions.

will look for new players to be balanced in all areas," said Ferster. "We should have good goaltending again, we're hoping to stay relatively healthy and we'll be looking to get a bounces."

Matt Pettinger is that team's most famous grad, playing 143 games for the Washington Capitals.

He's now playing pro in Slovenia.

As per the BCHL tradition of sending players on to post-secondary school and hockey, the Grizzlies have five former players suiting up for university and college teams this year, including: Jordan Baird (St. Scholastica), Chad Betts (SAIT), Josh Duncan (Quinnipiac), Robert Forshner (Holy Cross) and Andrew Rebus (Geneseo).

Salsa defender, Jordie Benn has committed to play for the University of Alaska-Fairbanks for the

2007/08 hockey season.

Despite the player losses, the Grizzlies plan to excel both on and off the ice.

"We want to continue winning and challenge for the Royal Bank Cup,"

said the coach.

With a new name, new ownership and a renewed optimism in Victoria, the Capital City can look forward to some exciting BCHL hockey again this fall.

New Beginnings

Warriors not your average expansion team

The Westside Warriors may be the newest team in the BCHL Interior Division but that's not to say the franchise is a true expansion club.

Perhaps the most important new staff member that Gelinias hired was the man who will guide the Warriors in their first season in the BCHL.

Gelinias got the help of Coflin to find his replacement.

They turned to the Alberta Junior Hockey League

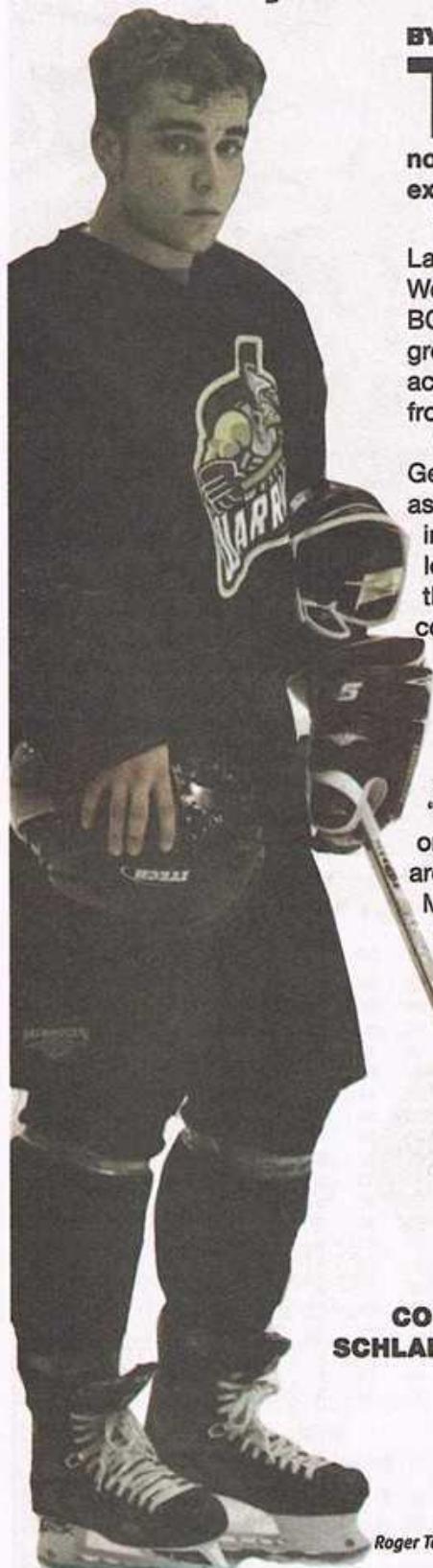
and signed former Drayton Valley Thunder coach Mark Howell, 35, as head coach.

Howell has been hard recruiting and familiarizing himself with a new league, a new team and new players.

"The biggest challenge is learning about players in this province and the other teams in the league and the other coaches," said Howell who has recruited several top Alberta players for Westside this year.

"If we don't secure quality players and people we're not going to be very successful. That's the challenge."

While Howell looks forward to the new challenge, Westside prepares to play host to its first Junior hockey team. Attracting the BCHL to the Westside was a true community effort, driven in large part by the Westside Minor Hockey Association. And it happened in what seemed like the blink of an eye.

The Westside BCHL Booster Club formed quickly when rumours surfaced that there could be a chance to lure a franchise.

And what the group, consisting of minor hockey members, did was to establish a new precedent in terms of support prior to BCHL approval.

The Westside — with a population somewhere around 40,000 — secured over 1,100 season ticket commitments and \$160,000 in corporate support — even before the league governors voted on the move.

It was a package that was too good to say no to.

"It was a very personal approach," said booster

club spokesman Steve Greenaway.

"We didn't rely on advertising. It was person

to person at the rink, talking to people," he added. "We asked them to step up with a \$25 deposit and people were willing to step up.

"We have heard from the league and others that the kind of package we put together has kind of established a new threshold for communities who want to have a BCHL team."

It hasn't been all smooth sailing for Gelinias' move to the Westside, however, as a promised new arena has been fraught with delays.

Until the construction of the team's new facility is complete, the Warriors will play in Kelowna's

old Memorial Arena, the past home of Junior teams like the Buckaroos, Packers and the WHL's Kelowna Rockets.

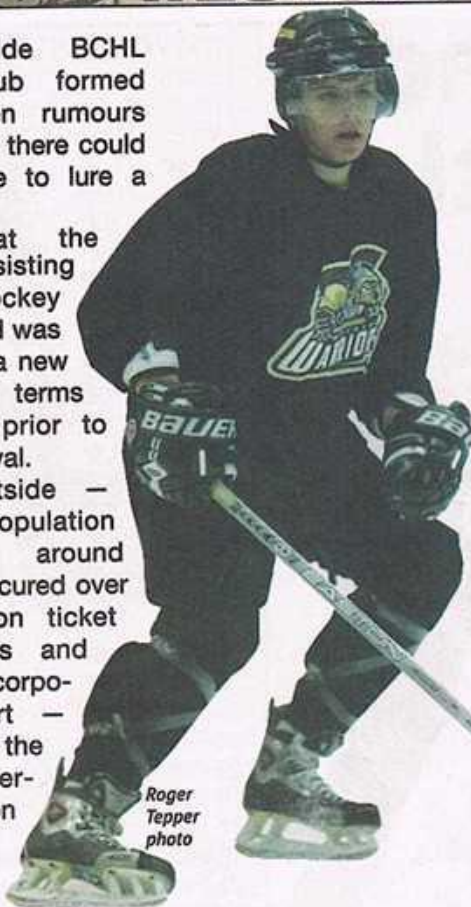
Memorial will host Westside until their new rink is ready sometime next year.

Despite what has been a major headache with the construction delays, Gelinias has nothing but good to say about the Westside market.

"We thought it was a great community looking for an identity," he said.

"The commitment of the booster club and the season ticket holders and the corporate community has been over the top even with the hurdle of the arena not being ready.

"It's been a phenomenal response."

Carpenter, who took the reins last season in Williams Lake with three weeks remaining on the regular season schedule, knows of what he speaks.

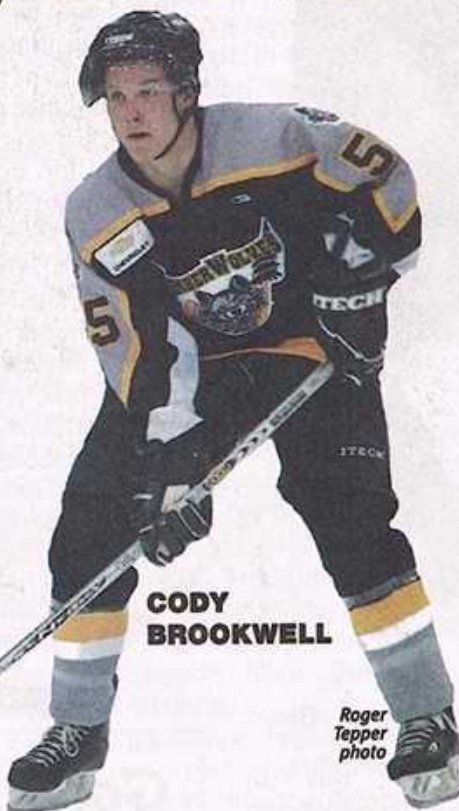
After his BCHL career as a player ended in 1990 with the New

take things for granted, but some of the off-ice experiences are very important. I want to help the guys see that value. I'm not certain the accountability was there last year, on or off the ice."

Away from the rink, the team's Community Care Club has become an important program.

"The Community Care Club provides a vehicle for local corporations and the Timberwolves to team up for the betterment of our community," said Brad Morgan. He handles promotions and marketing for the club.

"With the help of corporations throughout Williams Lake, physically and mentally challenged individuals, as well as unfortunate and economically disadvantaged youth are given the opportunity to attend Timberwolves games."

In Williams Lake these days, the community is in the process of solidifying plans for a new, multi-purpose facility.

The Timberwolves are firmly behind the project, hoping to benefit from a larger arena and seating capacity.

"We're typically near capacity at home games right now," said Morgan.

"We have seen terrific support from the corporate community. We've averaged about 600 season tickets."

As it stands now, the old Cariboo Recreation Complex accommodates about 900 spectators.

According to Morgan, Global Entertainment is the company proposing to

build a new 3,500-seat facility on the Stampede Grounds behind the grandstand area.

Today, the BCHL expects a venue with a 1,500-seat minimum for teams applying to join the league.

For the Timberwolves, now in their fifth year of operation, the Cariboo Recreation Complex would not meet that league requirement.

With 12 seconds left,

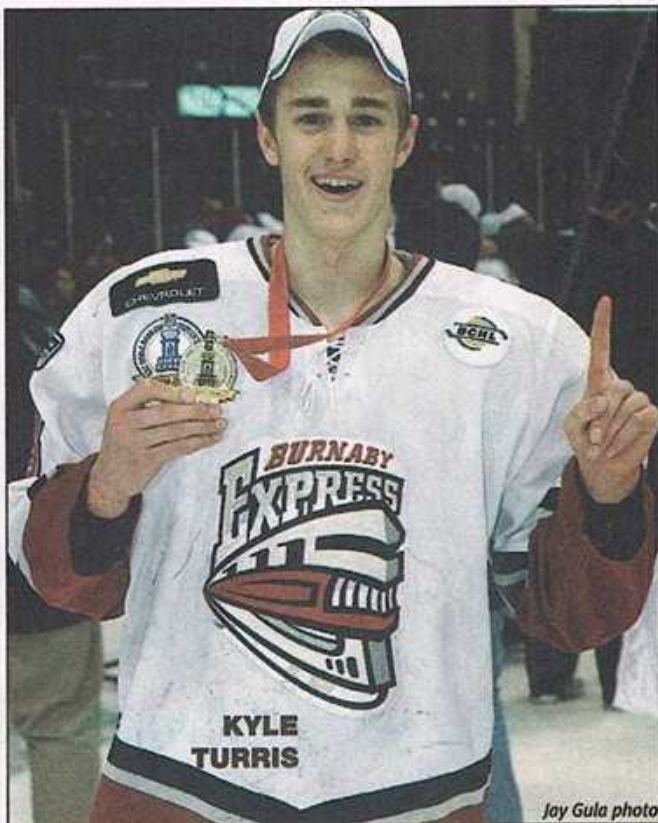
Kyle Turris buried his second game-tying goal of the tournament.

MOWAT CUP NOTES

1927-28...The first competition for the Cup was limited to a one game affair as ice time was not available. Fernie defeated Ex-King George in Vancouver. Fernie had won the right to play in the final having defeated Armstrong 17-1, Salmon Arm 16-4 and Revelstoke 7-1.

1931-32...The Trail Smoke Eaters won their first of 22 titles over the next 29 seasons that the Cup was competed for. They defeated Merritt in Trail.

1943-44...Trail won the Mowat title then the Western Canada finals only to be defeated by the Oshawa Generals for the Memorial Cup. (National Championship)

1961-62...Marked the initial year of the Okanagan Junior Hockey League and as their champions the Kamloops Rockets defeated the Trail Smoke Eaters in two straight games for the title.

1962-63...Saw the last victory for the Trail Smoke Eaters as they defeated the New Westminster Royals, for Trail it was their 22nd and last (to date) Mowat Cup win.

1967-68...The British Columbia Junior Hockey League was formed when New Westminster and Victoria joined the four team Okanagan Junior Hockey League. The Penticton Broncos won the Championship in that first year.

1980-81...Marked the inaugural season in which the BCJHL played the Peace Cariboo Junior Hockey League for the Mowat Cup. The Penticton Knights (BCJHL) defeated the Prince George Spruce Kings (PCJHL) two straight in the best of three, 3-0 and 5-1.

1985-86...The Penticton Knights became the first ever B.C. team to win the National Title as they defeated Prince George for the Mowat Cup, Calgary for the Doyle Cup (BC/Alberta Championship), Winnipeg for the Abbott Cup (Western Canadian Championship) then won the Centennial Cup Tournament with a final win over host Cole Harbour.

1986-87...The Richmond Sockeyes followed the Penticton lead defeating Quesnel for the Mowat, Red Deer for the Doyle, Humboldt for the Abbott and winning the Centennial Cup Tournament with a final win over host Humboldt.

1989-90...The Series was changed to the best of five for the first time. The New Westminster Royals (BCJHL) defeated Prince George (PCJHL) in three straight; 7-4, 8-5 and 7-4. In the Centennial Cup Tournament, hosted by Vernon, the Vernon Lakers defeated New Westminster for the National Title with a come-from-behind 6-5 overtime win in the final game.

1990-91...The Vernon Lakers repeated as National Champions defeating Prince George in the Mowat, the Calgary Royals in the Doyle, Yorkton in the Abbott and won the Centennial Cup with a victory over host Sudbury in the final game.

1991-92...The Vernon Lakers (BCJHL) defeated Prince George of the newly formed Rocky Mountain Junior Hockey League in three straight; 5-1, 7-5 and 5-2. For the Lakers it was their fourth Mowat Cup victory in the last five seasons.

1992-93...The Kelowna Spartans (BCJHL) were easy winners over Williams Lake 10-2, 13-3 & 6-1 for their first Mowat Cup victory since 1973-74.

1993-94...The Kelowna Spartans (BCJHL) won their second straight Mowat Cup Championship with wins of 7-1 & 5-4 (double overtime) in Kimberley then 7-2 back in Kelowna. The BCJHL game winning streak in now 33 straight games and 15 series over the Rocky Mountain Junior Hockey League.

1994-95...Marks the first time ever for both Chilliwack & Cranbrook to participate in the Championship. Both teams won their respective league Championships for the first time as well. Chilliwack defeated Cranbrook in 3 straight games 6-3, 7-5 & 6-5 in overtime.
